

Bloody Algeria Riots Pose Threat to France

Eggs, Tomatoes Heaved at Nixon; Derailment Tried

Aboard Nixon Train—UPP—Police patrolled the tracks in advance of Vice President Richard M. Nixon's campaign train today following discovery of a piece of metal lashed to a trestle near Fort Wayne, Ind.

Thursday night's derailment scare followed a day of heckling and egg and tomato throwing in Michigan.

Authorities blamed pranksters for placing the piece of metal, a 14-inch can-shaped fluorescent light transformer filled with sand, on the tracks. But they said it was of sufficient size to derail the train.

More than 25 policemen were assigned to patrol the tracks until Nixon's train passed through Fort Wayne on its way to Illinois, where similar precautions were expected to be taken.

Work of Goons

Herbert Klein, Nixon's press secretary, called the heckling and egg-throwing in Michigan the work of a "goon squad."

Communists Hint Possible Military Help for Rebels

Paris—UPP—Bloody riots and Communist threats of intervention in the bitter six-year-old Algerian war threatened today to plunge France back into the chaos that toppled the 4th Republic.

Scores of leftist and right-wing demonstrators were injured and more than 500 were arrested in riots in eight French cities Thursday.

Plans Rally Speech

In an effort to halt the wide-spread violence and strife that have reached crisis proportions, President Charles de Gaulle planned to make a nationwide radio broadcast next Friday to rally Frenchmen behind his "middle of the road" approach to the Algerian question.

A series of statements emanating from Moscow and other quarters hinted possible Communist military assistance for the Algerian rebels whose war against France enters its seventh year Tuesday.

Grave Factor Seen

Moroccan Crown Prince Moulay Hassan said in London that "in three weeks or a month, a new, very grave factor will intervene in the war in Algeria, and this new aspect could change the whole nature of the struggle."

Diplomatic observers seemed to feel this was a warning that Red Chinese "volunteers" might be thrown into the fight on the side of the rebels.

Says Aid Coming

In Tunis, an Algerian rebel "government" source said "Chinese assistance is in the course of being prepared. It will be put into effect in six months' time at the latest."

The Communist publications Pravda and Izvestia said Thursday in Moscow that the Soviet Union, which only recently granted the rebels "de facto" recognition, is ready "to help in any way to give aid to the Algerian people in their struggle for independence."

Dr. Sampson Back From WSU Trip

Ashland—Dr. Bill Sampson, chairman of the Southern Oregon college education division, has returned from a four-day inspection tour of Washington State university as a member of a re-accreditation committee.

According to Dr. Sampson, the nine-man committee examined the institution in terms of its program, facilities, and faculty, interpreting their observations in the light of standards established by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education.

From the committee reports, Dr. Sampson explained, the NCATE will take one of three actions, either to fully accredit, provisionally accredit, or refuse accreditation to the university. He added that he was much impressed by the Washington school and that the experience would prove of value to him in his work at SOC.

Contribution Made To Measure Drive

Ashland—Dr. Donald Moore, representing the Beta Iota chapter of Phi Delta Kappa, has contributed \$25 to the Colleges for Oregon's Future campaign.

Phi Delta Kappa, an honorary fraternity composed of outstanding men in the education field, has come out in support of State Bonds for Higher Education Facilities, Measure No. 6 on the Oregon ballot.

"Professional people are interested in seeing the passage of this measure," explained Dr. Moore, "to insure the future of Southern Oregon college as well as that of the other Oregon colleges and universities."

"Without the funds to increase campus housing, the colleges will have to turn away bright and promising students," he warned.

Local Man Named Group's President

Raymond Fish, superintendent of Medford's sewage treatment plant, was elected president of the Pacific Northwest Pollution Control association at a three-day convention of the group in Walla Walla, Wash., recently.

The association is comprised of sanitary engineers, sanitary equipment manufacturers and state health and sanitary authorities from Oregon, Washington, Idaho, British Columbia and parts of Montana.

The group has some 375 members and has the avowed purpose of promoting and "keeping up with the times" on pollution control work, particularly water pollution, according to Fish.

Fish has been with Medford's sewage treatment plant at White City since its construction in 1942. At that time it served the Camp White Army training base and Fish administered the plant for the army engineers.

When the city took over the plant in 1948, Fish went to work for the city as plant superintendent.

Fish was vice president of the pollution control association prior to his election as president.

BISHOPS CONSECRATED

Vatican City—UPP—Pope John XXIII today celebrated the second anniversary of his election as supreme pontiff of the Roman Catholic Church by consecrating eight new bishops.

Two of the eight new bishops are Americans—Edward E. Swannstrom, auxiliary to Francis Cardinal Spellman, archbishop of New York, and New York-born Joseph McGough, apostolic delegate to South Africa. The others were five Italians and a Brazilian.
