

Attorney's Office To Be Open Nov. 8

The United States attorney's office, district of Oregon, will be open from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Nov. 8, according to C. E. Luckey, U.S. attorney, Portland.

"Purpose of this is to enable prompt action relating to complaints of violations of federal election laws," Luckey said.

"Federal election laws are primarily concerned with conspiracies to stuff ballot boxes or to alter the election returns in favor of one of more candidates, bribery of voters, violence or other acts of intimidation toward voters to prevent them from voting, discrimination or prohibiting voters from using their right to vote because of race and conspiracy to misuse the absentee ballot provisions," the attorney said.

Matters involving state enforcement problems should be referred to appropriate local authorities, he added. These are illegal assistance, illegal presence in the polling place, and illegal campaigning at the polls, etc.

Medford Residents Attend Meeting of OTI Advisory Group

Edward Branchfield and Mrs. Moore Hamilton, both of Medford, attended the Oct. 28 meeting of the Oregon Technical Institute advisory council at the OTI campus, Klamath Falls.

Mrs. Leigh Gustison, a third council member from Medford, was unable to attend. Mrs. Hamilton is also a member of the state board of education.

Cost of moving the campus will be somewhat higher than the original estimate of \$14 million made in 1958-59, Dr. Winston Purvine, of OTI, explained to the group.

The new site is north of Klamath Falls and six miles from the present campus site. The first two buildings will be completed on the new campus between 1962 and 1963, accommodate 500 students and cost an estimated \$2 million, Dr. Purvine said.

The old campus will be vacated gradually. Dr. Purvine said the present plan of moving the campus during three bienniums will result in a somewhat greater operating cost but there will be counter-balances and advantages.

Courses moved to the new campus first will be those in engineering associates, medical associates and business associates. The metals and auto-diesel divisions will stay on the present campus where the laboratories with their heavy machines and equipment will remain until the final move.

Student housing will remain on the present campus throughout the period of split operation to accumulate more funds for building dormitories on the new campus, Dr. Purvine said.

During the meeting, Harley Libby, Jefferson, was elected chairman of the advisory council. He succeeds Jeff Bell, Portland. Others elected were Allen Leake, Helix, vice-chairman, Mrs. Luella O'Neill, Klamath Falls, secretary, Dr. Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction, Salem, was among those attending the meeting.

Dave Foote Wins Speech Contest
