Moustronauts Are Leading Research in Space Travel

San Antonio (Science Service) — The future in space looks very good — at least for mice.

Sally, Amy and Moe, the Air Force moustronauts that flew almost 7000 miles into space at a speed of 17,000 miles an hour (Oct. 13) and lived to squeak about it, now are doing just that back at home base, "Home" for the mouse space pioneers is the Space Research Institute at the School of Aviation Medicine, Brooks Air Force base, Tex.

Radiation data recorded on the high-flying mice were revealed to Science Service in an exclusive meeting with the mice and Dr. Hans Clamman, the space institute's chief of space medicine. Their exposure to the dangerous radiation in the lower Van Allen belt, one of the known hazards of space flight for men and animals, has been evaluated.

400 Fatal Dose

"It is below ten roentgens for sure," Clamman said. Four hundred roentgens is the exposure dose fatal to 50 per cent of men and animals.

The mice were in the area of intense cosmic radiation for two minutes only. Space scientists have suggested that the danger of exposure to high levels of radiation in the Van Allen belts could be reduced by a swift passage through them. The three space mice have now proved that this is so.

The radiation story was recorded on miniature instruments, tiny specially prepared glass rod "dosimeters," each one-quarter of an inch long and one-tenth of an inch in diameter, and sensitive to radiation from one roentgen to 10,000 roentgens.

No Effects

None of the mice has so far shown any of the graying effects on their black fur that would indicate severe radiation exposure. All physical responses, heart beat, respiration, appetite, blood pressure, appear normal. They behave just like any other normal, healthy, frisky mice.

Neither exposure to high forces of gravity during launch and return nor their

fling at weightlessness that allowed them briefly to float through the air, appears to have had any detectable effect, physical or psychological. They are definitely not batty.

Whether their experience in space will affect future generations of the mice will be tested next. In about two weeks, the Discoverer "team" will be mated, with each other, and later with especially chosen members of the C-57 colony of Air Force mice to which they were once attached. The reproductive cycle of only 21 days will permit a thorough study of genetic effects of their ride on their offspring.

RETURNS TO SAN DIEGO

Water Safety Group May Be Activated To Advise County

The county court may activate a water safety committee to advise on enforcement of special boating regulations. The state marine board wrote the county court advising it to form such a committee, County Judge Earl Miller said yesterday.

The county court had directed Sheriff Joe Walsh to form such a committee last summer for establishing water safety regulations for Howard Prairie reservoir, Miller explained. The group consisted of representatives of sailing, water-skiing, fishermen and skin-diving groups. Regulations Established

Although the state legislature established such regulations along with the marine board at its last session many counties did not enforce the regulations since they did not understand them, Miller said. They must be enforced next season.

The marine board letter also replied to a letter sent it by the county court answering questions on use of marine license funds. Such questionnaires were sent out to all counties.

The county court had repiled it the approximately \$8,000 received into the general fund. It had budgeted \$3,500 so the sheriff's office could purchase a patrol boat and equipment. It also budgeted \$8,000 for adding two deputies for the marine patrol work.

"In other words, we budgeted \$4,000 more for marine law enforcement than we received last year from boat license fees," Miller explained.

AGREE ON CONTRACT
Hollywood—UPI—The American Federation of Musicians and major motion picture studios Wednesday night reached a tentative agreement on a 3 1/2-year work contract providing a 5 per cent wage increase Oct. 1, 1961, and an additional 7 per cent increase Nov. 1, 1962. The federation's 1,200 members will vote Saturday on whether to accept the pact.

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
