New York—UPI—A jewel which has held special significance for mankind over the past 6,000 years is the emerald. This flashing green gem was the Biblical symbol of kindness.

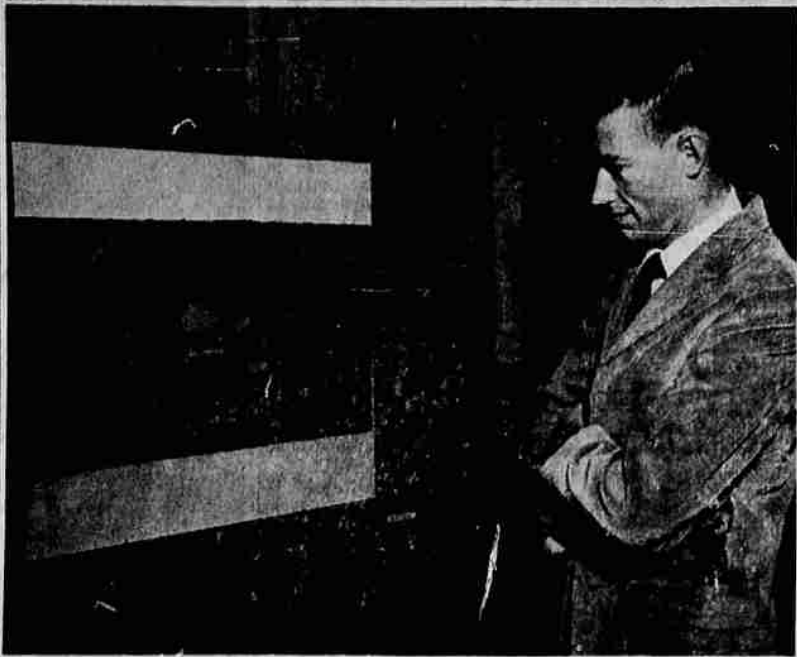
"The Ages, it was believed that a seer could see into the depths of the jewel to solve domestic problems.

Collecting Described As 'Virulent Disease'

New York—UPI—As a squirrel catches nuts, many of us collect things for the home.

Decorators say the number of collectors is on the increase, and those to whom I've talked list three major reasons. More of us have the money to

spend on a collecting hobby, some of us are urged by nostalgia to start gathering glass, china or other items remembered from childhood, and often we have the profit motive in mind—hope that collections will grow in value through the years.

But Mr. Wormley, who called his talk the "A-B-Seeze of collecting," had gathered comment from experts in the field of psychiatry and sociology on why we catch the disease.

Another saw collecting as "in part the beginning of a transfer of love of people to love of things." Still another saw the true collector, not as a squirrel-like hoarder, but as a "educated amateur who collects things for the love of themselves and in that sense he is making his life livable."

A sociologist told Mr. Wormley that most collectors collect to seek status—"They are usually trying to give themselves an early American background."

Mr. Wormley told the group that his "excursion through the jungles of human motivation" left him a little embarrassed "because I find such inordinate . . . pleasure in pursuing my own instincts of a pack rat."

Everything But Money
"We all have known of the pathetic alcoholic who conceives his spouse by concealing his last bottle on strings hung out the window," he continued. "Well, I have to find ways and means to hide loot I have bought-to hide it from my business associate who watches the checkbook."

Mr. Wormley said people "do collect the damndest things. I have before me 'The Beginning Antique Collector's Handbook and Guide to 1,000 Items to Collect'."

It listed, among other things, grape scissors, gemels, eye cups, whimsys, puzzle mugs, Naughty Nellie boot jacks, patch boxes for beauty spots, Bible clasps, watch papers, swan skin fans, buskboards, corset laces, moustache curlers, tiddley-winks, gophering irons, courting mirrors and finally something called zoetropes.

"These merely give you an idea," said the designer. "The only collectibles missing from this listing I can think of are: Money. And names, for dropping purposes."

New Wrinkle
Lincoln, Neb.—UPI—To remove a wrinkle from resin-treated fabrics, first steam iron the area to flatten and to set the material. Then, apply vinegar with a medicine dropper to the wrinkle while the cloth is still hot.

The fabric should be left to absorb the acid for a minute or two, then run the iron over the area until the material is dry. The advice is from Gerda Petersen, extension clothing specialist at the University of Nebraska.
