

Oregon in Good Shape for Huskies

Eugene, Ore.—UPI—Oregon is in "the best physical shape of the season" for Saturday's battle with Washington, according to Coach Len Casanova.

Casanova, whose Ducks lost a 13-12 decision to the Rose Bowl champs last year, said he expects to have every player available for the Washington contest. Both Huskies and Ducks are 5-1 on the year.

Oregon Tackle Weekly Winner

San Francisco—UPI—Steve Barnett of Oregon was just another hopeful sophomore at spring practice but today he is the United Press International West Coast lineman of the week as a result of his rock-solid play Saturday against California.

The six foot, one inch, 233-pound right tackle from Fremont, Calif., was the anchor in Oregon's line as it turned back thrusts on the nine and 11 yard lines to preserve a 20-0 shutout over the Bears.

After the game, Barnett was voted the game's top lineman by a 3-1 majority. Veteran sports-writers were edified by the way he broke through to make tackles and keep Oregon's defenses shored up.

"It was the outstanding game of his life," coach Len Casanova said afterward. Barnett also showed good speed and blocked in his usually hardnosed style.

Dale Messer, Fresno State's dynamic halfback, earned the UPI back of the week honor Monday. He scored three touchdowns in leading the Bulldogs to a 35-13 win Saturday night over Los Angeles State and continued to be a big reason why the team is unbeaten and untied in five games.

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Hawkeyes Again Top Grid Poll

By United Press International New York—UPI—Iowa's hustling Hawkeyes opened a 50-point lead over Mississippi today in the United Press International weekly major college football ratings.

Twenty-two members of the 35-man UPI Board of Coaches selected Iowa as the nation's No. 1 team while Mississippi garnered only seven first place votes compared to 16 in last week's balloting.

The Hawkeyes, who replaced Ole Miss in first place last week by a slim six-point margin, totaled 331 points while the Rebels remained second with 281.

Defending champion Syracuse retained third place with 258 points, Minnesota replaced Navy as the No. 4 team with 208 points and the Mid-dies dropped to fifth place with 185.

One Newcomer Rounding out the top 10 were Missouri 175, Baylor 149, Ohio State 145, Washington 59 and Michigan State 26.

Michigan State was the only newcomer to the top 10, moving from 13th to 10th place. Purdue skidded from eighth to 14th place after dropping a 21-14 decision to Iowa.

Tennessee headed the second 10 group and was followed in order by Rice, Arkansas, Purdue, Kansas, Duke and New Mexico State. Wyoming and Colorado tied for 18th place votes, Iowa picked up nine second-place ballots, two third-place votes and two fourth-place votes. The points are distributed on the basis of 10 for a first place vote, nine for second place, etc.

Kansas Next Foe Iowa's victory over Purdue was its fifth straight of the season. The Hawkeyes next play Kansas, which has lost only to Syracuse in six games.

Mississippi has a Saturday date with Louisiana State's former national champions in a rematch of their Sugar Bowl meeting last New Year's Day while Syracuse runs into always-dangerous Pittsburgh.

Minnesota, which has advanced from eighth to fourth place in the last two weeks, prep for its showdown meeting with Iowa Nov. 5 against weak Kansas State Saturday and Navy runs into Notre Dame at Philadelphia.

Halfback Cleveland Jones: "I think we can do it this season and I'll give it all I can to beat them."

End Dale Herron: "I'm getting tired hearing about last year's Washington team. I think our team is really ready for this one."

Tornado Junior Varsity Subdues Grizzlies 27-6

Medford high junior varsity gridders bounced Ashland 27 to 6 here last night on the strength of its domination of the first half.

Jack Lowery, Frank Van Pelt, Mike Neathamer and Jim Bandy touched down for the unbeaten junior Tornado which chalked up its seventh straight victory of the season. Dan Miles knicked two extra points and Bill Heyerman one.

Gale Tepper poked into the end zone for the Grizzlies, who failed in their extra point attempt when a Howard Johnson to Tepper pass was knocked down.

Medford ran up a 27 to 0 margin before Ashland crossed the Tornado goal. It was 6 to 0 at the quarter and 20 to 0 at the half. Fourth Medford TD was in the third canto.

Outgaining Ashland 246 to 104 net yards from scrimmage, the junior Tornado collected 159 net in the first half while restraining the Grizzlies to 11. Medford had the ball for 42 scrimmage plays to Ashland's 13 in the first half. In the second half, however, this statistic favored the Bruins 35 to 19 and Ashland had 92 net scrimmage yards to Medford's 87.

Second Over Ashland It was the second win for Medford over Ashland which beat the Grizzlies 13 to 6 early in the season.

There was no score in the scuffle until just before the first quarter ended. Medford turned its second series with the ball into a touchdown, driving in 16 plays from its 25-yard line, hampered once by a five-yard penalty. Van Pelt, Lowery, Roy Ross and Miles alternated with the totting and Lowery went over from about the one-foot mark.

Lowery went around right end for 12 yards and Miles scooted 11 yards on a keep for the best gains. Ross picked up nine and eight yards on reverses and a Miles to Lowery pass made nine. There were six first downs on the march.

Next opportunity for the Medfords came in the early second canto when John Mee, a Nick Gier blocked a Rick Kester punt and Lloyd Hammons fell on the ball on the Pelt gained to the 11 and Lowery to the seven in two tries. A face guard penalty put the ball on the Ashland three and Van Pelt went or from there with Miles adding the bonus.

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Winners Share of World Series Pot Is \$286,500; Lowest in Seven Years

New York—UPI—The 1960 World Series between the Pirates and Yankees will long be remembered as one of the oddest in the history of the fall classic.

It should also be remembered as the one in which one of the greatest number of players and other team personnel shared in financially.

The generous Pirates whacked up their winner's share of \$286,500.22 into full shares of \$8,417.94, while the equally generous Yankees divided their loser's purse of \$191,000.56 into full shares of \$5,214.64.

Smallest Since 1953 The Pittsburgh winning share is the smallest since 1953 when each member of the Yankee team which beat the Dodgers in six games got a check for \$8,280.68. This year's loser's share was the lowest since 1952 when the Dodgers each received \$4,200.64.

Besides the 22 players who voted the Series split for the Pirates, manager Danny Murtagh and his coaching staff of Bill Burwell, Sam Narron, Frank Ocek, Mickey Vernon

and George Sisler also will get full shares, along with clubhouse man John Hallahan and trainer Danny Whalen.

Six other players, most of whom spent part of the season with the Pirates, will receive half shares of \$4,208.97, coach Leonard Levy will get a quarter share along with pitcher Earl Francis, and bat-boy Bobby Recker will get a check for \$1,000.00.

Fifty Get Shares A total of 50 players and other team personnel shared in the Pittsburgh melon, including a \$250.00 check for groundskeeper Eddie Dunn. If it weren't for the fact that the shares are voted on before the Series, Dunn conceivably could have come in for a bigger check, since many observers credit him with tailoring the Forbes Field infield to the exact capabilities of the Pirates' fielders.

Certainly, one of the most generous acts on the part of the Pittsburgh players was their voting a full share to Sisler, the Hall of Famer who never before had shared in World Series swag. Sisler, a batting instructor, travels with the Bucs, sits in the stands, observes hitting style and then gives advice. Significantly, the Pirates batted .276 as a team during the regular season.

A total of 52 shared in the Yankee cutup. Besides the 22 players doing the voting, Stengel and his coaching staff of Ralph Houk (now manager), Frank Crossetti and Eddie Lopat, trainer Gus Mauch, assistant trainer Joe Soares and clubhouse man Pete Sheehy also will receive full shares. It marked the first time that the players had voted Sheehy a full share since he has been with the club dating back about 25 years.

Houk Chooses Sain To Coach Yank Hurlers

New York—UPI—New York Yankee manager Ralph Houk had the nucleus of a coaching staff today and was expected to complete his board of strategy by mid-week.

Houk, who avowed he would run his own team when he succeeded Casey Stengel, Monday selected Johnny Sain as "my type of pitching coach."

Veteran third base coach Frank Crossetti was re-hired for his 30th consecutive season with the Yankees. Other possibilities to round out the staff include Jim Hegan, Hank Bauer and Tommy Henrich.

Sain, who formed a potent pitching combination with Warren Spain in the National League a decade ago, replaces Eddie Lopat. A 43-year-old former Braves and Yankee hurler, Sain retired from active competition five years ago.

"I was out in the Yankee bullpen with Sain for several years," Houk said, "and I know and agree with the theories he had on pitching. Sain had to fight his way to the top and he learned a lot about pitching doing it."

Sain, who stayed out of baseball last season, said the Yankee job was one of the few he would accept. His last assignment was as a Kansas City coach in 1959.

Dickie Moore Tops NHL Scoring Race

Montreal — UPI — Two-time scoring champion Dickie Moore, one of six Montreal Canadiens on the National Hockey League's top ten scoring list, leads the circuit's point makers today with 14. The 28-year-old left winger was blanked in his last three games, but his nine goals and five assists were still good enough to give him a two-point lead over two teammates — Bernie Boom-Boom Geoffrion and Jean Beliveau, and Norm Ullman of Detroit — all with 12 points, official statistics showed today.

Chicago goalie Glenn Hall, off to one of his best seasons, has been the sharpest of the league's net minders. In eight games he has given up only 13 goals for a sparkling 1.62 goals-per-game average.

Luis Arroyo, whose clutch relief pitching late in the season was instrumental in the Yankees winning the American League pennant, will get a three-quarter share of \$3,910, while Dale Long, the pinch-hitter deluxe purchased for the Giants for the stretch drive, will get a two-thirds share of \$3,476.

The Baltimore Orioles, who finished second in the AL race, will receive \$1,564.68 for each full share, while the Milwaukee Braves, second in the NL, will receive full shares of \$1,527.75 each.
