Study Shows X-ray Relationship to Leukemia Small

London—(Science Service)—A 12-year study of the case records of pregnant women who had abdominal X-ray examinations before their children were born has challenged the belief that X-ray exposure during pregnancy may cause a greater risk of leukemia to the child.

The study by Dr. W. M. Court Brown and Dr. Richard Doll covered maternity cases in four London hospitals and four in Edinburgh, Scotland. The total number of children involved was 39,166.

The doctors reported to the Royal Society of Medicine that up to 1958, only nine of these children had died of leukemia. Compared with the British national rate for mortality from leukemia, this rate is 1.5 below average.

The rate shows that the additional X-ray examinations did not produce an excess of leukemia deaths, Brown and Doll believe. They said their investigation contradicts the figures presented two years ago by Dr. Alice M. Stewart, head of the department of public health and social medicine at Oxford University.

Risk Doubled Dr. Stewart and her colleagues in their pregnancy survey had then said that they found that X-rays to a pregnant woman's abdomen was likely to double the risk of the child dying from an excessive number of leucocytes in the blood or from cancer before the age of ten.

Brown and Doll believe their investigation was as objective as possible and that the 12-year period covered by the investigation was adequate for leukemia to have developed, if it was going to at all, although there may be possible sources of inaccuracy in their work.

However, in accordance with the best radiological practice, they urged continued avoidance of unnecessary X-ray examinations during pregnancies.

Polio Vaccine More Effective

Chicago—(Science Service)—Salk polio vaccine has been found to be more effective when given with diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough vaccines in combined injection than when given alone.

This is reported in the current Journal of the American Medical Association, a long with these findings from research.

Asphalt Mulching For Arid Lands

Washington—(Science Service)—Dry weather, the plague of the farmer and the home gardener, faces a formidable adversary in a new asphalt mulching technique that can be applied directly to arid lands, or sprayed on narrow seed beds.

The cost per acre is estimated at approximately \$30, completely coated, or only \$5 to \$10 for range reseeding, if the "band method" is used.

Developed by Esso Research & Engineering Co., the material is being field-tested on a variety of crops and grasses, in different climate and soils. The resultant films are resistant to the erosive forces of nature for up to four months and are easily penetrated by a wide variety of grasses and vegetables. No toxic effects of the films on the various plants tested in the laboratory were noticed.

The asphalt mix is applied directly over seed beds, to trap the available moisture needed for germination and subsequent growth. Later rains "recharge" the zones, under the coated bands, to continue the process.

Drug Decreases Size of Tumors For Short Time

Philadelphia—(Science Service)—Nineteen of 58 patients with inoperable cancer of the gastrointestinal tract showed decrease in the size of their tumors after treatment with 5-fluorouracil, Dr. Dr. Arthur J. Weiss, coordinator of the cancer chemotherapy group of Jefferson Medical College here, reported to the American College of Gastroenterology.

Improvement lasted from six weeks to three months in 15 of the patients and in four it lasted for a longer time. Weiss emphasized, however, that 5-fluorouracil is an extremely dangerous drug requiring close supervision by the physician.

Side Effects Side effects include lowering of the blood count at first, diarrhea and inflammation of the mouth. In spite of these effects, 21 per cent of the patients treated said they felt better, even though no decrease in the size of their tumors could be seen.

Both colon and stomach cancer were treated with some response. Only one case of cancer of the liver showed improvement. Assisting Weiss in the treatment was Dr. Laird Jackson, a resident in medicine at the Jefferson hospital here.

Five-fluorouracil was first synthesized by Dr. Charles Heidelberger at the University of Wisconsin in 1957 and tested there at the McArdle Memorial Laboratory on animals. The present study of the chemical's effects includes the largest number of humans treated to date.
