

# Cuba Seizes 167 More American Companies

## Candidates' Parade

**EDWARD MCGINTY**

I believe that all public offices should be conducted in the best interest of the people. The surveyor's office has not been conducted in this manner. It is for this reason that I have filed as the Democratic candidate for county surveyor.

The office of county surveyor has been dominated by one man for over a third of a century. During his unopposed term, my opponent and his relatives have been deputies in this office. Mr. Rynning, who formerly held the appointive position of county engineer and elective position of county surveyor, budgeted

**MARK E. BOYDEN**

Mark Boyden, 36, was born in the Rogue river valley, attended the Medford public schools, served with the armored infantry in the European theater in World War II, graduated in civil engineering from Oregon State college and resides in Medford with his wife and two children.

Since receiving his professional surveyor's license in 1951, Mark Boyden has gained an excellent reputation practicing exclusively in Jackson County.

The county surveyor is custodian of all official surveying records, which are the backbone of the county.

## Move Claimed in Reprisal for Embargo by U. S.

31 Categories Covered by Decree

Havana, Cuba - (UPI) - The revolutionary government announced the seizure and forced expropriation today of 167 American companies and firms in reprisal for the recently-imposed U.S. economic embargo against Cuba.

There was no immediate official estimate of the total value of the latest firms seized, but observers believed they were worth about \$200 million.

The decree virtually wipes out all important remaining American business interests in Cuba.

"Ten days ago Castro killed capitalism with the seizure of 282 firms and today he has given it the coup de grace," one businessman said.

**Criminal Aggressions**

The decree charges that the U.S. government "continues to carry out each day more unscrupulous criminal aggressions against the nation's (Cuba's) economy."

The decree covers 31 categories of companies from flour mills to dry cleaning establishments.

The decree was signed by Premier Fidel Castro and President Osvaldo Dorticos and specifically said the measure was imposed in response to the embargo imposed by Washington last week.

The move came only 10 days after Castro's regime took over another 282 firms in a drive that now has put virtually all private businesses and industrial enterprises in government hands.

"Among the 167 firms expropriated today are many which have been under intervention for the past several months.

But among the new ones are Burrum Flour, Coca Cola, Canada Dry, F. W. Woolworth, Sears, Roebuck & Co., General Electric, Westinghouse Electric, Remington Rand and International Harvester.

**Reynolds Included**

The new ones also include the Reynolds Aluminum Co., and 30 insurance companies representing such firms as Pan American Life Insurance, Home Insurance Co., Hartford Fire Insurance Co., Maryland Casualty Co. and the United States Life Insurance Co.

There also were a number of supermarkets and drug houses seized.

The seizures came in the middle of a massive campaign by the press, radio and government telling the Cuban people to prepare for a U.S.-sponsored invasion.

## Two Out of State Law Makers Will Campaign in Area

Visitors Scheduled To Arrive Friday

Two out of state law makers are expected in Jackson county Friday to campaign in behalf of Republican and Democratic candidates seeking office in the Nov. 8 general election.

Representative Chet Hollifield, Democratic congressman from California's 19th district, will arrive in Medford Friday morning on a campaign tour in behalf of Congressman Charles O. Porter, who is seeking reelection from Oregon's fourth district.

Porter and Democratic party officials will meet Hollifield at the Medford airport at 11 a.m. The two congressmen will share the platform at a noon luncheon at the Medford hotel sponsored by the Jackson County Democratic Central committee.

**Dinner Meeting**

They have a dinner meeting scheduled in Roseburg that day. Reservations for the Medford luncheon may be made by telephoning Democratic headquarters SPRing 3-4777.

Hollifield, who has been a congressman for 18 years, is a member of the joint commission on atomic energy, the post office and civil service committee and the Democratic study group. He attended the international conference on peaceful uses of atomic energy, and in 1959 was congressional advisor to the American delegation in Geneva.

The other out of state legislator is Senator Frank Carlson, Republican of Kansas, who will be in Jackson county Friday, Oct. 28. He will speak at a noon luncheon at Ashland in behalf of Republican candidates.

Senator Carlson also has talks scheduled in Klamath Falls and Grants Pass during his two-day visit to southern Oregon.

## Farmers' Problems Need Recognition, Gov. Williams Says

Harper Edwards, chairman of the Jackson County Democratic Central committee introduced Williams and Mrs. Green.

Williams took part in opening ceremonies of the Ashland Citizens for Kennedy headquarters Monday morning. He arrived at the Medford airport about 10 a.m.

He traveled to Portland late Monday afternoon to address a labor gathering. He will be in Colorado Tuesday and will return to Michigan Wednesday to be present when Presidential Candidate John F. Kennedy tours the state.

**Blames Benson**

Williams blamed Agriculture Secretary Ezra Taft Benson for what he termed "the dilemma of today's farmers."

"I promise that if John F. Kennedy is elected, he will be concerned with farm problems," Williams said.

Democratic Congresswoman Edith Green preceded Williams in addressing the gathering. She called this one of the most critical elections in history. "I don't know how we can afford to go through another 7 1/2 years of drift and complacency," Mrs. Green said.

Mrs. Green gave particular attention to domestic food surpluses existing. She mentioned that there is a \$9.5 billion food surplus today.

"However, there was only a \$2.5 billion surplus in 1952," she pointed out.

"The Democratic Congress appropriated \$250 million to be spent supplementing food supplies of low income families with inadequate diets," Mrs. Green said. "However, Eisenhower and Nixon never expended the money," she claimed.

Democracy had a registration edge of 55,581 in last May's primary.

Democrats in 1956 led in 24 counties and Republicans in 12. The Democratic lead this year in counties is 28-8.

Salem - (UPI) - Democrats in Oregon's fourth Congressional district outnumber Republicans by nearly 24,000 registered voters. It was shown today on the basis of complete but unofficial registration figures from the state elections department.

Registered Democrats total 121,238; Republicans 97,258, and "others" 4,498, for a total registration of 222,994 in the seven counties of the fourth district. The Democrats' lead is 23,980.

Democratic registrants outnumber Republicans in each of the seven counties. The biggest margin is in Joseph county, the smallest in Coos county.

## Revised Figures Show 73,316 Live In Jackson County

The population of Jackson county increased 25.3 percent during the period 1950-60, according to revised population estimates of Oregon cities and counties as of July 1, 1960.

The figures are based on the April 1 bureau of census preliminary reports, and were certified to the secretary of state by the Oregon state census board to determine the quarterly distribution of gasoline and liquor tax revenues.

There were 73,316 people in Jackson county as of July 1, the board said. This is an increase of 25.3 percent from the 58,510 in the April 1, 1950, federal bureau of census report.

Of the county total, 40,648 lived in incorporated areas, an increase of 28.7 percent over 1950's 31,577, while 32,670 lived in unincorporated areas of the county. Ten years there were 26,933 living in unincorporated areas.

## Strongman's Plan Could Result in Military Clash

Lumumba Claimed 'Legally' Deposed

Leopoldville, The Congo - (UPI) - Informed sources disclosed that United Nations forces have taken up positions along the Thysville-Leopoldville highway today in an effort to prevent Congolese strongman Col. Joseph Mobutu from bringing troop reinforcements into the capital.

The sources said the U.N. forces are armed with heavy equipment including anti-tank guns. If Mobutu presses ahead with plans to bring the 30-vehicle armored brigade from Thysville, a military clash could result.

**Warning Issued**

Gen. I. Rikhye, special military adviser to the U.N. forces, was reported to have issued a strong warning to Mobutu not to try to bring in the elite armored brigade.

Mobutu, whose grip over the Congo political situation has been slipping recently and whose Congolese army troops already in Leopoldville have been rampaging in drunken violence in parts of the city, apparently planned to bolster his position with the armored force.

The latest U.N. action seems to have been motivated by fears Mobutu wanted to use the armored brigade to put added pressure on the U.N. to push through his claims.

**Recognition Sued Refused**

Mobutu repeatedly and bitterly has complained that the U.N. has refused to recognize his regime and prevented him from arresting Lumumba.

The U.N. officially is pledged to support the Lumumba government.

Mobutu's council of high commissioners announced earlier in the day that it has a "legally" deposed Lumumba. And it warned that it might indict the U.N. before the International Court of Justice at the Hague if the U.N. refuses to recognize it as the Congo's only lawful authority.

## David Greenglass, Spy Conspirator, Will Be Released

Washington - (UPI) - David Greenglass, brother of executed atom spy Ethel Rosenberg, will be released from prison Nov. 16, a Justice Department official said today.

Greenglass, 38, was sentenced to 15 years in prison for conspiring with the Rosenbergs to steal atomic secrets for Russia. He is serving his time at the Lewisburg, Pa., federal penitentiary.

As star witness in the famous spy case, Greenglass helped convict his sister and brother-in-law, Julius Rosenberg. The couple was electrocuted in 1953 for slipping atomic secrets to the Soviets.

Greenglass was permitted to plead guilty to the lesser charge of conspiracy. He testified he gave a description of the A-bomb to Julius Rosenberg while working as a technical sergeant at the Atomic Research Center in Los Alamos, N.M., in 1945.

He started his prison sentence on July 6, 1951. Under the law, the mandatory date for his release is May 1, 1961. But a Justice Department official said he will be released Nov. 16 "because of credits for good behavior."

As a parolee, Greenglass will be under official federal supervision until Nov. 5, 1956. He is a New Yorker.

## Youth Bound Over To Grand Jury

James Leonard Stenerson, 19, of 2216 West Main st., Medford, was bound over to the grand jury this morning on charges of grand larceny.

Stenerson was arraigned in district court on charges of helping steal about 400 pounds of dynamite and more than 1,000 dynamite caps. He was originally lodged in the county jail last week end on charges of burglary not in a dwelling.

Three younger boys arrested in connection with the theft Saturday night were turned over to county juvenile authorities. All four are accused of taking the explosives from the White City ammunition dump last week.

The Jackson county sheriff's office, state police and Medford city police all worked on the case. Arrests came after the police were tipped off that one of the youths was seen with a dynamite cap.

## Health Department To Seek Help of Mill Owners in Mosquito Control Program

The Jackson county health department will seek the help of mill owners in keeping weeds and debris off ponds for better mosquito control, Chief Sanitarian Ori Moore said today.

It is impossible to force the DDT spray under the weeds and debris on the log pond surface, according to George Runyan, sanitarian in charge of mosquito control. Keeping log decks on the edges of ponds and dropping logs in "by the bundle" also makes any effective mosquito control difficult, he said.

Dusting by plane is not possible since the slightest breeze will cause the insecticide dust to drift onto nearby fields. This might affect animals such as dairy cows and beef animals or nearby crops, Moore explained.

"In most cases such areas had to be sprayed with hand equipment."

The health department purchased a machine in the last mosquito season which has 30 horsepower and puts out an initial wind velocity of 180 miles per hour. At 15 feet this drops to 10 to 15 miles per hour. The strong starting jet is necessary to break up the spray into fine penetrating particles, Moore explained.

Moore added that his department is concerned over log pond mosquito control since one spraying will last only two weeks, while another spot it will last a season. This is due to the log decks making it difficult to get equipment to the pond, and the debris on the pond surface, he said.

"Treatment applied to ditches, sumps and pools" was usually a one-time treatment, remaining effective for the rest of the season," Runyan
