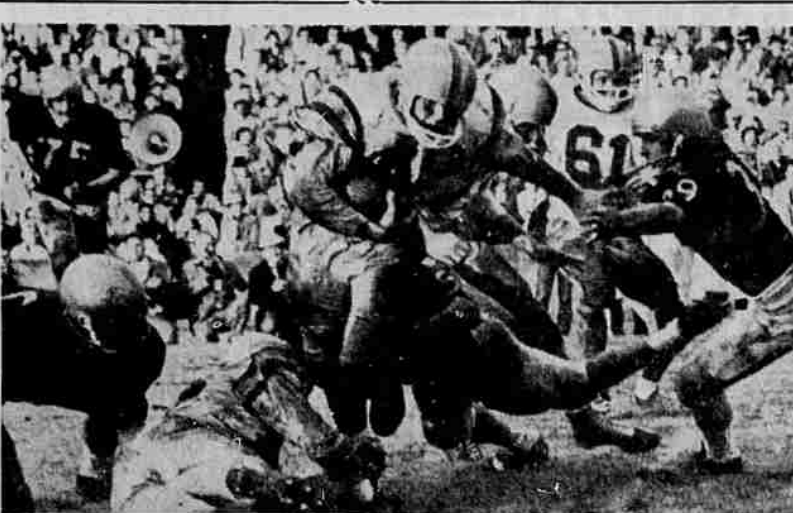

Then George Fleming, whose surefooted place-kicking has provided the Huskies with their margin of victory in the last three games, booted the game-winning point.

In the dressing room following the contest McKeta said: "Cyanov must have thought I was out of bounds but I also think he was out of position some.
