Mrs. Edwin Durno Declared 'Faithful Campaign Partner'

Perhaps the most faithful "campaign trail partner" on the Oregon political scene is Mrs. Edwin R. Durno, Medford, who recently made her eighth tour of the fourth congressional district. Wife of the Republican state senator who launched his congressional campaign last March, she accompanies her candidate-husband on his intensive swings through the seven counties of the district, keeping pace with a rigorous schedule of speeches and personal appearances.

"We take off on the station wagon with our suitcases—and my coffee pot—and travel for over three weeks at a time," said the energetic, gregarious Evelyn Durno, who counts the opportunity to meet "so many interesting people" the best part of her campaign activities. En route, the Medford housewife serves as chauffeur and unofficial secretary, in addition to attending all political engagements.

Though life has drastically changed, Mrs. Durno points out that her role as assistant to Dr. Durno is nothing new. A registered nurse, she was literally at his side for 30 years as an anesthetist for 98 per cent of his surgical cases. After his election to the state senate, she continued to share his interests by attending the legislative sessions regularly. In fact, a multiple anniversary in the winter of 1959 summed up their industrious life together as they celebrated 30 years of marriage, and Sen. Durno's 60th birthday—all during Oregon's centennial year.

Of more imminent interest is the rapidly approaching date of November 8, which marks the date of Mrs. Durno's birthday and the date of the national election, a coincidence which could be significant indeed.

Priscilla Porter Proud of Husband; Aids Campaign

"I'm very proud of my husband and his accomplishments and I like campaigning very much," Priscilla Porter says of her husband, Charles O. Porter (D-Ore.), who is campaigning for re-election as the congressman from Oregon's fourth district.

"The campaign is a wonderful opportunity to meet new people and make new friends," Mrs. Porter said. The whole family helps in the Porter campaign, including their four children, Don, Chris, Sam, and Anne. They pass out pamphlets and bumper strips.

However, in a previous campaign, son Chris, then seven, caused a considerable stir when, in a burst of enthusiasm, he went down the street pasting bumper stickers on cars without asking whether the owners were Democrats or Republicans.

In Mr. Porter's first campaign, operating on a very slim budget, Priscilla was a one-woman promotion department writing press releases and ads, answering mail and making bumper strips by hand in the evening hours.

Now she sometimes chauffeurs her husband around the district, helps with correspondence and in between tries to spend as much time as possible with the children.

"The children are very proud of their daddy," Priscilla said, "although some of them are old enough to understand and are hurt by some of the mud thrown at him."

Maintaining homes on opposite sides of the continent in Eugene and Washington, D.C., is a very expensive proposition, she said, and also very trying. What she wants is always in the other home and when moving back and forth it seems that the wrong articles are always packed.

The Porters have not found a satisfactory system for the children's education with the moving to and from Eugene. They have tried starting the children in the Eugene schools and moving them to Washington when congress begins. Another year Priscilla stayed in Washington with the children while her husband returned to Oregon. Currently the younger children are in school in Eugene but the oldest, Don, is staying with friends in Washington while in his junior year in high school.

The children would much rather live in Oregon, Mrs. Porter said, but they are able to take advantage of opportunities in Washington that are available nowhere else. She concluded that life in Washington, except for the muggy weather, is much like living anywhere else. She is a den mother for Cub Scouts and a member of the PTA.
