### Court Grants Rise In Dog Licenses

The Jackson county court yesterday signed an order granting a partial dog license fee raise effective Jan. 1.

The new fee schedule raises male and unspayed females male and spayed female dog licenses from \$1.50 to \$2, and sets a dog tag replacement fee at 25 cents. The \$3 female license fee will remain the same, since this is the limit set by law, it was explained.

County Judge Earl Miller said the fee raise is necessary to meet additional expenses, particularly the increased business handled by Jackson County Dog Control Officer Chris Hagler and his crew.

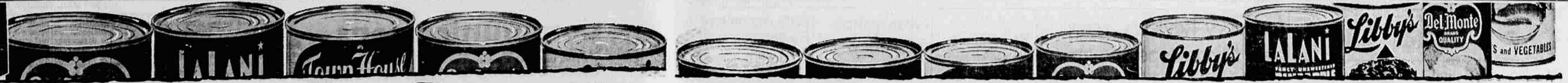
### Ashland Firm Bids Low on Fuel Oil

Western Oil and Burner company of Ashland submitted the low bid on fuel oil for the courthouse and the county farm home, the Jackson county court said today.

The company was one of three bidders although notices were mailed out to 11 dealers, the county court said. The low bid was 10.58 cents per gallon for the courthouse and 10.45 for the farm home.

Shell Oil company distributors in Medford had submitted a bid of 10.79 cents per gallon and Tidewater Oil company 11.3 cents per gallon. The oil is to be supplied from Nov. 1, 1960, to Nov. 1, 1961, and will total about 70,000 gallons, it was estimated.

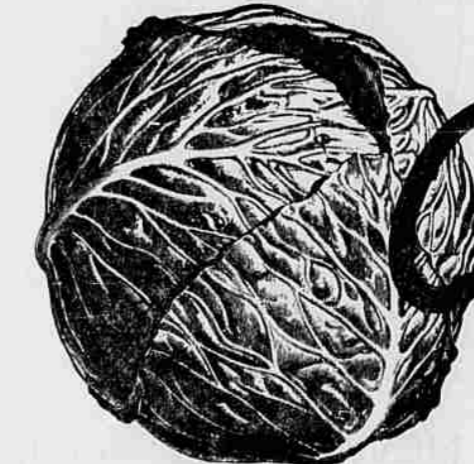

### Tension's Danger Signals Outlined In New Pamphlet

New York (Science Service) — Doing something for somebody else benefits a tense person whose attention has been dangerously fixed on himself.

"Tensions — and how to master them" is the new 25-cent pamphlet published by the Public Affairs Council. In it, Dr. George S. Benson and Harry Milt of a National Association for Mental Health point up the danger signals, causes and remedies when tension gets out of hand.

If feelings of inferiority, inadequacy and doubt become frequent and severe, if you are suffering from nervousness, if in addition to feeling something for somebody else, these suggestions are offered to relieve a moderate case of tension:

**Talk It Out** — Talk it out, escape for awhile, take one thing at a time, get rid of your anger, stop driving for superiority and, even when you are right, give in sometimes.

The pamphlet says doing something for somebody else will break the strange hold of moodiness, bring to the fore a feeling of strength and brings out sharing, generous impulses.

The authors say that anxiety and tensions are often felt together because anxiety acts as a trigger that sets off the tension. They define anxiety as the uneasy feeling you get in anticipation of a threat, whereas tension is the disturbed and upset feeling you get when your body mobilizes to deal with a real or imaginary threat.
