UPI Cites Husky Gridiron Tutor

Seattle, Wash. - (UPI) - The halftime score stood at 22-7 and the mighty Washington Huskies, champions of the 1980 Rose Bowl and football terror of the West Coast, had been taking a royal clobbering on the ground, in the air and on the scoreboard.

The Huskies had figured Oregon State college to be tough, but this was ridiculous. The Washington locker room was like a morgue and all that was needed was a eulogy. Burial services were delayed until later that afternoon.

But one man who wasn't at all ready to give up the ghost was the coach, Jim Owens, named by the United Press International today as college football's "Coach of the Week."

Owens had no tricks up his sleeve to fire up enthusiasm. Nor did he cite any individuals for whom the Huskies could go out there and win. He didn't even bowl out the squad.

"We'll go out there and fourth-quarter them," was about the substance of his "pep-talk." He'd used it before, and it had worked. Now, he used it again, and again it worked.

In deed, Washington did "fourth-quarter" the Beavers and when the final gun barked, the Huskies had won the game, 30-29. George Fleming's kick for the extra point with just a little more than two minutes to play was the margin.

Kasso's Playing Still Doubtful

Corvallis, Ore. - (UPI) - Don Kasso, the Beavers' regular tailback before being injured two weeks ago, worked out Tuesday for the first time since his injury. But he is still a doubtful participant against California Saturday.

The Beavers drilled Tuesday on pass defense.

High-Rated Clubs Solid Favorites

New York - (UPI) - Iowa and Mississippi, the nation's top-rated college football teams, were solid favorites to retain their perfect records on Saturday.

Iowa, No. 1 in this week's UPI balloting, is a 12 1/2 choice over Kansas, and the second-ranked Rebels are picked by 15 points over Louisiana State. The Hawkeyes are unbeaten in five games while

Ole Miss has knocked over six opponents.

In the only contest matching teams in the top 10, the 10th-ranked Spartans of Michigan State are a slim 1 1/2 point pick over eighth-ranked Ohio State.

Syracuse, last year's national champion and currently ranked third, is favored by 10 points over Pittsburgh and fourth-ranked Minnesota is a prohibitive choice over Kansas State. No odds were quoted on this game.

The other members of the top 10 are also big choices to win this week. Fifth-ranked Navy is picked by 14 over Notre Dame, sixth-ranked Missouri is 14 over Nebraska, seventh-ranked Baylor is 8 1/2 over Texas Christian, and ninth-ranked Washington is 8 over Oregon.

West: Southern California 11 over Stanford, Oregon State 14 1/2 over California, UCLA 9 1/2 over North Carolina State, Oklahoma 1 over Colorado.

Baylor, looking better than ever in his third season in the league, scored 36 points, hit 14 of his 27 shots from the floor, made 8 of 10 charity tosses and leaped for 17 rebounds. His performance paced Los Angeles to a 120-118 victory over the New York Knicks.

Gabe Paul Given Reins At Houston

Houston, Tex. - (UPI) - Gabe Paul, a man who rose through the ranks from batboy to baseball executive, today took over the reins of the National league's new Houston franchise.

He was hired away from the Cincinnati Reds, where he has served as vice president and general manager since Sept. 27, 1951.

Paul signed a three-year contract with the Houston Sports association (HSA) just eight days after the organization was included in NL expansion plans along with New York.

He flew into Houston last night, and George Kirksey, executive secretary of the HSA, said he would be introduced to Houston fans at a luncheon Thursday.

Holds Red Stock

Paul, who has been a minority stockholder in the Reds, will give up his stock. One of the major contenders for his vacated post is expected to be Paul Florence, Paul's executive assistant.

Kirksey said hiring Paul was the first of "several important moves" planned this fall and winter to build a "strong major league organization and a competitive team for Houston's entry into the National league in 1982."

He said Paul was the Houston group's first and unanimous choice.

Washingtonians Hit Textbooks

Humboldt State Is Humming

San Francisco - (UPI) - A football dynasty, the likes of which hasn't been seen since the days of Centre College, is under construction at little Humboldt State - far up in the redwood big tree country of Northern California.

It was just 10 years ago that the Lumberjacks decided they should do something about their team. They not only didn't win a game the year before, but they didn't even score a touchdown.

Ex-Cougar Mentor

So they got hold of a fellow named Phil Sarboe, former head coach and a good one at Washington State. Sarboe came down and took over.

Today the Lumberjacks have won 15 games in a row—the longest winning streak of any four-year school in the West.

"Sarboe has good contacts among the high schools of the area and they send us most of their best players," says Don O'Kane, chief tub-thumper for the school. O'Kane happens also to be publisher of the only two daily newspapers in Humboldt County.

"We get very few players from out of the immediate vicinity. But most of our lads are strong and used to hard work. They all are working their way through school."

The most colorful performer on the team is a man named Manual Pappy Simas, aged 27. Pappy also has seven children. He recently quit his job in a sawmill to take a job as a bartender because it was closer to his home. He comes out to practice only two nights a week—one hour per night. It happens that Pappy

weighs 260 pounds on a 5-11 frame. And nobody has moved him around in the line yet.

While the other athletes are younger and lighter, they all hold jobs. Practice at the school is only one hour per night - starting at 8:15 and held in the big field house.

Most of the athletes look forward to an outdoor life. The major departments at Humboldt State, which has an enrollment of only 2,100, are in forestry and wildlife.

This little school recently knocked off San Francisco State, which had won 13 in a row at the time. The big city school has an enrollment of about 12,000. Up in Eureka they consider this quite a feat.

Sarboe, unlike most coaches, does all the work himself. And in addition, he teaches

physical education classes all day.

In his 10 years on the scene at Humboldt State, his clubs have won 64 games, lost only 25 and had 3 ties. His lifetime college coaching record is 99-41-3.

In addition to coaching and teaching at the school, the Sarboe family makes another contribution. Phil's wife, a nurse, is on the college medical staff.

Sarboe's son, Joe, is a star high school quarterback. And the big guessing game around the area right now is whether young Joe will go to his old man's school - or seek brighter lights.
