Ancient Climatic Conditions Studied

La Jolla, Calif.—An Atlas of world climatic conditions existing 150 million years ago is being prepared at the University of California's Scripps Institution of Oceanography.
Robert Bowen, English paleontologist working on the project with support from the Atomic Energy Commission and the National Science Foundation, studies fossils of an extinct sea creature called Belemnoid. They are found on every continent and the chemical components of their peratures, gives the climatic shells, which varied with tem-clies.
