World War I Veteran Gets Medal 43 Years After Battle Was Fought

O'Brien - After 43 years, Albert Weber, of O'Brien, has received the Medal of Verdun, awarded by the French government.

Weber received the medal Oct. 8. He received the medal for service rendered in the Battle of Verdun, a decisive contest in the outcome of World War I. It is believed that Weber is the first World War I veteran in Oregon to receive this medal.

Weber, owner of the Elk Creek ranch south of O'Brien, served with the 91st infantry division, made up of California and Oregon men. In addition to Verdun, the 91st fought four battles at St. Mihiel and one at Meuse-Argonne.

Many years have passed since Weber was a mess sergeant in the 91st. However, he still has his uniform intact, including steel helmet, rifle, gas mask and combat shoes. It is believed to be the only complete World War I uniform in Oregon.

Several others are in the area are entitled to the Verdun medal. Among them is Ervin Ellis, of O'Brien, a past member of the 37th division. Ellis and Weber will participate in the Veterans' day parade in Medford Nov. 11.

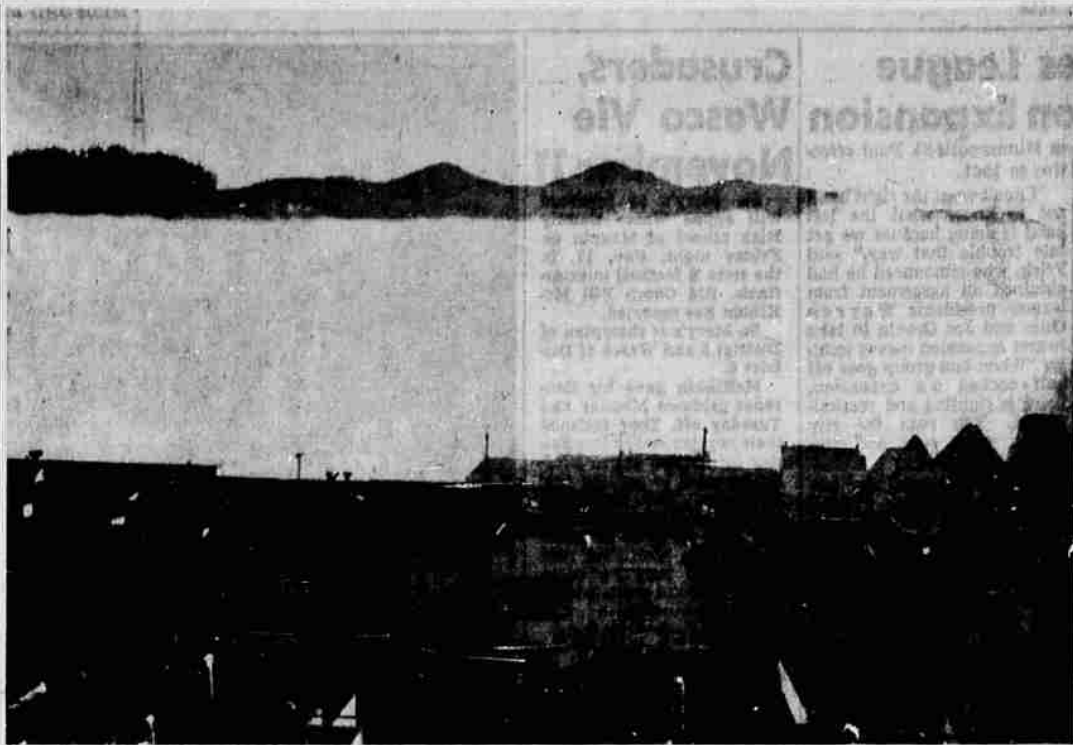
Whipple's comment was in reply to a charge by Leo Butts, business representative of Oregon Employees Council.

Whipple said Butts' charge was without foundation and pointed out to employees as a whole that it was their privilege to vote as they pleased on the issue.

Salem - (UPI) - Five youths from the Hubbard and Aurora areas were charged Tuesday with bombing a Greyhound bus with a water-filled balloon from an overpass over the Salem-Portland freeway Sunday night.

Famed Conductor Dies of Hemorrhage

Milan, Italy - (UPI) - Dimitri Mitropoulos, world-famed Greek-born orchestra conductor, collapsed on the podium of the La Scala Opera House today and died of a cerebral hemorrhage a short time later. He was 64.

Mitropoulos, a U.S. citizen and former director of the New York and Minneapolis philharmonic orchestras, was conducting a rehearsal for a concert he was due to give next Monday when he stopped abruptly, mumbled he was ill, and toppled to the floor of the great opera house where he had made his Italian debut 30 years ago.

Portland - (UPI) - The Harry Holt Babylift program brought 52 more Korean infants into the country here Tuesday and upped its total mark to past 2,000.

New parents for the youngsters gathered at Portland International Airport from more than a dozen states.

Holt, a Creswell farmer, started bringing in Korean orphans of mixed parentage in 1955.

The physician who accompanied the children on the plane from Seoul, Korea, Dr. TenHave, said Tuesday's plane load was 80 per cent full-blooded Koreans, however, and 20 per cent of mixed parentage.

Some of the children had chicken pox, but Dr. TenHave said all in all the children were unusually healthy.
