### Information On Careers Available

The 1960 edition of a booklet on career information for high school students has been received by the Medford unit of the American Legion auxiliary.

The booklet, "Need a Lift?", contains sources for career information for students endeavoring to plan their futures. It will be available through Mrs. Bert Stancliffe, education and scholarship chairman, and contains names and addresses of more than 100 different fields.

Scholarships and education also are listed in the Legion publication, which is said to be one of the most complete sources of career and scholarship information in the United States.

"Plans for career education should begin to be made during the sophomore year of high school," Mrs. Stancliffe said. "Proper subjects can then be studied during high school years and efforts made to qualify for a scholarship in the chosen field. Many young men and women fail to take advantage of generous aids offered because they fail to plan for their futures early enough."

She mentioned the "Junior G.I. bill" which provides up to \$110 per month in education aid for sons and daughters of veterans who died as a direct result of war service. More than half of those eligible have failed to apply.

### Founder of Girl Scouts Honored on October 31

Almost three and one-half million Americans and people in some 49 foreign countries will celebrate the birthday of Juliette Gordon Low, founder of Girl Scouting in the United States, on Monday, Oct. 31.

Juliette Gordon was born just 100 years ago in Savannah, Georgia, to an aristocratic Southern family and grew up to be a high-spirited young debutante who had all the advantages offered her by a wealthy and loving family. Like most young girls, she loved parties and beautiful clothes, but surprisingly, in view of the period in which she lived, she enjoyed sports and the out-of-doors and became an expert swimmer, horseback rider and fisherman.

Moves to England

In 1888, Juliette Gordon married William Mackay Low, a wealthy Englishman whose family had business interests and a residence in Savannah, and went to England to live. Widowed in 1905, and finding herself alone, childless, and handicapped by deafness, Mrs. Low met Sir Robert Baden-Powell, founder of the Scouting movement in England. Mrs. Low studied the new movement and promptly organized Girl Scout troops in England and Scotland. She realized that she had now found the direction and purpose of her life.

It was in March, 1912, that Juliette Low returned to America and on her first night home she phoned an old friend who was headmistress of a girls' school. "Come right over," urged Mrs. Low. "I've got something for the girls of Savannah, and all America, and all the world, and we're going to start it tonight."

Many in Scouting

Since that memorable day almost half a century ago, approximately 17 million girls and adults have enjoyed the fun and camaraderie of Girl Scouting, have been helped to become resourceful, creative, responsible citizens. Today, more than two and one-half million girls between the ages of seven and seventeen years and about 800,000 adults are Girl Scouts.

Mrs. Low learned early never to take "no" for an answer. Close friends and relatives, as well as distinguished men and women all over America found themselves, at Mrs. Low's insistence, giving tremendous amounts of time and energy to the new movement. Until her death in 1927, Mrs. Low traveled throughout the country organizing troops, developing and training leadership, winning community support. She also wrote the early handbooks, planned program activities for the girls, designed the first uniform and financed the movement personally.

### Missionary From Argentina To Work With U. S. Migrants

Altus, Okla. - (UPI) - A diminutive woman missionary to the United States will lead an experiment in migrant ministry where human values and lives of Spanish Americans will be at stake.

Elviria Cestari, a native of Buenos Aires, Argentina, who has worked for 14 years as a missionary in North and South America, will supervise the joint efforts of the Jackson County Migrant Council and the Oklahoma Council of Churches.

With the 35-year-old Miss Cestari, the spiritual welfare of the migrants is a chief target, but she knows living conditions, recreation, health and food problems also must be met and solved.

Every year the southwestern Oklahoma cotton harvest attracts thousands of Spanish-speaking U. S. citizens who live in the Rio Grande Valley. They spend most of the autumn months pulling bolls in the state's cotton belt.

The multiple problems of the some 9,000 migrants were recognized by the local council who summoned the church group. Together, they hired Miss Cestari, who recently finished a similar job in Indiana.

She works with volunteer workers from the community, supervising the programs and mingling with the migrants.

Robert L. Warner, Altus sanitarian, said last year seven children of the migrants died here, mostly of intestinal diseases. He prompted the

formation of the local group. "Jackson County recognized the problem and set out to clean up a deplorable situation," said Kragnes, Oklahoma City, executive secretary of the church group. "Other areas have comparable problems but refuse to admit it."

"People are sensitive about

a possible migrant worker problem," he said. "I was censured once for my remarks regarding it."

He described Miss Cestari's job as "difficult." He said the migrants are suspicious of any program and first they must be taught to trust the workers.

"After trust is developed,

they become wonderful people to know," Kragnes said. "Especially the children; they need so much help and schooling."

He said the problem of migratory workers is nationwide and monumental. They deserve "the money and attention we spend on migratory birds, at least," he said.
