## Grants Pass Tops Crater High 26-7

Outplayed through much of the first half but energized by a late second quarter break, the Grants Pass High school Cavemen edged the Crater Comets 26 to 7 Saturday night in a Southern Oregon conference football joust at the Medford stadium.

Through victory the Cavemen projected themselves into lone hold on first position in the conference standings, a half-game ahead of Oregon's No. 1 ranked prep football team, the Medford Black Tornado. Grants Pass now is 3-0 in District 6 A-1 and Medford stands 2-0.

The Climate city aggregation Saturday bludgeoned and hacked at a vulnerable point in the Crater ground defenses, made clutch pass completions and put to use two big breaks to thump the Comets of Central Point. Crater is now 0-2 in the loop.

Grants Pass tabulated on an eight-yard Bob Lewellyn to Larry Janssen pass, a 26-yard burst by Max Hull, a two-yard plunge by Harvey Graham and an 11-yard Lewellyn to Vic Van Koten passing play. Janssen booted two extra points. Crater, trailing 20 to 0, touchdown on a three-yard option run by Mike Glines and Glines tossed to Loyal Higginbotham to convert.

**Comets Control**  
Crater controlled the ball well into the second period, at one time having run 24 offensive plays to GP's nine, and led in plays 32 to 14 at the half. But, the Cavemen made the most of the one great first half opportunity handed to them and led 6 to 0 when the midway signal blared.

Twelve plays into the second quarter a 12-yard Lewellyn to Janssen pass opened the first real Grants Pass offensive bid. The two combined on a 31-yard aerial gain, putting the ball on the Comet 15-yard line. A clipping penalty backed the Cavemen to the 30. Hull got back to the 25. Lewellyn, trying to pass was "red dogged" and four black-jerseyed men dumped him on the 33. Dave Hauntz punted and Crater had the ball on its 14.

Two plays put it on the 17. Then the ball squirted from the arms of charging John Champ and Mel Atkins fell on it for Grants Pass on the Crater 24. Lewellyn reached the 19-yard line and Hull made it to the 10 on a double reverse. Hull went around end to the eight. A Tom Hatha-way to Hull heave was incomplete but Lewellyn hurled to Janssen along the left side of the end zone. There were 57 seconds left on the clock.

**Crater Threatens**  
Crater bid in the remaining seconds. Glines, Comet star of the night, broke loose on an option and ran 35 yards to the GP 26. Two passes failed and Glines broke free for 12 yards to the 14 when time ran out.

Grants Pass got the pigskin on its own 20 yard line early in the third quarter when a Glines punt went into the end zone. A face guard grabbing infraction on Crater placed the ball on the 35. The Cavemen, who found a weakness in the left side of the Comet defensive line, battered in nine plays to the Crater 26. From that point Hull shot through a big gap over his right tackle, and getting a block by Janssen, cut to the left and slanted across the goal.

Grants Pass next gained possession on the Crater 33 when Ken Marshall fell on a Wayne Martin fumble. Seven

plays carried the Cavemen to the Central Pointer seven. But they were back on their 13 when an illegal procedure penalty was stepped off. Then Lewellyn fumbled and Higginbotham recovered for Crater on the Comet 15.

**Twelfth Recoveries**  
Crater, after setting nowhere, had Glines punt to midfield and GP got back to the Comet 39. Fritz DeBono muffed and Harold Tweddel recovered for the Comets. Glines chucked a flat pass to Higginbotham, who was to throw downfield. Hemmed in by Cavemen and hit, Higginbotham flipped the ball wildly. It was snared by GP's Ken Bastian, an opportunist who rumbled to the Crater two before Skip Bogenoff brought him down. Two plays later Graham scored and Janssen kicked the bonus.

The Comets fired back after the kickoff. A face mask penalty on GP put the ball out to the Crater 44. It took 11 plays to get the lone Comet TD. Longest gain was a 13-yard, Glines to Champ pass. Glines and Champ did most of the ball toting with Joe McCalvy packing once.

Grants Pass had the ball on its own 39 after the kickoff. On the following scrimmage play, Lewellyn hit Janssen through the air good for 50 yards to the Crater 11-yard line. Another Lewellyn to Janssen toss misfired but the GP quarterback found Van Koten, on the next try, for a touchdown.

Crater was in GP territory when the game ended. A 17-yard run by Glines put the ball on the 39. A pass play failed and Glines was held for no gain on a keep as the closing horn sounded.

**Comets Head Early Stars**  
The Comets held Grants Pass to only 18 net yards from rushing in the first half while they were running up 107. GP had a 51 to 13 margin in passing but Crater led 120 to 69 in first half scrimmage gains. In the second half, however, GP outnetted the Central Point club 188 to 69 for a 257 to 189 full game advantage.

In first downs Crater headed 13 to 10. Glines was the top individual rusher of the fracas with 86 yards in 11 carries. His teammate, Champ went 50 for 15. Hull ran up 67 yards on 13 efforts for Grants Pass and Graham was 35 for 10.

## Fight Game Will Begin Comeback

New York - (UPI) - The fight game, practically dormant since June, begins a comeback this week with an interesting schedule that includes two title bouts.

Lightweight champion Joe Brown of Houston, Tex., makes his record-breaking ninth defense of the 135-pound crown against Cisco Andrade of Compton, Calif., at the Los Angeles Olympic auditorium Friday night. Their 15-rounder will be neither televised nor broadcast.

Freddie Gilroy of Belfast, Northern Ireland - bantamweight champion of Europe and the British Empire-fights Alphonse Halimi of France, ex-world champion, for the European version of the vacant world title at London, England, Tuesday night.

In the United States the national Boxing association will not recognize the winner as champion. The NBA prefers the victor in a later fight between Eder Jofre of Brazil and Eloy Sanchez of Mexico.

On Saturday night, light heavyweight champion Archie Moore engages Giulio Rinaldi of Italy at Rome in a non-title bout.

Also on Saturday night Frederico Thompson of Argentina, welterweight challenger, keeps sharp in a TV 10-rounder with Gaspar Ortega of Mexico at Madison Square Garden. Thompson is slated for a shot at Benny Kid Paro's 147-pound crown in the garden, Dec. 10.

In other games, the Toronto Maple Leafs skated off to a 3-1 victory over the Red Wings at Detroit and the Boston Bruins rallied to gain a 2-2 tie with the Chicago Black Hawks.

Bob Boozer picked up the pace after the intermission when he tallied 16 points. Cincinnati grabbed an early 6-4 lead and never was headed. The Royals led, 54-41, at halftime.

Charles L. McWhorter came within just one pin yesterday of the goal of every bowler. He rolled an almost perfect game with a tremendous 299 in a tele-

score sweepstakes at Medford lanes. McWhorter, wowing fellow keggers and spectators with one of the finest performances in many a day on the local scene, racked up 11 straight strikes. Then on his 12 ball, the No. 6 pin stood solid, robbing him of the coveted 300.

The near-perfect game was the high point of a terrific evening on the alleys for McWhorter. Averaged 224.7. Here are his scores for seven consecutive games yesterday: 217-202-235-214-299-193-213. That's a total 1573 for a per game average of 224.7.

McWhorter, who bowls in four leagues here during the week and in the traveling league on Sundays, says his average has ranged between 188 and 202. Top previous game of his career was a 275, rolled earlier this season.

In other league action, San Francisco State woke up in the fourth period Saturday and scored three times to defeat Nevada, 18-7, while Sacramento State rallied to defeat Chico State, 13-9.

## Fifth AFL Win Taken By Houston

Sammy Baugh, disconsolate as a coach can be after losing a ball game and two quarterbacks, commented in his best Texas drawl, "I dunno who can beat those Houston Oilers - unless it's Denver."

Baugh had just watched the Oilers bounce his New York Titans, 42-28, in the American Football league's top game Sunday, and his moroseness was tempered by an appreciation of Houston's class. "The way they're playing, I don't know who can beat 'em, unless it's Denver," he repeated. "The Broncos have a real good running game and just about as good passing as Houston."

Sunday's victory was the Oilers' fifth in six games and widened their lead in the Eastern division of the AFL. The runnerup Titans now are 4-3, which appears to leave Houston with easy sailing to the division championship.

Denver also gained ground atop the Western division standing by coming from behind in the last half to beat the Boston Patriots, 31-24. In the other league game, the Buffalo Bills scored their second win of the season, beating the Oakland Raiders, 38-9. Touchdown passes came in four for the three winning quarterbacks in the AFL, which is fast becoming a crowd-pleasing aerial circus.

that boosted the Detroit Lions to a 30-17 win over the Colts. Zeke Bratkowski's two last period touchdown passes enabled the Bears to tie the Los Angeles Rams, 24-24; a 43-yard field goal by rookie Bob Khatay in the last 44 seconds of play gave the Washington Redskins a 27-27 standoff with the Pittsburgh Steelers, and Gerry Perry's 18-yard field goal with 43 seconds remaining earned the St. Louis Cardinals a 12-10 victory over the winless Dallas Cowboys.

In the American Football league, the Houston Oilers beat the New York Titans, 42-28, and widened their Eastern division lead; the Denver Broncos pulled away in the Western division with a rallying 31-24 triumph over the Boston Patriots, and the Buffalo Bills trounced the Oakland Raiders, 38-9.

**Penalty Helps Eagles**  
Walston's winning field goal for the Eagles was set up by a pass interference penalty. Bobby Franklin of the Browns intercepted a pass by Norm Van Brocklin but interference with a pass receiver was called against Cleveland and the Eagles were given the ball on the Browns' 30-yard line.

Walston, who earlier had caught a touchdown pass and kicked three conversions, stepped back to the 38 and kicked the winning goal before a crowd of 64,850 at Cleveland. The Colts and Lions were locked in a 17-17 tie in the final quarter when Martin's field goals turned the course of the game at Detroit.

First, the 36-year-old former Notre Dame star kicked a 51-yarder that hit the crossbar and bounced over for three points. Then, after Detroit had recovered a Baltimore fumble, Martin tried another from the 40-yard line. He kicked the ball in the middle, instead of low, and it sailed on a line drive between the goal posts.

An 80-yard runback of a pass interception by Dick Lane a few minutes later clinched Detroit's first victory of the season. Johnny Unitas passed for two Baltimore touchdowns, and \$7,000-\$2,000 for each, and \$3,000 for first over-all.

**Moss Cops Grand Prix**  
Monterey, Calif. - (UPI) - Stirling Moss of Great Britain, driving a Lotus Monte Carlo, staged a brilliant exhibition for some 60,000 fans Sunday by sweeping all honors in the \$20,000 Pacific Grand Prix auto race. The slim Londoner won both 100-mile heats over the twisting, hilly Laguna Seca course and took overall honors. The victory was worth \$7,000-\$2,000 for each, and \$3,000 for first over-all.

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
