

Phoenix High Defeats Sutherlin For District 6 A-2 Grid Mantle

Phoenix - Phoenix High's Blue and White Pirates, spearheaded by the workhorse ball-packer of fullback Mike Consruck, rampaged to their second straight District 6 A-2 diadem in football Friday night.

The Buccaneers, champions of the Rogue league, powered over Umpqua Valley loop tist Sutherlin 27 to 6 in the playoff fray at Sutherlin. They beat these same Bulldogs for the honors in 1959. State quarterfinal play will be next for Phoenix and it will be host to St. Francis of Eugene next week end. The skirmish probably will be Friday night at Phoenix.

In the 6 A-2 decision the Pirates ran up a 20 to 0 bulge over three cantos before the Bulldogs finally crossed the goal in the fourth. Consruck ran for two touchdowns, Dave Johnson for one and

Jerry Moore for the other. Gary Colfax booted three extra points. Wayne Fagan romped across the goal for Sutherlin.

Goals for 249

Consruck packed the ball on 32 of the 47 Pirate rushing plays and reeled off 249 yards. His teammate, Moore, carried for 58 on 11 tries. Two Consruck pass interceptions bolstered the Phoenix cause. Running the team effectively after Gerald Sloper left the game because of an injured nose was Sloper at quarterback. Linemen Bob Dickinson, Bill Seymour, John Kerns, Harry Gay, Bob Jacoba, Terry Hansen and Rickey slashed open the holes as the Pirates rushed for 407 net yards. Jerry and Dave Johnson, no relation, were the solid sparks on defense.

In the first quarter Consruck and Moore sparked a drive to the Sutherlin 11 yard

line before the Bulldog defense was able to hold. Sutherlin then moved the ball to its own 29 yard line where it was forced to punt. Phoenix received the ball on its own 36. Consruck rushed for four yards. Then Othar Richey fired a perfect pass down the middle to Dave Johnson who raced for a touchdown as the play covered 60 yards. Johnson crossed the goal line as the gun ended the period. Gary Colfax's kick was good.

Booming Kick

Sutherlin took the kickoff and moved to its own 35. Again Phoenix held and Sutherlin punter Jim Foster sent a booming kick. Phoenix took over on its own 17 yard line. The Pirates moved to the Sutherlin 30 in eight plays with Consruck going for runs of 15 and 20 yards. But a fourth down play failed as Sutherlin held. Sutherlin then moved into Phoenix territory as a pass from Laddie Crippen to Foster was good for 29 yards. But two plays later Mike Consruck intercepted another Crippen pass on the 20 yard line and raced to the Phoenix 45.

Then Consruck carried for seven, Othar Richey for 15, Consruck for 23 and the drive was climaxed by Jerry Moore going the last seven yards for Phoenix's second touchdown. Colfax's run was no good for the extra point. The score came with less than seven minutes to go in the first half.

Sutherlin took the second half kickoff and then an exchange of fumbles gave it the ball on its own 24 yard line. A pass from Dennis Arana to Foster put the ball on the Phoenix 19. But Phoenix Pirates rallied to the cause and forced the Bulldogs back to the 21 where they took over possession of the ball.

11 Plays Needed

Phoenix needed 11 plays to gain its next score, as it moved 74 yards down the field. Successive runs of 12 yards by Consruck and Monty Combs put the Pirates in scoring position. Mike Consruck carried for the final seven yards with less than a minute to go in the third quarter. Colfax's kick was good.

After taking a short kickoff on its 48 yard line as the third quarter ended, Sutherlin put together its only touchdown drive. A 22 yard

pass from Foster to Arana set up the score and then Wayne Fagin carried the last nine yards. Paul Treman's run for the extra point was no good.

Phoenix came right back for its final TD taking the ball on its own 20 yard line on the kickoff. Phoenix moved to the 48 and then Mike Consruck climaxed a brilliant performance by breaking through the middle and to the left to race 52 yards standing up for the TD. Colfax's kick was good.

A final desperation drive, which included passes for 22 and 40 yards, by Sutherlin was stopped on the Phoenix nine. The final gun sounded as Mike Consruck intercepted his second pass of the evening.

Ann Arbor - IPI - A two-point pass conversion Saturday lifted Michigan to an 8-7 Big Ten football victory over Illinois and gave Wolverine coach Bump Elliott a decision in the first round of a "family argument" with brother Pete who coaches the Illini.

The brother - against brother clash was the first college football has seen since 1922.

Illinois tallied first, taking advantage of a recovered fumble and moving 18 yards late in the first period. But the Wolverines took the ensuing kickoff and marched 80 yards in 14 plays for the tying touchdown.

North Bend, South Eugene District 5 A-1 Victors; Jeff, David Douglas Win

United Press International - Six of Oregon's eight high school class A-1 district football championships were filled Friday night.

Medford's top-rated Black Tornado, who won the state championship last year, led the way with a 52-6 victory against Grants Pass for the district six title.

North Salem gained the district eight crown by defeating crosstown rival South Salem, 27-7; Jefferson won the district one title by knocking off Benson, 7-0; David Douglas topped Central Catholic, 34-3, for the district three championship; Newberg won the district four race by beating Oregon City, 31-7, and Jesuit became the district two winner with a 14-7 victory over Silverton.

The district five and seven titles remained undecided. Voting will decide both championships.

South Eugene defeated North Eugene, 20-13, and North Bend topped Marshfield, 28-18, to end the district five race with 4-1 records.

Three-Way Knot

And in district seven, Pendleton, The Dalles and Bend all ended with 6-1 records. Pendleton beat Hermiston, 21-6; The Dalles topped Prineville, 21-7; and Bend defeated Redmond, 27-13, in district-ending games.

District seven was scheduled to vote today for its representative in the state grid playoffs and district five will vote Monday.

In class A-2, Willamina, Myrtle Point, Phoenix, Milton-Freewater and Central won district titles to join Se-

side, Newport and St. Francis, earlier winners, in the state playoffs.

The A-1 playoff picture next weekend will find Jefferson at David Douglas, the district five representative at Medford, Jesuit at Newberg and the district seven representative at North Salem.

In the class A-2 first playoff round, Seaside will be at Willamina, Newport at Myrtle Point, St. Francis at Phoenix and Milton-Freewater at Central.

Bulldogs Trip Hedrick in City 9th Grade Tilt

With one state prep football championship under the Medford belt and another being bid for, many fans wonder about the next few years.

There's no need to. The mighty Black Tornado should not fear for the future.

Saturday afternoon, this was shown as the ninth grade gridders from McLoughlin Junior high took the city football title from the Hornets of Hedrick on the senior high school field by a score of 21-13.

In a game never out of reach, Mac drew first blood and managed to stay ahead.

Taking the kickoff, Ron Edmonds ran back 12 yards to the 43. On the very first play from scrimmage, Mike Barnes passed to Bill Houston for 57 yards and a touchdown. Cliff Roberts ran for the extra marker as the Bulldogs took a 7-0 lead.

March 40 Yards

Mac kicked off to Hedrick. Tim Murray grabbed the ball and raced 20 yards to the 40 only to be hit and jarred loose from the pigskin. Mac took over as Lonnie Walters and Terry Winetrot recovered. A march of 40 yards ended with Edmonds punching across from the six. Roberts again got the conversion to up the lead to 14-0.

Passing and running after the next kickoff, the Hornets went 57 yards in eight plays to set up a TD. The six points came in the form of a pass from Larry Vowell to Mur-

ray. Richard Knight missed the PAT and the quarter ended 14-6.

A hard fought, seesawing second period saw no score but a lot of action. Despite a hard try by both sides, the halftime score remained the same as the quarter, 14-6.

After an also scoreless third canto, all fury broke loose, and the scoring was on. Forcing the Bulldogs to punt, the Hornets, buzzing mad, were on the way to a counter. Smart running by Greg Gander, Walter Verstrate, and Murray moved the ball down the yardstrips and into position for Murray to smash over from two away. This time Chris Rasmussen ran the extra across to narrow the game at 14-13.

Mac, staying calm, steadily moved the ball after the kickoff. This time, from the 39-yard line, Barnes again teamed with Houston, using the same pattern, to score. Edmonds made the conversion as the Bulldogs forged ahead 21-13.

With little time left, the Hornets went after one more. In a series that was highlighted by a 54-yard run-pass from Knight to Murray they moved to the Mac five. On the following play Verstrate went for two. Then, the breaks went to Mac. A touchdown seeming sure, Murray fumbled and the Black and Yellow recovered with seconds left. They held on and won the game 21-13.

Jim Luce Sets Mark

New York-IPI-Jim Luce of Augustana college (S.D.) completed 22 of 25 passes in his final collegiate game last week to break an all-time record for accuracy and take over the small college leadership in forward passing.

Luce's accuracy mark of 88 per cent against North Dakota constitutes a new one-game collegiate mark and his season's total of 105 completions vaults him ahead of Whitewater State's Roger Johnson for passing honors, according to official statistics released today by the NCAA service bureau.
