

Far Western States Give Close Edge to Kennedy To Capture Election

 San Francisco — (AP) — The election outlook in the seven Far West states, which have a total of 60 electoral votes:
CALIFORNIA — (32 electoral votes) — It's a tossup in this key state. But in the past two weeks Democrats have been much more enthusiastic and optimistic in predicting a Kennedy victory than have Republicans in predicting a win for Nixon. Republicans insist Nixon will carry his home state, but most admit it will be very close. Democrats hold a 3-2 edge in voter registration, but California backed Eisenhower in 1952-56.
ARIZONA (4 electoral votes) — Experts pick Nixon by a hair in a state that has been backed a loser in a presidential race. An independent poll quoted by the Arizona Republic showed Nixon ahead. But

Democrats hold a 2 1/2 to 1 registration margin and hope Kennedy's scheduled appearance in Phoenix Thursday will help unite party's liberal and conservative wings. The latter group has twice helped elect conservative Republican Sen. Barry Goldwater.
WASHINGTON — (9 electoral votes) — Political writers who rated the state a tossup a month ago now put it in the Kennedy column by an extremely narrow margin. Privately conducted polls favor Kennedy, and Democrats who were worried have become increasingly confident since the first TV debate. Republicans predict Nixon will win by 50,000. Democratic Gov. Albert D. Rosellini faces a stiff challenge from State Supt. of Public Instruction Lloyd Andrews.
OREGON — (6 electoral votes) — Most experts give Nixon the edge. A professional poll taken for the Republicans showed Nixon would get 53.2 per cent of Oregon vote to 44.3 for Kennedy and only 2.5 undecided. Democrats, with a 75,000 registration advantage, are predicting victory. Democrat Maurice Neuberger is favored to beat out Elmo Smith for her late husband's U. S. Senate seat.

NEVADA — (3 electoral votes) — Las Vegas oddsmakers tab Kennedy a 9-5 choice nationwide and Nevada is expected to go for Kennedy's although by a much narrower margin. Democrats have a 2-1 voter lead. Former Republican Sen. George (Molly) Malone is attempting a comeback against Rep. Walter Baring, but the Democrat is favored.
HAWAII — (3 electoral votes) — Nixon held a comfortable edge in the minds of most experts at the outset of the campaign due to his personal campaigning in the islands. But Kennedy appears to have grown stronger in the absence of burning issues. The leadership of Harry Bridges' Longshore Union here is supporting Nixon as "the lesser evil" but it is reported having trouble persuading the rank and file to go along. Thirty-one per cent of the population is Catholic, one of the highest totals in the Far West.
ALASKA — (3 electoral votes) — Kennedy is favored in Alaska, along with Hawaii, it casts its first votes in a presidential election. The 49th state has traditionally gone Democratic, and Democrats

led up wide margins over Republicans in the August primary. The major statewide race pits Democratic Sen. E. L. Bartlett against Republican "flying dentist," Dr. Lee McKinley, who made a forced landing near Fairbanks last week while campaigning across the vast northern state.

Corvallis — Two students from the Medford area are among 14 civil engineering seniors at Oregon State college selected to receive special undergraduate research participation grants. They are Richard L. Brown of Eagle Point and William L. Ryan of Central Point.
 Each of the students selected will receive \$150 for research assistance on a civil engineering department research project this year.
 The grants from National Science Foundation are designed to stimulate interest among outstanding students in research careers. Each student will work directly under the supervision of the faculty in charge of the project.

 Susan Harper, Eagle Point speech department, and Vic Halsey, Eagle Point FFA chapter, also gave "excellent" speeches, Lonzway said.
 Cathy's speech on wildlife conservation listed some facts about the Jackson SCD operation, use of its land within its capability and development of 70 multi-purpose reservoirs on farms and ranches.
 Judging the contest were Cal Smith, Ted McDaniel and Ed Kupillas, all from Medford. Jackson SCD chairman Elwood Abbot announced that Cathy will enter the southwest Oregon finals in Grants Pass today. The Grants Pass winner will represent southwest Oregon in the state finals scheduled for The Dalles Nov. 16 to 18 during the Oregon Soil Conservation districts' convention there.

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Refresher Course Scheduled in City

Staff members from care facilities throughout Jackson county have been invited to attend a special nutrition refresher course.
 Three classes lasting two hours are being sponsored by the Jackson county health department and the Oregon state board of health. The first meeting is scheduled at 7 p.m. in the Red Cross auditorium, Nov. 17, in Medford. The classes have been planned for personnel from hospitals, nursing homes, homes

for the aged, group care homes, and nursery schools. The refresher course includes discussions of normal nutrition and meal planning, modified diets, food sanitation, and food purchasing.
 Invited to the course are staff members from Happy Time day nursery, Magruder's day nursery, the Doll House, Beecher sanitarium, Crosby nursing home, Medford nursery school, Miss Pat's nursery and day care, Jackson county farm home, Medford convalescent home, Milledge hospital, Mountain View nursing home, Ashland General hospital, Crater Osteopathic hospital, Rogue Valley Memorial hospital, Sacred Heart hospital, Bob and Doris' home, Lyn Haven, Rogue Valley manor, McCue guest home, Mountain Brook side Inn, Pearl Watson's home, Rowell's Family home, and Walsh Haven for the aged.
