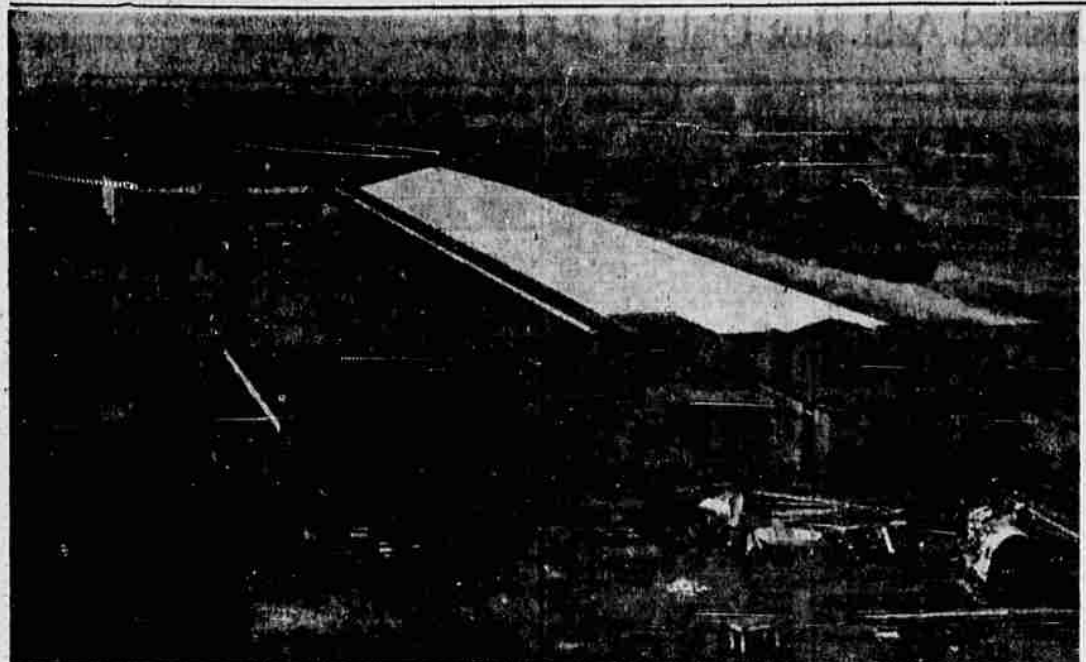
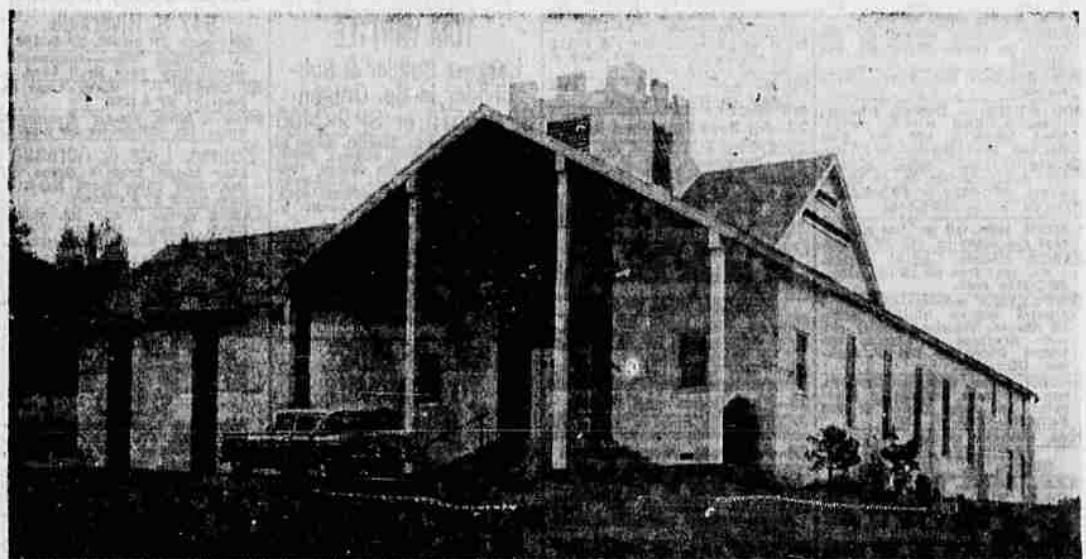

Original Academy Building Is Razed

An old landmark in the Medford area is nearly gone. The familiar Rogue River academy building located on South Stage rd. is being torn down. It had been used continuously by the Seventh-day Adventists for their grade school and high school or junior high for 34 years.

The original part of the building was erected in 1926, and an addition was made about 15 years ago. For a time there was also a dormitory for students, but for the most part the academy has operated as a day school.

First Principal
The first principal was Frank S. Bunch, who also taught several subjects. John Meehan, widely-known carpenter in this area and now a resident of the Applegate area, was the first business manager. Mrs. Meehan taught a class in Home Nursing. The late Mrs. Mattie Huerngardt was music teacher for many years.

There were six girls in the first graduating class of the 12-grade school in 1927. Two of them now live in Medford—Mrs. Mildred Hayes Riley, an employee of the Rogue Val-

ley hospital, and Mrs. Eleanor Dorland Pike, a nurse at Sacred Heart hospital.

Rogue River academy became a junior academy in 1955 when nearby Milo academy, a boarding school, was opened.

In June, 1959, work was begun on the new unit. In the fall of that year three classrooms and the library were completed. When school opened this year more classrooms were ready for use and the new restrooms were completed.

To Be Completed
Yet to be completed are the principal's office, a health room, and the new cafeteria. In the plans for the \$125,000 unit is also a new gymnasium-auditorium to be built at a future time.

There are approximately 160 students enrolled in the ten grades this year. There are seven regular faculty members. The new principal is B. M. Kurtz, and assisting him in grades 7-10 are Charles Lewis and Marvin Wilson. William Rose, grades 5 and 6, Mrs. Arthur Bissiger, grades 3 and 4, and Mrs. Dwight Pfugrad, grade 1, are returning teachers. Mrs. Dick Helms teaches grade 2.

Children attend the school from all parts of the valley, representing the four Adventist churches located in Medford, Valley View, South Stage rd. next to the school, Ashland and Eagle Point.
