

# Kansas Put on Probation; NCAA Lifts Bans on Three

San Francisco - (UPI) - The high cost of financing Will (The Stilt Chamberlain) and other less-publicized athletes today put University of Kansas' sports program on two years of probation by the NCAA.

The policy-directing Council of the NCAA, finishing off

three days of sessions Wednesday, made these decisions:

Lifted the probation bans on University of Mississippi, North Carolina State and University of Wyoming.

Placed Kansas' basketball team on probation for two years and the football team on probation for one year. The national champion-

ship track and field team was not involved.

No Track Qualms  
Walt Byers, executive secretary of the NCAA, refused to name the players involved in the investigation that led to the probation for Kansas. But A. C. (Dutch) Lonberg, athletic director for the school, felt no such qualms.

The basketball ban was brought about because "a player was given a car with a net value of \$1,564" plus mechanical work he did not pay for.

"This was Chamberlain," said Lonberg. The incident occurred in May of 1957.

The football ban came because a non-university man, an alumnus, took a player from another school to the All-Star football game in the summer, and because the university had attempted to recruit three student-athletes from another university without first getting permission from the athletic director of that school.

## EP Building Up Defense For Pirates

Eagle Point - Building a defense strong enough to cope with the speed and power the Phoenix high backfield has been an objective of Eagle Point footballers this week.

They oppose the Pirates at Eagle Point Friday in a game that will determine which of the two will go on into the playoff for the District 6 A-2 diadem. Rogue league banners is at stake in the 8 p.m. combat.

Also, the Eagles have been sharpening their ground offense which has been doing well all season. This ball packing has been led by Bill Skeeters with 68 carries and 419 yards for 6.2 yards per carry. Top average is sported by Steve Geren. It's 7.2 out of 32 carries and 230 total yards. Other figures show Mike Palm 23-156-6.8, Tom Perdue 36-99-2.6 and Gary Ayers 11-32-2.9.

Skeeters has scored six touchdowns, Palm five, Perdue three and Geren two.

Coach Vern Steward has described the squad's overall physical condition as good with no serious injuries resulting from the Henley game.

Call to slow down the Pirate attack may go to a choice among Ron Weidman, Charles Pomeroy, Denny Chamberlain and Bill Pfeiffer at ends; among Dennis Loper, Dick Wilson, Marvin Cothrin and Don Peska at tackles; among Gary Ayres, Ray Peterson, Dick Ayres and Gary Sheldon, guards, and among Perdue, Palm, Roy Moore, Skeeters, Richard Hertager, Gary Stelle and Geren in the backfield. Bill Hoeft is expected to see service at guard.

Eagle backs have intercepted 15 passes of their opponents this season.

For offense EP starters may be Weidman and Pomeroy at ends, Ga / Ayres and Peterson at tackles, Wilson and Moore at guards, Peska at center; Perdue at quarterback, Palm at fullback and Geren at tailback.

Those slated for offensive action, also, include tackle Cothrin, guard Sheldon, fullback Hertager and end Pfeiffer.

But against Oregon, the Rooks may have to play without the services of their only tailback on the squad, left-hander Rick Shields from Woodland, Calif. Shields has a shoulder injury.

## Reserve Board Eases Credit

Washington - (UPI) - The Federal Reserve Board has eased credit in two actions designed to assure a plentiful supply of money for consumers and businessmen in the pre-Christmas shopping season.

The board Wednesday announced the two technical moves liberalizing rules governing bank reserves. They will go into effect Nov. 24 and Dec. 1.

The board estimated the changes would pump into the 6,200 commercial banks belonging to the federal reserve system about \$1.3 billion of new reserves with which to provide the public with cash and to make loans.

The board estimated its action would enable the banks to make up to \$2.1 billion in new loans as well as provide the extra amounts of cash demanded by merchants and shoppers during the holiday season.

Portland - (UPI) - Bob Pannel of Oregon College of Education leads in rushing and Dick Ollvas of title-bound Oregon Tech tops the passers, Oregon Collegiate conference statistics showed today.

Pannel has 323 yards in 97 carries while Al Barnes of Southern Oregon, who has a better average, is second in yards gained with 317 in 64 carries.

Ollvas has completed 28 of 63 passes for 448 yards and four touchdowns. Doug Olsen of Southern Oregon has completed 27 out of 50 passes for 411 yards and four TD's. Howard Hartman of SOC has 24 pass receptions and also is tied with Pannel in scoring with 30 points.

## Babe Ruth Marks May Be Tumbled

New York - (UPI) - The immortal Babe Ruth, whose home run records have withstood a 30-year onslaught by two generations of musclemen, may be reduced to mere mortality in future record books with the advent of a 162-game schedule.

There can be little doubt that with 388 games tagged on to the major league schedules each year due to the expansion, many records will go toppling faster than managerial jobs. The most vulnerable of the statistics will likely be those of attendance and individual club records.

But it is the glamor numbers, such as the legendary 60 and "insurmountable" 714, that will draw most public attention. The 60 represents Ruth's single season home run high, while the 714 signifies his career total.

Hank Greenberg hit 58 homers in 1938 and Hack Wilson slugged 56 in 1930. Either one might have passed Ruth's season high if he had had eight extra games. The next man to have a comparable year at the plate could break the 33-year-old milestone with the aid of the increased schedule.

Extra 120 Games  
No one has yet come near the Bambino's career mark, the closest being Jimmy Foxx, with 534, but future stars who last 15 years in the big time will have at least 120 extra games in which to aim at the record once thought unreachable.

Modern players also will get the added chance to wipe out other long-standing marks, such as the 190 runs batted in by Wilson in 1930, the 177 runs scored by Ruth in 1921, the 257 base hits by George Sisler in 1920, and so on through the small print of the record books.

Pitchers should enjoy added prominence as well. The eight extra games will mean two, and possibly even three, extra starts per season for a top hurler, and could be just the necessary ingredient for a 20- or 30- victory season or a strikeout record.

## Solomon Keeps Rushing Pace

Portland - (UPI) - Stan Solomon of Willamette, with 764 yards in 107 carries, continued to lead Northwest conference football rushers today.

He was far ahead of his nearest rival, Mickey Hergert of Lewis and Clark, who had 614 yards in 90 carries.

Pacific's passing combination of Bob Light to Bob Wendell topped the aerial game. Light has completed 83 of 155 passes for 986 yards and nine touchdowns. Wendell has caught 46 passes for 653 yards and five touchdowns.

Light was named the back of the week by conference coaches while Stu Hall of Willamette won lineman of the week honors.

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## Kiwanis Kids Day At Tussle

Oregon State College, Corvallis - It's the 6th annual Kiwanis Kids Day at Parker stadium Saturday when Oregon State's battling Beavers face California - and some 3000 youngsters likely will be on hand to cheer Tommy Prothro's team.

Under provisions of Kiwanis Kids Day, supervised groups of youngsters of grade school and high school age are admitted into the game at half price.

Reservations already have been received from nearly a thousand youngsters, including the Monument high school football team which will travel nearly 300 miles to the game. Minimum number of youngsters is 10 per group.

## Campbell Sets Receiving Pace

New York - (UPI) - Hugh Campbell of Washington State is running far ahead of all major college rivals in pass receiving, but Dick Fitzsimmons of Denver enjoys just a microscopic edge over Pittsburgh's Fred Cox for the punting leadership.

According to official statistics released today by the service bureau of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, Campbell, who has led pass receivers for four straight weeks, also leads in aeriels completed for touchdowns with six.

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## Douglas May Handle Deportation Appeal

Washington - (UPI) - Sen. Wayne Morse, (D-Ore.), said Wednesday the Supreme Court may act Friday on the latest appeal to stop deportation of two Portland, Ore., men.

Morse's office here said Justice William O. Douglas probably will handle the case of William A. Mackie and Hamish S. MacKay. After a U.S. Court of Appeals in San Francisco refused to halt deportation, lawyers for the two men telegraphed an appeal to Douglas.

Morse said he was trying to get Secretary of State Christian Herter to recommend clemency.

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
