Drug Controls Blood Fats in Diabetics

St. Louis, Mo. — (Science Service) — Tablets containing heparin were successful in controlling blood fats for some diabetics, Dr. John F. Finley, Hahnemann Medical College, Philadelphia, reported at the Southern Medical Association meeting here.

Dr. Finley, a specialist in eye disorders, said the damage to tiny blood vessels of the eye, which makes diabetes the second-ranking cause of blindness in the United States, appears to be due to an excess of fats, rather than sugar, in the blood. It has long been believed, Dr. Finley said, that the insulin which keeps blood sugar under control will also control blood fats.

In four of five patients treated with heparin for 18 months, improvement was seen in the eye lesions, but Dr. Finley's study is preliminary. He said three to five years of additional treatment may be required to "clarify the results of correction of the fat transport disorder."

Babies Spur Increase In Planting of Trees

Lockport, N.Y. — There are indications that babies' appetites are going to spur a moderate increase in pear tree plantings in Niagara county.

Fruit growers say baby food manufacturers think pears are among babies' favorite foods, and the nation's healthy birth rate may mean a greater demand.

Beats Bishops' Opposition

Puerto Rico Voters Return Munoz Marin For Fourth Term

San Juan, Puerto Rico — (UPI) — Puerto Rican voters swept Luis Munoz Marin back into office for his fourth term as governor despite bitter opposition from the island's three Roman Catholic bishops, final election returns showed today.

The semi-official returns gave Munoz, the Popular Democratic party candidate, 58.34 per cent of the 782,205 ballots cast, only a shade less than the 60-odd per cent he has averaged in previous elections. The party wants Puerto Rico to retain its present status as a commonwealth of the United States.

The second place Statehood Republican party candidate, Luis A. Ferré, polled 32.04 per cent. Neither the church-endorsed Christian Action party nor the last-place Independence party polled the 10 per cent of the total vote required for retention on the ballot in future elections.

Although Munoz's victory had never been in doubt — he is the only elected governor Puerto Rico has ever had, and the "Munoz habit" is well established — church opposition had been expected to cause a major reduction in his majority.

Vote Said To Be Sin — In two pastoral letters and a variety of statements, the island's three Roman Catholic bishops had forbidden their communicants to vote for Munoz's popularists, saying it would be a sin to do so.

Political observers attributed Munoz's strength to the "brilliant fight" he put up against his clerical opponents in what had otherwise been expected to be an apathetic campaign.

"I am proud to be one of a people that knows how to make political decisions without yielding to pressure of any kind," Munoz said early today at a victory party in his home in suburban Trujillo Alto.

Shivering Control Mechanism Found

Los Angeles — (Science Service) — The mechanism that controls shivering on these nippy days has been located.

Physiologist Douglas Stuart of the University of California Medical School, Los Angeles, has found a region in the rear portion of that part of the brain known as the hypothalamus that apparently initiates the shivering response.

When this region is electrically stimulated via a tiny electrode in experimental animals, they will shiver as if they were cold. When the same region is destroyed, the animals are unable to shiver in the presence of cold.

Shivering is nature's way of generating heat economically, Stuart points out. It produces heat without external work, such as is necessary in running or jumping up and down.

In order to warm up the body appreciably, shivering requires another action simultaneously. This involves a constricting of surface blood vessels, which helps preserve heat that would otherwise be dissipated into the air. This action also is controlled from the hypothalamus but from another portion of it.

Atom Models Made From Science Kit

Washington — (Science Service) — Models of atoms and molecules can be made from the current experimental unit, THINGS of science, issued by Science Service here.

The kit contains materials representing protons, neutrons, electrons, carbon atoms, oxygen atoms and hydrogen atoms. Instructions tell how to build five models of atoms and more than 100 models of molecules of chemical compounds.

With this unit the three isotopes of helium can be modeled. Chemical models of water, carbon dioxide, alcohol, vinegar, anti-freeze, ether, natural gas, and many other molecules can be built. The unit includes a discussion of the classification and significance of these atoms and compounds.

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Music Instrument Helps Blind Read

London — (Science Service) — The blind can now "read" with the help of an instrument that translates the printed page into musical notes.

The optophone, which dispenses with Braille and elaborate tape recordings, was invented during World War I. Researchers at St. Dunstan's Home for the Blind here have modified it into a reading machine that uses photoelectric cells.

The apparatus holds a book in place while a point of light traverses each line at a controlled speed. Simultaneously it converts the printed letters into musical sounds, the pitch varying with the shape of the letters.

The Roman alphabet has only six basic sounds. By learning about the optophone's chords and permutations a blind person may read 46 words a minute.

Allergies Found To New Penicillin

Boston — (Science Service) — Two patients have shown extreme sensitivity to the new "synthetic" penicillin called phenethicillin.

Because allergy to penicillin makes its use difficult, if not impossible, in some patients, the new product raised hope that it could be used safely in patients who previously had shown allergic reactions to penicillin.

Both patients who reacted unfavorably to the new penicillin were women, Drs. Leo H. Cripe, University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine, and Herman Friedman, Temple University School of Medicine, Philadelphia, reported in the New England Journal of Medicine.
