

FFA Head Backed For Franchise

Washington—(UPI)—Gen. Elwood R. (Pete) Quesada, friend of President Eisenhower and boss of the federal aviation agency, has the backing of a majority of the American league owners for the new Washington baseball franchise.

This was disclosed today by an informed source, who said the famed World War II flyer had the "inside track" for the franchise that will replace the team that is being shifted to Minneapolis under newly approved expansion plans.

The source said Quesada, who is independently wealthy, already has the backing of

five American league club owners. Quesada conferred with American league President Joe Cronin, and with league club owners Wednesday—the day the league voted to expand to 10 teams by switching the Washington Senators to Minneapolis and creating new franchises in Washington and Los Angeles.

Rogue Area Has Extended Deer Hunting Season

Portland—Oregon deer hunters should not throw away their general season deer tags as they still have a chance to bag a deer. Several extended seasons are on tap during week ends in November for unsuccessful hunters with unused deer tags. Unit permits are not necessary except in one area. In addition, hunters may take an animal of either sex during the extended hunts.

Open areas include a portion of Hood River and Wasco counties along the Columbia river and restricted areas in the Rogue, Umpqua and Willamette valleys, and a portion of the McKenzie unit. A section of the White river country in the Wasco game management unit will also be open during the extended hunt but is open only to hunters with Wasco permits and unused deer tags.

Portions of the Rogue and Umpqua valleys will also be open on Nov. 12, 13, 19, and 20 for holders of unused tags. Area open in the Rogue valley includes within two miles of the Rogue from Shady Cove downstream to Robertson bridge, within one mile of the Applegate from its mouth upstream to McKee bridge, and within one mile of Evans creek from its mouth upstream to Wimer. Umpqua valley area includes within two miles of the Umpqua and its South Fork from Elkton to Milo, and all other tributaries.

Buckeyes Blast Spartans 21-10

East Lansing, Mich.—(UPI)—Powerful Ohio State mingled its traditional "three yards and a cloud of dust" attack with a few unexpected explosives and the lethal combination blasted Michigan State out of the Big Ten title race today with a 21-10 Buckeye victory.

The win kept alive Ohio State's championship hopes as it was its third conference win in four starts.

Ohio State, which usually relies on relentless force and long, hard-driving marches, threw a series of secret weapons at Michigan State.

The first Buckeye surprise came early in the second period when halfback Bob Klein, an obscure cog in the Ohio offensive machine, slashed off tackle and raced 46 yards for a touchdown that gave Ohio State a 6-0 lead.

Southern Cal Dumps Indians

Stanford—(UPI)—The Southern California Trojans struck for a pair of freak touchdowns in the first quarter Saturday then held on evenly for the rest of the game to chalk up a 21-6 victory while handing winless Stanford its seventh straight loss.

In a battle of fumbles, misassignments and ragged tackling, USC got its third triumph when a ball squirted out of an Indian receiver's hands for a pass interception that was raced back for one score, and then countered again when a stunned fullback fell over the goal line late in the opening period.

The Trojans got another score in the closing seconds of the game on a 50-yard march, with Ben Wilson plunging over from the one.

New York—(UPI)—The Washington Senators, whose transfer to St. Paul, Minneapolis was approved by the American league owners Wednesday, have formally notified Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick of their "desire and intention" to shift their franchise. Baseball law required that the official notification be filed by Oct. 31.

Austin, Tex.—(UPI)—Texas capped a pair of short touch-down passes with a 23-yard field goal by Dan Petty to defeat determined Southern Methodist, 17-7, today in a Southwest conference game before a homecoming crowd of 34,000.

Halfback Jack Collins found halfback James Saxton alone in the end zone in the first quarter and meshed a four-yard scoring pass, and in the second period quarterback Mike Cotten hit end Tommy Lucas with an eight-yard scoring pitch.

Petty added an insurance field goal from the 13-yard line late in the fourth quarter after Texas halted a surging Southern Methodist comeback by shaking Norman Marshall loose from a punt on the Pony 30.
