Cue Wizard To Be Here On Monday

Brunswick advisory billiard champion Willie Mosconi, who will give an exhibition of his cue wizardry on Monday, Oct. 31, at Ben's Billiards here, first learned the game by shooting potatoes on his father's billiard table.

Willie recalls with amusement the occasion on which his father hid the billiard balls so that his son would not be practicing so often. Not daunted, little Willie secured several round-shaped potatoes and was diligently shooting them around when his parent returned unexpectedly. What followed he leaves unsaid, but admits that he took several meals off the mantle thereafter.

Fundamentals Important
Willie will demonstrate to his audience that billiards is in fact an easy game to learn and to play well if strict attention is paid to fundamentals. A study of his style reveals that he stands natural at the table, holds his head over the cue in the line of aim, keeps the cue as level as possible, makes a short, firm bridge with his left hand and strokes the ball with little "English," except when his expert knowledge of the game shows him "English" is required.

He will entertain his audience with the type of shooting that enabled him to establish the all-time world's record high run of 526 balls. He will also open his bag of trick shots, pocketing balls on the wing, and performing all manner of spectacular scoring feats.

Old Jupiter Plusius, giver of that wet stuff from the skies, leaned back and took it easy at Ashland Friday night. But, there was a downpour from a cloudburst just the same.

It rained touchdowns - and extra points - like cats and dogs at Walter Phillips field. And, when this pelting football precipitation ended, Medford High school's Black Tornado emerged 75 to 26 over Ashland from the Southern Oregon conference storm.

So it will be the same old familiar story for the sixth successive year - Medford and Grants Pass meeting in the District 6 A-1 gridiron diadem. The Tornado goes against the Cavemen at Grants Pass this coming Friday night. Each is 3-0 in the conference, Medford's devastation left Ashland at 1-2.

Goal lines were crossed 14 times in all as TDs poured down at Ashland. Eleven was the extra counter tabulation in 101 total points. Medford

Halfback Jim Barry had himself a night for Medford. He ran for one touchdown and caught a pass for one, set up markers with 67 and 33 kick-off returns and a pass interception, with a 21-yard return, and helped another drive with an aerial pitch. Dan Sieg and Phil Humphreys each toted for three touchdowns, Mike McCullough for a pair and George Clearwater for one as the Tornado ran up the highest score in Coach Fred Spiegelberg's head tutoring at Medford high.

Dan Miles and Bill Heyerman each kicked four extra points and Miles tossed to Bob Quinney for another.

Ashland, plagued by fumbles which led to four Tornado scores, had some consolation with its four touchdowns, its 319 net scrimmage yards and the sweeping runs by Bob Voris totaled 170 rushing yards and Farmer 109.

Humphreys Scores
Friday's offense epidemic got off to a sizzling start on the first action of the game. Barry took the kickoff on the Medford 25-yard line, swung

to the left side line to get the screen of his wall of blockers and rambled 65 yards to the Ashland 10 where Farmer finally bopped him out. In bounds, Humphreys awoke right end on the next play and the rain of TDs was underway. Miles' extra point kick was wide.

Ashland had the ball on its 20-yard line after Richard Connelly's powerful kickoff into the end zone. Doster fumbled and Larry Brown recovered for Medford on the 19. Five plays later Sieg goaled from the one. Miles passed to Quinney for the bonus.

Voris fumbled on the first try of Ashland's next offensive series and Jim Stever got the ball for the Tornado on the Grizzly 46. Mike Hood looped a pass to Quinney who used his height adeptly for the catch. The gain went for 31 yards to the Ashland 15. Four plays after this Sieg went a final yard again. Miles kicked this conversion.

Humphreys boomed 21 yards to the eight and on the next play barged into the end zone. Bill Heyerman's kick was blocked and it was Medford 26 to 0.

Holding on to the ball all of the way - not yielding it this time on a fumble, the Bruins fought out from their 23 in a 77 yard spurge. In eight plays they were on the Medford 41. Then fullback Ron Scholar faked into the line

while a pitchout went to Voris. The fleet halfback raced to the goal for the first half Grizzly marker. Rod Fuller's bonus boot was low.

Ashland hopes rose a bit but Medford hastened to another score. Barry had a launching hand, running the kickoff back 33 yards up the middle to the Ashland 46. Sieg and Humphreys alternated in packing to the Grizzly 25. Humphreys went around right end from there to the goal. Miles kicked another extra.

Pass Intercepted
Barry dashed Bruin hopes again, intercepting a Doster pass on the first play after the kickoff and giving Medford the ball on the Ashland 43. Medford's No. 2 attacking crew went to work at this point. In eight plays it had a touchdown with Clearwater going in and Heyerman kicking the conversions. A Barry to Jerry Winetroun pass for 19 yards was the biggest gain of the march.

The once-beaten Democrats, who finished second in the state grid scene last year and are currently ranked third in the state by the Journal Couches' Poll, rolled past fifth-ranked Madison, 14-6.

The victory set the stage for a meeting between Jefferson and second-rated Benson for the Portland Interscholastic league championship next weekend. Benson, unbeaten but tied once this year, trounced Cleveland, 22-0.

Medford's top-rated Black Tornado continued its awesome show of power by turning back Ashland, 75-26, for its eighth victory of the season. Medford is undefeated and untied.

Fourth-ranked David Douglas blanked Centennial, 32-0. Roseburg, tied in the balloting for the fifth spot in the poll, fell to seventh-ranked South Eugene, 26-13.

Eighth-ranked North Salem and Central Catholic, the number nine school, posted wins. North Salem got by Lebanon, 26-13, and Central Catholic nipped Beaverton, 12-7.

The Dalles, rated 10th, was idle. In other game involving the top teams in the state, Hillboro knocked off Astoria, 20-7; Gresham and Clackamas battled to a 6-6 tie; Newberg defeated Tigard, 20-13; St. Helens knocked off McMinnville, 34-7; Tillamook cut down Forest Grove, 19-6; Jesuit beat Parkrose, 14-6; Albany got past Sweet Home, 20-12; Marshfield blanked Springfield, 35-0; Klamath Falls won over Crater, 27-6; Hermiston defeated Grande, 33-7; Pendleton beat Baker, 32-6, and Grants Pass posted a 31-7 triumph against Corvallis.
