Rogue river guides will be consulted in selecting sites for picnic facilities. Suggestions for Holiday Gifts To Servicemen Made

Christmas suggestions for American servicemen and women were made recently by Dr. Elmo Stevenson, chairman of the Jackson county chapter of the American Red Cross. Although spending the holidays home with their families is desirable, Dr. Stevenson said, armed forces personnel can't all spend Christmas at home. Gift ideas suggested included homemade cookies and candy, money, family photographs, hometown newspapers, tape recordings, films, cards and letters. **Deadline for Mailing** The chairman urged those sending parcels by ship to mail them prior to Nov. 20; parcels by air, before Dec. 10. In order for letters and cards to arrive in time, air mail was suggested since surface mail often takes as long as 40 days to reach places like Turkey, Korea, or Formosa. The rule is "the farther a package has to travel, the earlier it should be mailed." In shipping "homemade goodies," it was noted that they should be wrapped individually in foil paper, packed well, preferably in tins, and then air mailed. Regarding financial gifts, money orders rather than checks or currency was recommended.
