Editor's Note: The Family Council consists of a judge, a psychiatrist, three clergymen, three editors and a women's editor. Each article is a summary of an actual case history. The Council reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Rosalind M. - He's disabled and makes a shocking proposal.

Lloyd M. - I'm sorry for her. I want to be generous.

Rosalind M. - My husband had a stroke two years ago. While he recovered most of his faculties, movement is extremely difficult and he spends much time in a wheelchair.

chair. Having a heart condition too, he has been cautioned against sexual relations.

It is embarrassing to me even to mention the weird suggestion he made the other day. An attractive widower is a friend of ours. When his wife was alive we used to travel around as a foursome. Lloyd wants to give us formal permission, in writing if we wish, to indulge in an affair!

To add to my discomfort, I am a delegate to a convention in Denver which this man must also attend. My husband says, "Go ahead and have a good time there." How can I handle this?

Lloyd M. - I'm no dog in the manger. I'm sorry for my wife. She's only 40 years old and I can't bear to watch her wasting her years away.

I know my idea sounds peculiar, but if the tables were turned, if she were the disabled one, I think I'd appreciate an offer along those lines. I don't know whether I'd act on it, but I'd like to know my wife was broad-minded.

What's wrong with telling Rosalind right out that I think she has a right to fill her needs that she can't expect me to fill ever again? This man is a fine fellow. If Rosalind wants me to, I'll talk this over with him, too. I can't figure out what's so terrible.

The Council: Lloyd doesn't see that his brainstorm which to his mind hurts nobody bids fair to hurt three people sorely.

In the first place, it's immoral. The idea of a "vice husband" sanctioned by a husband for his wife affronts the sensitivities of all three on the grounds of right and wrong.

Then Lloyd may ask himself whether he's really being broadminded or just mischievous. Isn't he fanning flames so that he can watch a fire? An undertone of prurient interest creeps into his "altruistic" invitation, and that angle might require professional help.

Without realizing it, he might have counted on his wife's "reports" for vicarious experience.

Added to Rosalind's shock and disbelief is the suspicion that her husband is merely testing her. He may want to hear her vigorous, decisive no.

And what of the other man? He is assumed to be willing to participate in an arrangement which has no chance of making anyone feel good. Perhaps he's smart enough to know that.

But the basic error Lloyd is making is his lifting one part of the delicate husband-wife relationship out of its proper context and giving it undue importance. No matter what Freud says (and his views are still debatable), the sex relation in marriage is part-and-parcel of an elaborate and complex network of other relations. By itself, it's little more than an animal activity. Intermeshed with spiritual and mental and emotional lines of sympathy and friendship, as in a sound marriage, it's one more bond among many.

Lloyd need not feel "sorry" for Rosalind. In tending and remaining true to him, she is exercising a new corner of her heart. Sublimation comes to her rescue. We see examples all around of joyous, effective and functioning people who have never married. They are propelled and fueled by secretions released from the wellsprings of kindness, tenderness and unselfishness.

Phil Moyer Will Fight Fernandez

New York - (UPI) - Welterweight contender Florentino Fernandez, Havana, meets Phil Moyer, Portland, Ore., Saturday at Madison Square Garden in a nationally televised 10-rounder that features election week's light boxing schedule.

Oregon Phil is a brother of Denny Moyer, welter contender. Phil is trying to climb into the top 10 ratings with Denny.

Fernandez, a formidable slugger, seeks his 22nd knock-out in 28 victories. Only two defeats are charged against him. Moyer's 21-3-1 record includes seven kayos.

Also on Saturday an attractive 10-rounder is slated for Buffalo, N.Y., where middleweights Joey Giambra, Buffalo, and Rory Calhoun, White Plains, N.Y., square off. Contender Giambra will try to avenge his defeat by Calhoun in 1957. Their bout will not be televised.

Minnesota's Gophers, all but disowned on their own campus last year, today appear headed for the nation's most lucrative post - season game - the Rose Bowl - following their 27-10 upset victory over top-ranked Iowa last Saturday.

Washington, winner of the Pasadena classic last New Year's Day and 34-0 victor over Southern California Saturday, is the top choice to fill the spot against Minnesota while Missouri, Mississippi and Arkansas also furthered their prospects of bowl assignments with week end victories.

With two weeks of the season to go, here's how the picture for major bowl games shapes up:

Rose - Washington (7-1) vs. Minnesota (7-0).

Sugar - Mississippi (7-0-1) vs. Baylor (5-2) or Rice (5-2).

Orange - Missouri (8-0) vs. Duke (6-1).

Cotton - Arkansas (6-2) vs. Alabama (5-1-1), or Navy (7-1).

Portland - (UPI) - Senior Jim Altenhofen, a 6-5 forward, Friday was elected to captain the 1960 University of Portland basketball team.

Altenhofen, who was elected by teammates, led the Pilots in scoring last year with a 16.2 points-per-game average.

Corvallis - (UPI) - The Oregon State-Houston football game in 1961 has been rescheduled, according to Beaver Athletic Director R. S. Keene. The contest, which will be played at Houston, has been moved from Oct. 28 to Dec. 2 by mutual agreement of the two schools.

Sign Miss Costly To SF Eleven

San Francisco - (UPI) - It's back to the school books for the San Francisco Forty Niners today - something about learning the signals.

Suffering from the shock after a 24-0 thumping by the underdog Detroit Lions Sunday, coach Red Hickey's boys will have two weeks to brush up on their play. They have an open date this week end, then meet the cellar-dwelling Dallas Cowboys on Nov. 20.

It was the first time San Francisco has been shut out in 59 games, dating back to 1955.

The Forty Niners tried mightily against the Lions - and knocked at the door time and again. But superb defense by the Lions' line, plus some heady work in the secondary by the great Dick (Night Train) Lane, held the San Francisco attack at bay.

"It was a missed signal that caused Perry to be thrown back to the 10-yard line on fourth down when we were on the Detroit 25 late in the game," said coach Red Hickey. "Quarterback John Brodie was calling a fake audible - but Perry took him seriously."

"Joe was supposed to go over tackle, but instead tried end." Perry was trapped on the 10 by Lane.

Another time San Francisco was threatening, at the five yard line, when Lane intercepted a pass and ran it out.

A third time San Francisco was threatening on the Detroit 25 when Abe Woodson took a pitch-out from Brodie. Abe was supposed to toss the ball back to Brodie. But when he looked around a defensive player was standing there instead of John. The result was Woodson spent about 30 seconds running back and forth across the field going nowhere.

Washington Top Runner For Bowl

With George Fleming getting off a 65-yard touchdown run and accounting for 16 points, the Huskies powered by Southern California, 34-0, on Saturday to take a full game lead in the Big Five race which determines the Coast's Pasadena delegate.

They meet California next Saturday at Seattle and the expected victory would put coach Jim Owens' candidates well over the top. The Golden Bears, losers in six out of eight games, took a 28-0 whipping from UCLA last Saturday.

Ted Brewster's two successful extra point kicks were the difference as Lewis and Clark nipped Southern Oregon, 14-12. Linfield romped to a 40-14 triumph against Portland State.

Oregon Tech, the OCC champion, topped Whitman, 14-7, in the other game matching schools of the two conferences.

Halfback Bob Pannel scored three touchdowns on two runs of two yards and an 85-yard punt return to pace Oregon College of Education of the OCC to a 19-8 triumph over British Columbia.
