

Black Tornado, Cavemen Contend Friday Night for District Toga

This is the week end of big, crucial, title-bearing high school football conflicts throughout the state. And, the Southern Oregon conference, District 6 A-1, is no exception. For, the Medford Black Tornado and the Grants Pass Cavemen, an upset-minded crew, skirmish for the sixth consecutive year in a district finale that will determine which of the two will go into Oregon championship playoff quarterfinals. Medford has claimed the honor for five successive seasons from this rivalry.

Medford and Grants Pass each 3-0 in the loop, collide at 8 p.m. on Friday on the Cavemen's field. This clash brings together two of the state's high rated teams. The Tornado has topped three state polls all season long. The Climate city gridgers have moved into eighth and ninth positions in the voting.

Knudsen Lost
Medford Coach Fred Spiegelberg said today that middle guard Sam Knudsen is definitely lost for this big scuffle because of a knee injury in Tuesday practice. Warren Parke likely will have the starting call. Richard Connolly, defensive tackle and one of the Medford kickoff experts, has had to miss the important Tuesday and Wednesday drills because of flu. He's expected to be on hand on Friday but the starter may be Stan Smith.

"We've been stressing defense this week," said Spiegelberg, "to try to stop them (the Cavemen) if we can." This stress has been based on the hope that offense, a Tornado feature all season long, will be able to take care of itself.

"We have nothing up our sleeves," said the head coach. He reported team spirit as "pretty good."

Medford footballers ran through their workout quick and hard last night because of the rain and cold. A harder than usual Thursday drill was slated for this afternoon.

51st Meeting
This will be the 51st football meeting between Medford and GP. The Tornado has won 37 games and Grants Pass 11. There have been two ties.

Grants Pass has not defeated the Black Tornado since a 13 to 12 nod in 1953. But, two games since then have been ties—20 to 20 in 1957 and 0 to 0 in 1958. Medford downed the Cavemen by 14 to 7 in 1954 and 1955, 28 to 6 in 1956 and by 41 to 7 in 1959.

Margin in total yardage over the Cavemen in 1957 and 1958 gave Medford the play-off berth.

Grants Pass may have a brother combination at the halfbacks, Max Hull at left half and Eddie Hull at right. Max is expected to get the left half call because of knee

injuries which reportedly will keep the No. 1 and No. 2 men at the post, Dan McIntire and Tom Hathaway, out of the game. However, Max, normally right half, has played in a couple of games at left and thoroughly knows the job. He showed that with his 256 rushing yards against Corvallis last week.

Both McIntire and Hathaway were in practice suits on Monday but were off the drill field on Tuesday and Hathaway was hobbling on a crutch. The two backs were hurt in the Marshfield fracas and have been recurrently sidelined since that time.

Fullback Harvey Graham, kept out of the Corvallis mix because of a pulled leg muscle, is reported ready to go full steam for the Cavemen.

Ohio University Gap Closed by Bowling Green

New York—UPI—For the second straight week front-running Ohio university increased its point total in the weekly small college football ratings by the United Press International board of coaches today—and lost ground to defending champion Bowling Green.

As the two titans from the Buckeye State fought toward a dramatic face-to-face showdown on Nov. 12, Ohio university clung to the No. 1 spot for the fourth straight week with 309 points in the balloting.

That was 28 points more than last week, and the Bobcats' 22 first-place votes was one more than a week ago. But Bowling Green, piling up a heavy second-place vote, boosted its point total from 248 to 293. The Falcons had six first-place votes, also one more than last week.

Cincinnati Reds Name Bill DeWitt

Cincinnati, Ohio—UPI—William O. (Bill) DeWitt, another participant in baseball's end-of-season game of musical chairs, Wednesday took over as general manager of the Cincinnati Reds.

DeWitt resigned two weeks ago as president of the Detroit Tigers following an owner's squabble. He succeeds Gabe Paul who resigned as Redlegs general manager Oct. 25 to take over the same post with the Houston club of the National League.

A St. Louis native, the 58-year-old DeWitt has held executive positions with the old St. Louis Browns—now the Baltimore Orioles—the St. Louis Cards, the New York Yankees and the Tigers. He served as administrator from 1956 to 1959 of the \$500,000 minor league fund which aids minor league teams.

His year as president of the Tigers was a stormy one with two changes in managers and a series of front office squabbles. The Tigers finished in sixth place in the American League.

Ex-Baseball Star Dies

Fort Wayne, Ind.—UPI—Everett (Deacon) Scott, 67, who played with five baseball clubs in his major league career, died here Wednesday after a long illness.

Scott broke into the majors with the Boston Red Sox in 1914. He later played with the Washington Senators, the Chicago Cubs and Chicago White Sox, and the New York Yankees.

As an infielder, mostly a shortstop, Scott spent four years with the Yankees and played in two World Series with the club.

Weather Isn't Washington Fan

Seattle—UPI—The weatherman apparently isn't a Washington fan. With one of the biggest games of the year on tap for Saturday against USC, Washington was forced inside by rain and a muddy field Wednesday.

However, the Huskies managed to get in a short scrimmage session on the dirt floor of Edmundson Pavilion here, after first working on their passing offense. A lighter workout was scheduled for today.

Trojans Will Play for Mike

Los Angeles—UPI—The Washington Huskies might be playing 12 men Saturday when they battle the Southern California Trojans in the Coliseum—the regular 11 players plus Mike McKeever.

The Trojans are "up" for this one. Halfback Jerry Traynham echoed the team's sentiments as he said, "This one will be for Mike. He put out at least 100 per cent in every game. For him we'll all put out just a little bit extra. His all-out type of play will be our inspiration."

McKeever is recovering from brain surgery.

Roy Hamey Successor To Weiss

New York—UPI—Roy Hamey, 58, long-time assistant to George Weiss, today was named Weiss' successor as general manager of the New York Yankees on a one-year contract.

Club President Dan Topping, who attended the noon press conference with Hamey and the new Yankee manager, Ralph Houk, said Hamey will assume the complete duties of the general manager's position.

The appointment of Hamey, former general manager of the Pittsburgh Pirates and Philadelphia Phillies, had been expected for some time. Weiss, 66, stepped out Wednesday after 13 years as Yankee general manager during which the Yankees dominated major league baseball with 10 pennants.

Weiss, a member of the New York organization since 1932, was "prompted" to step aside because of his age. The quiet, introverted armchair genius, who has won much respect and admiration for his shrewdness, is 66 years old.

However, Weiss denied on Wednesday that he was fired, and instead stated that his semi-retirement was "the result of a program set up in 1956 and entirely in accordance with my thinking."

He said he would serve in an advisory capacity for the next five years of his contract. Hamey, 58, has been groomed as Weiss' successor for many years. Twice he was "farmed" out to general managerial jobs with the Pittsburgh Pirates and Philadelphia Phillies of the National League, and twice he was brought back to New York

Vernon Law Picked As Pitcher of Year

Boston—UPI—Vern Law, who was scouted by a United States senator and signed by the Pittsburgh Pirates with the help of Bing Crosby's magic voice, was voted the Cy Young Award today as the major league pitcher of the year.

Law, who won 20 games during the National League season and added two victories over the New York Yankees in the World Series, was named on eight of the 14 ballots cast in the annual voting by the Baseball Writers Association of America.

Warren Spahn of the Milwaukee Braves, who pitched a no-hitter and achieved a record 11th 20-win season, was second in the voting with four votes. Ernie Broglio, a

21-game winner, and relief ace Lindy McDaniel, both of the St. Louis Cardinals, had one vote each and two writers abstained from voting.

Law, a 6-foot, 2-inch, 200-pound right-hander from Meridian, Idaho, earned the nickname "The Predictable Pirate" as his steady pitching proved a key factor in the Pirates' first NL pennant since 1927. He started 35 games, pitched 272 innings, pitched 18 complete games and had a 3.08 earned run average to go with his 20-9 mark.

Essentially a control pitcher with a good sinker and changeup, Law's strikeouts outnumbered his walks, 120-40.

The big right-hander, a Mormon elder, was recommended to the Pirates in 1947 by the late Sen. Herman Welker (R-Idaho). Crosby, a Pirate stockholder who had been a classmate of Welker at Gonzaga college at Spokane, Wash., telephoned Vern's mother and helped talk her into having him sign with the Pirates.

Coliseum At Portland Has Opening

Teacher Opposes Pupil In Pioneer-Raider Fray

Ashland—It will be a case of teacher versus pupil when Southern Oregon college football team plays host to Lewis and Clark at 1:30 p.m. Saturday here on Fuller field.

Raider coach Al Akins was an assistant for three years under LC mentor Joe Huston prior to his coming to Southern Oregon and, according to Akins, the Raiders will be doing everything within their power to win.

"After that 60-13 pasting we took two years ago in Portland at the hands of the Pioneers, there has been nothing but revenge on my mind," Akins said.

Physically the Raiders are in good shape with Willie Garner returning to the offensive lineup at right guard after missing two weeks of action.

270-Pounder
Frosh quarterback Doug Olsen continues to be the top offensive leader for the Raiders with a backfield of Eldon Francis, Doyle Branson, and Al Barnes aiding his running attack.

Olsen will be confronted by a large defensive lineup from Lewis and Clark spearheaded by 270-pound Wally Sparks and three year veteran Pat Clock.

Opposing the Raider backfield unit will be Gary Grill and Mickey Hergert, two of the top running backs in the Northwest conference. Southpaw Royce McDaniel, a three letter winner, will be starting quarterback.

SOC has their two fine ends in good shape physically with Howard Hartman and Gordy Carrigan on the wings. Hartman is the leader in the Oregon Collegiate conference with 29 receptions while the versatile Carrigan will catch, run, and throw the ball whenever the situation calls.

Lewis and Clark ended third in the Northwest conference behind Willamette and Linfield with a 3-2 record while the Raiders were second in the OCC with a 3-1 mark.

Both foes this week end hold wins over common opponents.
