

Oregon Republican Party Announces It's Policy for 1960 in Ten Fields

Salem—The Republican party of Oregon has announced its policy statement for 1960 in 10 fields, and gave "full endorsement" to Gov. Mark Hatfield's efforts in studying reorganization of state government.

The GOP said such reorganization "can result in a stronger, more efficient, more economical, yet more stable government" and at the same time it will be "more responsive to the will of the people."

The policy statement was approved by the GOP State Central Committee after being drafted and amended by county GOP subcommittees.

The policy statements, in abbreviated form: Agriculture—All possible help and encouragement should be given to self-help programs of producers; Oregon State College should be given adequate money for agricultural research; State Agriculture Department should be reorganized and strengthened; a "vigorous program" for eliminating the wheat surplus is recommended, through such ideas as food for peace.

Economic Development and Progress—Hatfield's administration was commended; the statement said total employment in Oregon reached a record high last June and personal income last year was above the national average for the first time since 1953.

Percentage gain or new corporations in Oregon was higher than both California and Washington.

Education—Calls for an increase in basic school support with such increases reflected in lower county property taxes; recommends approval of ballot measure No. 6, state bonds for higher education; federal aid to education should be restricted to current programs and to the support of construction programs for colleges and primary and secondary schools.

Civil Right—Pledge "enthusiastic, sincere support of all measures which will give to all citizens the rights which are guaranteed in the constitution of the United States."

Taxation—No increase in taxes; savings in governmental operation through tight fiscal control and elimination of waste.

Labor-Management—Recommends the rights of employees to choose union representatives by secret ballot; encouragement of fair and equitable collective bargaining with "necessary safeguards against the coercion" of individual employees by either management or labor; use of conciliation and mediation.

Unemployment Insurance—Continuation of present program.

Natural Resources—Endorses harvesting of timber on a sustained yield basis; work of the Oregon Water Resources Board in developing programs for use and control of streams should be accelerated; early construction of the remaining authorized Willamette Basin projects urged; a study of underground water should be accelerated; freedom of the Salmon River from any obstruction until safe passage of salmon is possible; control of wastes is the responsibility of the individual, municipality or industry involved.

Workmen's Compensation—Establishment of a GOP permanent study committee; no recommendation at this time.

Political Parties and Election Laws—Leadership of both parties commended for spirit of cooperation which brought about formation of the bipartisan election laws study committee; pledge of "all possible" legislative support to programs unanimously recommended by committee members; ballot measure No. 7 endorsed; to permit voters new in the state to waive the six month requirement in voting for president.
