New York - Speak up ladies. It's the only way you'll get that equality of the sexes so many of you seek.

Now, there may be some of you who don't want equality with the men. But these are just beyond the understanding of a comprehension of Judge Dorothy Kenyon, a woman caught up in more causes than Eleanor Roosevelt.

It is to those others that this woman lawyer and "causer" is talking - to all of you who think women deserve equal pay for equal work; to those who believe women should have equal job opportunities with men; and to those who want father roles in politics for women.

"Women need 'gumption'." "Women still sit back and let hubby do the talking," said Miss Kenyon, a hyperactive woman of 72 years. "Until women get a little more gumption and the men a little more sense, all the legislation in the world won't provide full equal rights. What we have to do is change national habits and customs. . . change our thinking. 'We have to start judging

Incomprehensibles Noted By Guatemalan Visitor

Ever since I came to Guatemala, I've kept a little notebook where I jot tidbits about life here - amusing and otherwise. My latest cryptoclastic is a reference to a bill from a Medford plumber - \$15 for two hours work, and the job was the contrast between labor in these two American countries.

Two men servants in the pension where I live, who begin the day's work at 5:30 a.m. and end it at 10 at night, with three hours off every other Sunday, earn \$15 a month. This seems tragic to me - but, also, so does the plumbing bill.

Five graduates from the lovely Belmont school are paying \$800 to rent a club room for a ball. This does not include food, music or champagne. To have a bottle of champagne popped here - just the popping, naturally - costs \$5. (Champagne - imported - costs more than in the States.)

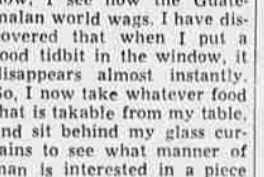
My classroom is a rough-though - charming little cottage behind the big school building. Windows and doors are always open, and there are picture views from any angle - flowers, trees and grass. The driveway winds around to the back and the pupils alight from the chauffeur-operated automobile doors. Prevailing wages for chauffeurs, I understand, begin at \$15 a month.

Sweaters Popular

Sweaters among the younger set - as everywhere - are popular. Many sweaters imported sweaters costing \$10-\$15 more than in the States. Tailors - are reasonable in Guatemala, and I imagine many a man would envy the "man of distinction" effect of Guatemalan young man at Belmont.

Although not in the luxury neighborhood of the city, the pension where I live is in a good district, surrounded by good homes and churches. My bedroom faces the street and has a very large pretty window with the ornate, typical wrought iron grating. When I sit (as I do Saturday mornings) in front of the open window, I see how the Guatemalan world wags. I have discovered that when I put a food tidbit in the window, it disappears almost instantly. So, I now take whatever food that is takable from my table, and sit behind my glass curtains to see what manner of man is interested in a piece of roll, an avocado, a cookie. Birds swoop - and so do people!
