

Black Tornado, Grizzly Grid Scuffle at Ashland Tonight

"While nobody has even given the Tornado much more than a brisk workout so far this season, if the Grizzlies keep like they have been, Medford could have just about all the football it will want come Friday evening."

That word of warning to the Medford High school football team, No. 1 ranked in all state polls, was sounded earlier this week by sports writer Glen Prescott in the Ashland Daily Tidings.

Ashland's Grizzlies and the Black Tornado battle tonight in a Southern Oregon conference event set for 8 p.m. on Ashland's Walter Phillips field. Medford enters as favorite on the basis of its unmarred record and lopsided triumphs in every game.

Just what factor the weather will play in the fracas was not certain this morning. The weather bureau anticipated partly cloudy skies tonight but no rain around game time. It's what showers may do in the earlier part of the day that will determine the condition of the field.

Offense Success Key
A lightly dampened field shouldn't make much difference but wet conditions could slow both clubs which rely much on speed and quickness. Medford does have power in its single wing which should serve to its advantage.

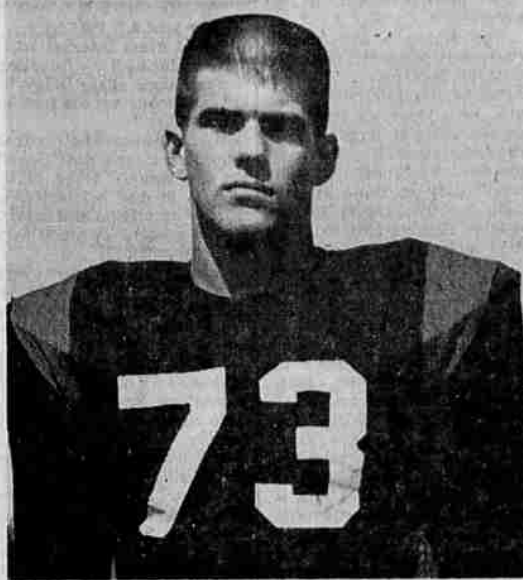
Offense has been the key to success for both clubs this season. Five touchdowns have been the Medford minimum. Its defense aided by allowing no more than one touchdown in any game. Ashland has yielded as many as three and four touchdowns and relied on its attack to offset the rival scoring.

Ashland will match the running of break-away speedster Bob Voris and Forrest Farmer, the plunging of Ron Schol- ar and the passing of Voris and Doster against a versatile Black Tornado backfield.

Medford features the speed and power running of Phil Humphreys, Mike Hood and Dan Sieg, all who have break-away ability and the passing of Dick Ragsdale and Hood. Both clubs have passing threats with Medford's offering a bit more versatility.

Greater squad depth is a Medford asset.
Two Common Rivals
The teams have met two common foes. Medford has wins of 49 to 6 over Klamath Falls and 48 to 6 over Crater. The Grizzlies have topped those clubs 20 to 12 and 27 to 26.

Ashland demonstrated its unpredictability along with a threat to the Black Tornado last week when it beat Del Norte 37 to 19. The Grizzlies earlier had lost to Grants Pass

The Lithia city team seeks its first win over Medford since 1947. Prescott, in the Ashland Tidings, reports that the Grizzlies have not won from Medford at Ashland since 1929—31 years ago.

There's another angle to the game. Stan Smith, now in his first season as Ashland coach, is an ex-Medford High school lineman. Anier Smith, now playing for Medford high, a defensive lineman, could spell some trouble for the Grizzlies although he's sporting a broken finger.

Winter Angling Rules Effective On November 1

Portland—Oregon anglers are reminded that Monday, Oct. 31, is the end of the general summer angling season, and as of Nov. 1 winter angling rules will go into effect.

Winter angling rules may be found in the angling synopsis beginning on page 40, and only those waters listed by zone will be open during the winter season. Anglers will also find that almost without exception, fishing deadlines under the winter rules are dropped downstream to protect the upstream spawning areas.

Bag limit on trout, salmon, and steelhead for the winter season is 2 fish 12 inches or over per day, 4 such fish in possession or in 7 consecutive days. Anglers are also reminded that in addition to the regular angling license, a salmon license is also required to fish for salmon and steelhead.

Richest Horse Races Saturday

Camden, N.J.—Robert Lehman's Ambipose was added Thursday to the probable field for Saturday's running of the Garden State Stakes, the world's richest race, which could gross \$287,970 if all 16 go postward.

Ambipose was named from Belmont Park today to begin working out on the Garden State Track. Trainer Tommy Waller said Larry Adams would ride the surprise starter in the mile and one-sixteenth event.

Crater High Ninth Trips McLoughlin

Crater High school freshmen clipped McLoughlin of Medford 19 to 0 at Central Point last night and claimed the trophy emblematic of the first official ninth grade football championship among Southern Oregon conference schools.

The Little Comets wrapped up their 1960 campaign with a 5-win, one-loss record. McLoughlin suffered its first loss in five scrimmishes but has twice been tied. The Bulldogs close out 1960 play on Nov. 5 against crosstown rival Hedrick.

Crater's victory was decisive last night. The Central Pointers marched to second quarter touchdown, stopped McLoughlin after it reached the Comet 19 yard line, then dominated the rest of the way. Score was 7 to 0 at the half and 13 to 0 after three cantos.

The Comets outgained McLoughlin 325 to 126 in net scrimmage yards and had the Bulldogs in first downs 13 to 6.
75-Yard Push
Sherm Kiger ended a 75-yard Crater promenade when he took a flip from Darrell Summerfield and skirted the left flank for nine yards and a score. Vern Swanson slanted over the right side of the line for the extra marker. The drive actually began in the first quarter and took 16 plays. Longest run was 11 yards by Swanson.

The Comets then tabulated just four plays after the second half kickoff which Summerfield ran back to the Crater 41. Kiger made three yards and Swanson eight to the Mac 48-yard line. Denny Ryerson packed to the Bulldog 40. Then Swanson slanted over the right side of the line and romped away to the goal. Ryerson was stopped short of the pay stripe in the conversion effort.

After the Crater kick, Mac got a first down on its 46. Mike Barnes kept and fought some 39 yards down to about the CP 15 but a procedure penalty nullified the run. Held, Mac quick-kicked on third down and Crater took over on its 34. The Central Point eleven moved up to the Bulldog 36. Kiger broke away on a reverse 29 yards to the Mac seven but fumbled and Cliff Roberts recovered for the Medford team.

Swanson Scores
McLoughlin netted six yards in three plays and kicked with Swanson's 12-yard return bringing the ball back to the Bulldog 29. In seven plays Crater had its last TD with Swanson slanting over the left side of the line for the last six yards. Ryerson's conversion run failed.

The Bulldogs got a first down on their 43 on an 11-yard pass completion, Barnes to Ron Edmonds. Four more passes failed and the Comets took possession on the 43. In four plays, with Kiger once going 14, they reached the Medford 10 where Kiger lost the ball on a fumble, Roberts recovering again.

Four plays later Mac yielded the ball on its own 16. It regained possession on its 15 and Barnes broke for 20 yards on the last play of the evening.

The Medford club got to the Comet 19 in the second quarter helped by a pitch and sweep for 23 yards by Edmonds. McLoughlin yielded the ball on downs on the 20. Barnes got loose for one 18-yard jaunt and Swanson had runs of 13 and 12 yards on a non-scoring drive.

A ninth grade grid champ in southern Oregon has been recognized informally in past years. This is the first time a trophy has been offered.

Raiders Oppose EOC In Homecoming Tilt

Ashland—Highlighting Southern Oregon college's annual homecoming festivities will be the grid clash between Eastern Oregon college and the Red Raiders tomorrow at 1:30 p.m. on Fuller field here.

Prior to yesterday's practice it appeared the men of the Rogue would be in near top physical shape for the first time this year. A setback was suffered when Willie Garner injured his shoulder.

Garner, a top flight performer on defense and offense had been counted upon heavily to fill the double assignment. Coach Al Atkins moaned his loss by saying Garner was needed in the linebacker spot to help contain the rushing game of the Mounties.

Merv Newell probably will get the call on offense to fill the right guard that is vacated, but who will take over the linebacking slot is the question.

The rest of the lineup will remain the same with Gordy Carrigan and Howard Hartman the ends, Jess Munyon and George Moses the tackles, Tony Brauner at left guard and probably Neil Green at center.

Al Barnes is set at fullback, Doug Olsen at quarter, Eldon Francis at left slotback, and Doyle Branson at the right slotback.

Atkins and assistant Dr. Alex Peterson both witnessed the EOC-Portland State game last week. Both have stressed the defensive capabilities of the Mounties with special emphasis on John Bagnall.

Bagnall is the right defensive halfback and he intercepted one pass to stop one Viking threat.

SOC, is planning some new offensive plays which the coaching staff feels will throw the game more into wide open football with plenty of passing and the old razzle-dazzle.

With this thought in mind Atkins was hinting at the use of the famed "Southern Oregon Spread."

Additional bleachers will be set up for the game to add to the seating capacity at Fuller field as a large homecoming turnout is expected.

Kelso's Owner Delays Decision

Laurel, Md.—Mrs. Richard DuPont acknowledged today an invitation to run Kelso in the \$100,000 Washington, D.C., International, but declined to make a decision until after Saturday's Jockey Club Gold Cup race at Aqueduct.

A committee of turf writers which selects American horses to be invited to the Nov. 11 race at Laurel made its recommendation of Kelso because it felt American chances would be enhanced by the addition of the 3-year-old gelding.

Together with Brookmeade Stable's Sword Dancer and Cain Hoy Stable's Bald Eagle, the U.S. would have its strongest possible representation against invaders from England, France, Russia, Italy and Ireland.

Also, the presence of the trio would give firm footing for establishment of a claim to the horse of the year title.

Kelso, a slow developer, did not start in any of the Triple Crown races this year. He made his first start of the year in June and won five straight stakes victories, defeating such competitors as T.V. Lark, On-and-On, and Dotted Swiss.

Oregon-Washington Conflict Highlight of Coast Football

The Northwest steals the show for the second straight time along the Coast this Saturday when Washington and Oregon meet at Seattle in what should be a spintingler even if it also is a non-conference tilt.

Both teams sport 5-1 records and a fine battle is on tap between Bob Hivner, Washington's quarterback who has taken over for the injured Bob Schloredt, and big Dave Grosz of the Ducks. There also is a good duel coming between the halfbacks with George Fleming, Washington's steady runner and spurt-kicker, offsetting the plays of Cleveland Jones, the Duck's five foot, three inch scabbak.

In other games, Southern California invades Stanford for a Big Five clash that should send Troy into a first place tie with the Huskies, California is at Oregon State, North Carolina State meets UCLA in a Saturday night inter-sectional, Washington State to hopped-up San Jose State and Idaho is at College of the Pacific.

Mike McKeever, Southern California's fierce guard, may have shaken off the sinus trouble and be able to go against Stanford.

The Indians have lost all six

of their games to date and this next one figures to keep their slate unblemished.

Only 69 yards and feeble California, another winless outfit, separate tailback Terry Baker of Oregon State from a new school offense record. The old mark is 1,082 which Joe Francis took 10 games to set in 1957. Baker is heading his seventh.

Roman Gabriel is the latest hot passer whom UCLA must face when North Carolina State comes into the Los Angeles Coliseum. Coach Bill Barnes of the Bruins has warned that they are in for a tough test. Gabriel will meet a sharp passer in Bill Kilmer, the Bruins' star tailback.

Washington State, with halfback Keith Lincoln on the doubtful list, meets a San Jose team which has knocked off Stanford and Arizona State in its last two outings. The Spartans are deploying their defenses to stop the passing of Mel Melin—no Bobby Newman exactly, but still dangerous.

Idaho, now 1-5 after last week's 14-6 win at Hawaii, faces a COP team which may still be dazed from a 51-12

thumping by Washington State.

Two undefeated teams risk their records in what is supposed to be a notch below the big boys. Humboldt State 6-0 is at Hawaii tonight and Fresno State 5-0 invades San Diego State Saturday night.

In Border Conference action, it's New Mexico State at Arizona State and West Texas State at Arizona.

It is OSC's first game of the season in Corvallis. Prothro has won all five games from Cal since he's been head coach of the Beavers.

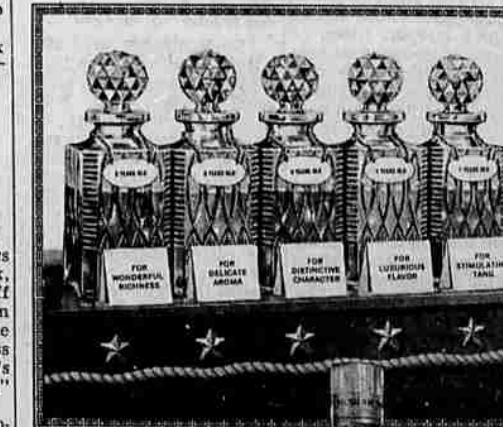
