**Edith Green's Apartment Full of Oregon Pictures**

Washington - Rep. Edith Green (D-Ore.), who is considered a possible choice for a cabinet post in a Democratic administration, decorates her Washington apartment with large, framed, color photographs of Oregon scenery.

She told an interviewer from the National Association of Home Builders that she doubts that writers on interior decoration would approve of this, but, she said, the photographs are of scenes she loves.

Every time her eye falls on the photos, such as a scene with Mt. Hood in the background, it raises her spirits. Her unique decoration is admired by her Washington friends and at least some fellow members of Congress have vowed they must spend a vacation in Oregon's natural beauty spots after seeing her pictures.

**Possible Secretary**  
Mrs. Green, a handsome woman of 50 and the mother of two sons, is being mentioned as a possible choice for secretary of health, education and welfare, if voters on Nov. 8 should send Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) to the White House. Mrs. Green shrugs off such talk as "sheer rumor" and says her only interest is in being re-elected to a fourth term in the House, where she represents metropolitan Portland.

However, Mrs. Green came out for Kennedy early this year and her support is credited with helping him win the Oregon primary. That victory in turn contributed to his capturing the Democratic nomination.

By training and experience, she has background for a HEW cabinet post. A teacher in the Oregon public schools for 14 years, she has been active in the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers and in the Oregon Education association. In the House, she is a member of the labor and education committee which handles legislation affecting the HEW.

Mrs. Green never lived in an apartment until coming to Washington. In Portland, she has a white stucco house in an attractive residential district near Reed college. It is a house into which she and her husband moved when their sons were grown and they no longer required the

larger home in which they had been living.

Their present home in Portland is the third they have had. They bought their first home the second year they were married. It was a brand new house in Salem. When they moved to Portland they sold it and bought another.

**Enjoys Outdoors**  
During the summers in Portland, Mrs. Green particularly enjoys her patio and outside barbecue. She said her husband "is good at barbecuing hamburgers and steaks." Like many housewives, she apparently is happy to turn the outdoor cooking over to him.

In Washington the Greens live in a good-sized apartment with a living room, dining room and breakfast nook. She has furnished the living room in shades of rose and beige with green drapes on the large window that overlooks a wooded area.

"It is nice to see the trees in winter and when there is fresh snow, the scene is so clean and restful," she said. "I miss getting out of doors and the view from the window is sort of compensation."

Her Capitol Hill office also is decorated with pictures of the Oregon scenes she loves so much. Although she feels that she may not be abiding by the top rules of interior decorating by displaying the pictures she has in her apartment, Mrs. Green said smilingly, "I am sure my guests are people of good judgment who also appreciate good Oregon scenery." Regardless of what interior decorators might say of Mrs. Green's decor, the Oregon Chamber of Commerce most certainly should applaud.
