### World Community Day Observance Announced

The annual observance of World Community Day, sponsored each year by Medford Council of United Church Women, will be held on Friday, November 4, beginning at 11 o'clock in the First Church of the Nazarene.

Mrs. L. B. Pierce, chairman for the day's program, states that musical numbers will be furnished by the Gold Hill Five and that a debate on "World Government" will be of special interest. Young people will participate in this feature. A musical skit is to be presented by Mrs. Melvin Hoover.

Theme for the day will be "Christian Action for Freedom." Stressed throughout the program will be action which emphasizes Christian concerns for freedom from human needs, and a dedication to worship for peace, freedom, and justice. All church women are asked to assist in this continuing program.

Clothing for overseas relief is requested and it is desired that packages be medium or small well-tied cartons. The call is for clothing suitable for men, women, children and infants and that contributions contain only good warm clothing which will give considerable wear. Home kits also are desired and should contain Band-Aids, antiseptic powder, adhesive tapes of various sizes, bandage gauze, 2 or 3 tooth brushes, a package of gauze pads, 4 by 6 inches, tubes of vaseline, Vicks or Mentholatum and boric acid powder.

Churches are asked to contribute eight cents per pound for shipping charges. All articles will be sent to church World Service for overseas shipment to areas where the need is greatest, it is stated. Ministers and their wives are to be special guests for the day and small children will be cared for by a nursery attendant, state those in charge.

Women attending are asked to take a salad, dessert or a hot dish for luncheon.

### League Aids Children's Organizations

Portland—The Junior League of Portland, approaching its 50th anniversary in mid-November, voted this week to contribute \$33,950 to five children's organizations, following its annual custom of supporting civic ventures with financial aid.

Mrs. Arthur D. Hosfeldt Jr., president of the 565-woman service group, noted that the gift monies were raised by the volunteer effort of her fellow members: \$7000 from operation of their "thrift shop," which sells used clothing, and the balance from miscellaneous fund-raising.

The Portland Center for Hearing and Speech will receive \$9700 for speech and hearing diagnostic rehabilitation. The League contributed \$5000 to the center in 1958. Its new grant will finance construction of a pre-school nursery. Deaf children under 4, or hard-of-hearing children under 5, who are not eligible for public school acceptance in greater Portland, will be accepted in the League's nursery school.

The Portland Children's center, a non-sectarian school for mentally retarded youngsters who are trainable, received \$9000 for its program of working with children too retarded to enter public schools.

The Children's Home received \$7000, with which it will add a full-time social worker to its staff. The Home aids children between 6 and 17, from throughout Oregon, with social or emotional problems. Its goal is to return children to their homes, better adjusted to society.

The Jewish Community center's pre-school received \$6250 to expand its family counseling services to parents of students, over a three-year period.

The Oregon Museum of Science and Industry received \$2000 for completion of a classroom devoted to science studies. League volunteers serve weekly as OMSI guides for school tours; 3000 children a year go through the museum.

### New Officers Announced By Artists; Dinner Slated

The issue in the world of art today is not between modern and traditional art, but in the terms of the quality and values. The professor believes that there both good and bad can be found in both modern and traditional art, and added that the creative urge may be destroyed if rules and conventions are laid down for an artist to follow. He said a good painting is much more than technique, more than a mirrored image and more than the surface it presents.

O. J. Wilda, associate professor of art at Southern Oregon college, spoke for the last meeting of the society. Mr. Wilda stated that in his opinion, the influence of modernism in art, which began about 50 years ago, has been so great that there can be no turning back.

He compared the conflict in the art world to that in politics or religion, and said that values in art should be discussed reasonably and sensibly.
