Fourth Boy Arrested For Dynamite Theft

A fourth youth was arrested by local law enforcement agencies early Sunday morning and charged with the theft of a large quantity of explosives from the White City ammunition dump last week.

Three younger boys were arrested in connection with the theft Saturday night and some 400 pounds of stolen dynamite and more than 1,000 dynamite caps were recovered.

James Leonard Stenerson, 19, of 2216 West Main st., has been lodged in the county jail on a charge of burglary not in a dwelling.

The three boys, who were arrested Saturday night, were lodged in the juvenile detention home on charges of larceny, burglary and auto theft.

All four boys admitted their part in the theft. The three younger boys told police they were "thinking about" blowing up the covered McKee bridge in the Applegate valley as a Halloween stunt. They said, however, that they probably would not have done this.

The Jackson county sheriff's office, state police and Medford city police all worked on the case. The arrests came after police were tipped off that one of the youths was seen with a dynamite cap.

Following their arrest the boys led police to a tree house in front of the residence of one, where the dynamite was hidden. The dynamite caps were found in back of another house.

The three younger boys also admitted to stealing several cars in recent weeks. One of them was slightly injured in a Saturday afternoon traffic accident in one of the stolen cars. Stenerson was apparently not involved in the car thefts.

The boys told police they made three different trips to the White City bunkers on Oct. 16. Stenerson went with them only on the last trip, they said.

On Monday, the day after the theft, the boys said they exploded three sticks of dynamite near a mill pond on the outskirts of the city. They also exploded several dynamite caps, they said.

It is not yet known if the youths were responsible for a number of telephoned bomb threats that were reported to

police during the last few weeks, three of them at the high school. The third high school bomb threat was received by police on Friday, the day before the arrests. Police checked out the school, but found nothing.

Sheriff's deputies said today that the youths were apparently not responsible for the theft of dynamite and caps from a mine near Rogue River which happened on the same day as the thefts from the White City bunkers. That case is still under investigation, they said.

Nixon, in accepting Kennedy's challenge to the fifth debate, stipulated that it would be limited to the Cuban problem. Kennedy agreed to the condition but protested that it was a "gag" on pre-election discussion and said other issues also should be taken up.

Court Orders Further Study of Bible Decision

Pennsylvania Ruling Vacated

Washington - (UPI) - The Supreme Court today directed a federal district court in Philadelphia to take another look at a challenge to Bible reading in Pennsylvania public schools.

The brief order vacated a lower court decision which banned the readings under a "compulsory" reading law that has since been modified.

Further Proceedings
The Supreme Court ordered such further proceedings as "may be appropriate" in light of the amended statute.

The case was brought to the high court by Abington Township, Pa., school district which appealed a decision by a three-judge court for the eastern Pennsylvania federal district. The three judges had ruled unconstitutional a Pennsylvania state law which said a public school teacher must open each school day with the reading of 10 Bible verses or face dismissal.

The law was challenged by Mr. and Mrs. Edward L. Schempp, Roslyn, Pa., whose two children are students in Abington schools. The Schempps are members of the Unitarian church. They said some of the religious doctrines "purveyed by a literal reading of the Bible were contrary" to their religious and family teachings.

The law was amended last December to strike out the "compulsory" feature of the Bible session. It now requires a teacher to excuse any child from attending the Bible reading on written request of the parents.

Congo Capital At Mercy of Wild Soldiers

Leopoldville, The Congo - (UPI) - The capital of The Congo became a city of fear today at the mercy of wild and apparently leaderless Congolese soldiers.

Reports filtering out of "Le Belge" - the African quarter of modern Leopoldville - said 11 persons had been killed in a week end of terror.

The Congolese soldiers blocked entrances to the African section with troops and armored cars and prevented Europeans from entering the area to assess damage and count casualties.

The situation appeared to leave a power vacuum ripe for the return of Patrice Lumumba as premier or the emergence of a new strongman.

The United Nations command, which did nothing to stop the week end rampage, was reported trying to get members of parliament to meet again to try to establish some form of government.

The violence started Saturday night when Congolese soldiers clashed with civilian supporters of Lumumba. A soldier was reported to have been one of those killed.

Entered in Force
Sunday soldiers entered the African quarter in force, spraying machinegun and rifle shots through the streets, mauling pedestrians and pulling Lumumba supporters out of their homes.

Col. Joseph Mobutu, the army chief of staff who seized power Sept. 14, was not in the capital when the trouble started. He had flown to Coquilhatville, capital of the Equatorial Province.

USIA Report Said To Show Belief Russia Stronger

Sentiment Abroad Said Favoring Soviet

New York - (UPI) - A secret report of the U.S. Information Agency contains evidence of strong sentiment abroad that Russia now is militarily stronger than the United States, the Columbia Broadcasting System reported today.

CBS said the report also discloses "overwhelming belief" among America's allies that the Soviet Union will have a definite military edge over the United States in 1970.

Unimpeachable Source
CBS said it had obtained from "unimpeachable sources" details of the August 29 report from "unimpeachable sources" in Europe. Chairman J. William Fulbright of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee has been demanding that the State Department make the report public.

"The report includes opinions of the allied governments as well as public opinion polls abroad on a variety of questions connected with East-West military balance, to determine whether they consider Russia or the United States stronger today," CBS said.

"The reaction was mixed, with a slight edge for Russia. Favored in Germany

"On the question of who will be stronger in 1970, almost all of the respondents named Russia. Even in West Germany, one of the most pro-American of the nations, the polls came out favoring Russia over the United States."

The State Department and the USIA in Washington declined to comment on the CBS report.

CBS said the report was compiled by the Research Division of the United States Information Agency at the request of the military conference on public relations in Paris last summer.

Ike on Goodwill Mission to Mexico

Palm Springs, Calif. - (UPI) - President Eisenhower left this desert spa today for a goodwill mission to Mexico after a week end of leisurely golfing.

The President's jetliner lifted into the clear desert sky at the southern California resort at 7:46 a.m. (PST) for Laughlin AFB, Tex., the first leg of the trip to Ciudad Acuna.

A crowd of local officials and residents cheered as Eisenhower arrived at Palm Springs airport via helicopter from nearby La Quinta Sunday where he dedicated a new golf course.

The President accepted a box of new golf balls and promised to return to the spa early next year.

Michigan Governor Arrives in Valley

The men in the Kremlin are only going to recognize strength," Michigan Gov. G. Mennen Williams told a group of persons this morning at the opening ceremonies of the Ashland Citizens for Kennedy headquarters.

"The kind of strength they are going to recognize is not strong talk, but strong defense and a good educational system," the speaker continued.

He called Vice President Nixon's stand of "tough talk when dealing with the Russians" wrong. Governor Williams commented that Nixon has been stressing the importance of his travels in foreign countries and talks with heads of state as qualifications for the presidency.

Williams said that Kennedy had also talked with heads of foreign governments, including Khrushchev, and has traveled as extensively as Nixon.

Domestic Issues
"It isn't really important where you have been," the governor continued, "what matters is what you learned while you were there. Apparently Mr. Nixon didn't learn his lesson very well."

In contrast to Williams' talk on foreign policy, Congressman Edith S. Green, who accompanied the governor to the Rogue valley, spoke on domestic issues in the campaign. She said that she believes the Democrats will win in Oregon.

Following the event attended by about 40 persons, Williams told a Mail Tribune reporter that he thought that Kennedy did extremely well in the four nationwide television programs. He also forecast a Democratic victory in Michigan next month.

Governor Williams was met at the Medford airport this morning by representatives of the various Democratic organizations in the county. He was greeted by Roy Picard, a former Michigan resident. Traveling with Williams are two aides, Vic Navasky and Jack Withrich.

The governor attended a buffet luncheon at the Crown room in the Mark Antony hotel in Ashland and this afternoon, with Mrs. Green, was honored guest at a reception and coffee hour at the Medford hotel.

He will speak this evening at a Democratic rally in Portland and plans to be in Colorado Tuesday before returning to Michigan Wednesday.

Attack Would Start War III, Newspaper Says

Candidates Called 'Enemies, Liars'

Havana - (UPI) - Premier Fidel Castro's newspaper Revolution today warned the United States that any attack against Cuba could start World War III. It also stepped up attacks against both American presidential candidates by calling them "enemies" of Cuba and "liars."

The newspaper's front-page proclamation appeared to cover either a United States-launched or U.S.-supported attack. The newspaper strongly condemned Democratic presidential candidate John F. Kennedy's call for government and allied aid to overthrow the Castro regime, but made it clear that both he and Republican candidate Vice President Richard A. Nixon were "equally enemies" of Cuba.

Can't Be Topped
"As liars nobody can top either of them from what we've seen," the newspaper said. However, Revolution noted that Nixon's speech in answer to Kennedy shows "at last the Yankees are convinced that this business of the rockets would become the tragic truth (war) if they dared to land on our soil."

Bearded Premier Castro was due to address the closing session of the national association of rebel youth tonight.

Meanwhile, Cuban officials, radio and press whipped up fears that the United States was going to support an invasion against Cuba from Guatemala.

Public Support Sought
Observers said indications were that Castro's regime was fanning the invasion jitters to rally public support for some move against the United States, possibly a demand for the withdrawal from the Guantanamo naval base.

Invasion rumors have been sweeping Havana even though there was no evidence to back them up. The Communist newspaper Hoy and the pro-government publication EL Mundo featured interviews with the man-in-the-street Sunday asking what he would do in case of an attack on Cuba.

All responded in the same vein - saying they would fight the invaders to the bitter end.

Delegation To Meet Tuesday Afternoon

The Jackson county delegation to the Governor's Conference on Child Care and Youth will meet Tuesday, Oct. 25, at 3 p.m. in a board room of the Public Library of Medford and Jackson county.

About 12 persons from the county are expected to attend the conference in Salem Nov. 2, 3 and 4, according to Capt. William Ricken, chairman of the delegation.

Among those expected to attend the Tuesday meeting are student body presidents from Ashland, Medford and St. Mary's schools and representatives from the parent-teacher associations, county welfare, churches and chamber of commerce.

Salem - (UPI) - Gov. Mark Hatfield was off to California today to address the Bible Institute of Los Angeles tonight, and Thursday he flies to Minnesota and Michigan for a business conference and some campaigning.

Poison Bait Program To Be Explained at Friday Meet

G. M. Patterson, supervisor of rodent and predatory animal control for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, will explain his poison bait program at 8 p.m. Friday in the county courthouse auditorium.

County Commissioner Ralph James said the Hound Owners' association here has complained that the poison bait program is dangerous to dogs, birds and other than predatory animals.

During a meeting in the county court hearing room Friday afternoon County Commissioner Chester Wendt explained that the program was started last year on request of the Jackson County Stockmen's association and other farmers.

Patterson said three poison bait stations using 1080 poi-

son were set out last year in the Lake Creek area. From 8 to 12 stations will be set out this year, Patterson said, possibly in the Siskiyou area where coyotes are reported to be numerous.

Children cannot eat enough of the poison to kill them, Patterson said, and the poison cannot be transferred from one animal to another. Before the baits are put out the program is well advertised and the area well posted.

The poison bait program supplements the work of Government Hunter Kirby Tant, Brownsville, he explained. Otherwise, a second government hunter would be needed.

Coyotes in Jackson county seriously threaten livestock, particularly sheep, and the deer population, Patterson noted.
