Project for UN Fund Scheduled in Gold Hill

Gold Hill — Boys and girls in this community will participate in the annual Halloween project for the United Nations International Children's Emergency fund.

The local UNICEF project sponsored by the Gold Hill Parent-teacher association is in conjunction with the nationwide program. It has been endorsed by parents and leaders throughout the United States to give youngsters an opportunity to help those who are hungry and ill. Mrs. Ogdan Kellogg is chairman for the event in this area.

Mrs. Kellogg reported that children who wish to take part in the drive here this year may pick up the official UNICEF coin cartons between Friday and Monday afternoons at one of three grocery stores on Second ave.: Gail's Gold Hill Market, Lester's Grocery and Cogswell's Market. Parents are asked to accompany their child when they sign for the cartons. Parents will be responsible to see that their child's unopened UNICEF coin cartons will be returned to Mrs. Kellogg at Hanby Elementary school on Tuesday morning.

Mrs. Kellogg stressed that the penny collection for UNICEF project is optional and that those youngsters participating will do so only on a volunteer basis. The offer of "Trick or Treat" by householders as well is optional. She also urged parents to remind their youngsters to work only in their own neighborhoods for UNICEF collections.

Last year on Halloween youngsters in 10,000 communities took part in UNICEF projects throughout the United States. One and a half million dollars was collected to help 55 million youngsters and mothers of over 100 governments. Undeveloped countries who are in need of milk, medicine, clinics, training and education apply to UNICEF for help. Funds are also provided to buy drugs for those who are suffering from leprosy, as well as to develop protein food products such as soy beans, sesame, fish, flour, etc. in these underdeveloped countries.

Newman plans to send a sample of gold flakes mined at U Do It Gold Mining on Sardine creek to the Geological Museum at Leningrad, Russia. He presented the gold ore specimens from Russia to Mr. and Mrs. Walter E. McClain, owners of the Alderbrook Cafe and U Do It Gold Mining where it will be permanently displayed to give the public an opportunity to see and appreciate it.

Newman said that he is leaving this rare collection with McClain because of his great interest in gold mining. McClain teaches gold mining by the original rocker box placer method to tourists from all parts of the world who visit this unusual southern Oregon attraction each year.

Newman said he first became acquainted with McClain when he was traveling through southern Oregon and stopped to visit this and other well known tourist attractions on Sardine Creek road. Fascinated by the gold mining, he since has returned whenever the opportunity presented itself. Arriving here late Tuesday afternoon, he was a guest of the McClains until Thursday.

Collects Samples

Newman is married and the father of three sons. He has been interested in collecting gold ore specimens and placer mining for 14 years. He has collected specimens of gold quartz from Alaska, all parts of the United States and Mexico. Although his home is in Winslow, Ariz., he works in Oakland, Calif. He is employed as a truck driver moving GMC products to all parts of the country, he said.

Newman suggested that if any mining engineer is interested in sending samples of gold quartz to the Geological Museum in Leningrad, they may inform him of their offer by writing to him at his home address P.O. Box 1381, Winslow, Ariz., for information.
