New Police Chief Named in Gold Hill

By MARY KELL Gold Hill Correspondent Gold Hill - L. C. Harrison has assumed the duties of police chief and water and sewer superintendent for the city of Gold Hill. He was officially sworn in Monday, Oct. 17 by Mayor Milton Steinmetz during a meeting of the city council.

Harrison, an experienced police officer, was authorized by the council to perform his duties of law enforcement and supervision of city facilities, effective Oct. 17. Councilmen discussed and informed him of work that they had outlined in conjunction with his position here.

Harrison and his wife, Evelyn, their two daughters, Sharon, 9, and Linda, 3, are residing at 1118 Second avenue in Gold Hill.

The Harrisons moved to Gold Hill from Sams Valley where they have lived for two years. They came to the area from California. After coming to southern Oregon, Harrison was engaged as a special deputy for the Jackson County Sheriff's department, and was employed at Jeddeth Brothers Sweets Mills, Inc. in Gold Hill. He was assistant purchasing agent in the purchasing and materials department.

Harrison's parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Harrison, are residents of Sams Valley. Harrison is originally from the San Francisco Bay area. He attended San Francisco Junior college.

He served in the Air Force during World War II as a flight engineer on heavy bombers. He remained in the service until 1952.

Following his discharge from the service, he was employed by the California Forestry department until he entered the police profession as a deputy sheriff in Marin county.

His police experience includes FBI training courses and training under the California Highway Patrol. He has also had experience with juvenile details. He was assistant supervisor of the Marin sheriff's department prior to coming to Oregon.
