Portland - (UPI) - James E. Dicey, 55, vice president of the International Woodworkers of America, AFL - CIO, died in his sleep here early Saturday morning.

Dicey, born Feb. 6, 1905, in Hattiesburg, Miss., served as an international officer of the union at its Portland headquarters since 1952.

Previously he was a business agent and officer of the IWA local union in Laurel, Miss., and served as vice chairman of the Mississippi Political Action and Legislative committee.

# Mildred Paperman Files Guilty Plea

Boston - (UPI) - Miss Mildred Paperman, 42, secretary-partner to industrialist Bernard Goldfine, pleaded guilty today at the outset of her trial on income tax evasion charges.

She was given a suspended four-month jail term and fined \$2,500 on each of five counts.

Miss Paperman, personal secretary to the Boston textile tycoon, changed her plea from innocent to guilty at the start of her scheduled trial before Federal Judge George C. Sweeney.

Judge Sweeney immediately sentenced her.

Judge Sweeney ordered the five separate jail terms suspended and placed the Brookline resident on probation for two years. He also ruled that she must pay the total \$12,500 fine within two weeks.

# City Council Sets Special Session

Three matters relating to construction of the new Pacific freeway through Medford will be considered by the Medford city council at a special meeting tonight starting at 7:30 o'clock in the city hall.

The council is expected to take action on a request to suspend temporarily the city's noise ordinance during construction of the freeway. The ordinance prohibits construction between 6 p.m. and 7 a.m.

The council will consider for the second time a proposed agreement between the city and state highway commission for use of city property at the municipal airport as a "borrow" pit for freeway construction fill material.

Both the request to suspend the noise ordinance and the "borrow" pit agreement were deferred from the council's last meeting.

The third item to be considered tonight concerns a proposal to sell one-quarter of an acre of city property at Crater Lake highway and Bear creek to the state for freeway right of way.

A fourth item, the offer of some \$160,000 made by the highway commission for 4 1/2 acres of land in Hawthorne park, is not officially on the agenda, according to City Manager Robert A. Duff.

The urgency of these items, resulting in the calling of the special meeting, stems from the fact that the first of the freeway contracts through Medford is scheduled to be awarded by the highway commission tomorrow.
