"Circulatory Disorders" will be discussed on "Adventures in Medicine" over KBES-TV at 5 o'clock this afternoon. The series of bi-weekly programs on health is presented by the Jackson County Tuberculosis and Health Association in cooperation with the Jackson County Medical Society.

Mekvold Returns From Conference

County School Superintendent Alf B. Mekvold attended the recent annual conference of the department of rural education, National Education Association, at Louisville, Ky. Theme of the convention was "shifting scenes in rural America."

Major speeches included "Implications of Change for School Administration," by Alfred W. Beattie, superintendent of schools, Allegheny county, Pittsburgh, Pa.; and a banquet address by Kentucky Gov. Burt T. Combs.

Other topics discussed included coordinating educational efforts within the county, the county school office in a metropolitan area, problems and promises of a county high school, the county school office's struggle for survival, central staff of a county unit, emerging role of the intermediate unit, organizing to strengthen the county superintendent, developing good working relationships with local districts, financing intermediate units, strengthening county units through larger service areas and problems involved in city-county mergers. At special assemblies developments in educational television and use of audio-visual techniques in school public relations were discussed.

Dr. Fred C. Lorish, internist, Medford, and Dr. Robert M. Turner, general practitioner, Ashland, will explain major causes of circulatory disorders, discuss common symptoms, prevention, and describe medical treatment for the disease.

Dr. Brian D. Stringer, general surgeon, Medford, will explain what can be done surgically to correct or alleviate certain circulatory disorders when medical treatment alone cannot halt their progress. The use of x-rays as a diagnostic aid will be illustrated by Dr. Stringer, who will compare and explain films of normal and diseased arteries.

Because recent programs have dealt with circulatory problems causing strokes and heart attacks, the one Sunday will be concerned chiefly with circulatory disorders involving the extremities, Mrs. Burton noted.

Bench Location Plan Is Studied

A proposal from the Crater Lions club to locate benches at various bus stops in the city was deferred for further study by the Medford city council Thursday night.

Richard K. Walsh, chairman of the Crater Lions club bench project, addressed the council and said the benches would be installed partially as an advertising venture. Walsh said the benches would be located on city parking strips. There would be no benches in residential areas, he said, and there would be no advertising on benches located in the immediate downtown area.

Councilman Stanley Stark asked City Attorney Joel Reeder if it is possible for the council to authorize a commercial enterprise on city property. Reeder said he doesn't think so, but there is some question about it so further study will be given to the matter.

Chattanooga, Tenn. — Police describing the reaction of former West Palm Beach, Fla., City Judge Joseph A. Peel Jr., who was arrested on charges of arranging the murder of a prominent Florida judge and his wife:
"He had an expression of complete surprise on his face."

Los Angeles—Grant Cooper, attorney for Dr. R. Bernard Finch, challenging Judge Leroy Dawson for telling the jury he thought they should reach a verdict in the murder trial of Finch and Carole Treggoff:
"It seems obvious your remarks . . . only added coercive effect on the jurors voting not guilty."

Leopoldville, The Congo—Albert Bolela, commissioner for information in Col. Joseph Mobutu's provisional government, responding to U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld's demand that Belgium withdraw its technicians from The Congo:
"We are a free nation . . . The United Nations cannot impose its technicians on us. We are free to engage technicians who we can understand even if they are Zulus."

Secaucus, N.J. — Tavernkeeper Henry Krajewski, the "Poor Man's Party" candidate for president, recalling his campaign for write-in votes:

26 of 99 Major Offenses Cleared During October

Medford city police cleared 26 of 99 major offenses reported to them during October for a 26.3 per cent cleared average, according to Medford Police Chief Charles P. Champlin's monthly report.

During the same month in 1959, police cleared 34 of 103 cases reported for a 33 per cent average.

Of the major offenses reported last month, 14 of them were burglaries, of which two were cleared; 78 were larcenies of which 21 were cleared; and seven were auto thefts, of which three were cleared.

Miscellaneous Offenses
There were 697 miscellaneous offenses reported during the month of which 580 were cleared for a 83.2 per cent cleared average. Included in the miscellaneous offenses were four assaults and four sex crimes.

On Medford streets there were 61 traffic accidents resulting in 10 injuries. There were no fatalities. This total is down from October, 1959, when 88 accidents resulting in 16 injuries were reported.

The department issued 430 traffic citations during October, compared to 426 for the same month during 1959. Of these, the greatest number, 88, were issued for violation of the basic rule, and 77 were issued for no stop at sign or signal.

A total of 3,640 parking meter tickets were issued last month, compared by 3,681 during October, 1959.

2,394 Visit Museum In Jacksonville in Oct.

Jacksonville—Visitors from 32 states, Canada, Austria, Okinawa and Korea were among the 2,394 persons visiting the Jacksonville museum during October, according to Miss Mary Hanley, curator. Group visitors included members of the American Association of Collectors, Oregon chapter; the third and fourth grades of the West Side school, a Medford Brownie troop and the seventh grade Sunday school class of the Medford Methodist church.

Gifts and loans included a book and Indian artifacts from William A. Salade, Medford; a newspaper, "The People's Press," Jacksonville, 1874; from Lenthal L. Bennett, Ashland; and books, newspapers, letters and documents from

John Billings, also of Ashland. Many of Billings' gifts provide a record of the Southern Oregon Chautauqua association which held assemblies in Lithia park from the early 1890's until 1918, according to Miss Hanley.

Also received were a collection of home laundry irons, a camera, a sewing machine, from Wendell Kelly, Eugene; a photograph and stone Indian axes from Maude W. Cooke, Portland; and a collection of decorated ivory articles from Alaska, Rogue River Indian arrow points, plus varied Alaskan Indian artifacts and miscellaneous items from Miss Agnes Love, also of Portland. Miss Love is a granddaughter of B. F. Dowell, pioneer Jacksonville lawyer, Miss Hanley noted.

6C Education Group Discusses Proposals

Central Point—Proposed school legislation was discussed by the legislative committee of the District 6C education association at the Central Point Junior High school recently.

Those attending discussed tentative proposals of the state representative councils of the Oregon Legislative Interim Committees on Education and Taxation and of the Oregon School Boards association.

Results of the discussion will form the basis for a district wide association meeting Nov. 29. Members then will formally instruct the association's delegate to the representative council, Ogden Kellogg.

"The committee was impressed by the number of issues on which education associations, school board associations and legislative committees are in agreement," according to Bill Russell, association member.

Discussions were on the basic school support formula, tenure practices, and means of achieving the association's legislative objectives.
