

Beefy T Formation Club Quarterfinal Rival of Tornados

A T formation team beefy in both the line and the backfield will oppose the Medford High school Black Tornado when the South Eugene Axemen come here Friday night for the Oregon Class A-1 championship playoff quarterfinals.

The Axemen boast quick and fast backs in an attack which is generated by Bo Blair, a 204-pound 6-4 quarterback who was a second team all-state hoop player last year.

South Eugene, tutored for the 10th season by Loyd Amick, are exponents of the "belly series" off the straight T. The Axemen use quick dives to advantage. They do a considerable amount of passing—at least more than the Black Tornado.

South's team from the Emerald Empire has a 186-pound plus average in the line to Medford's 179 or less. And, its backfield average is 181 to Medford's 172.

Dave Fluke, a 173-pound halfback and 10-second 100-yard runner, is the rushing leader for the Axemen. He's covered 616 yards in 110 carries. Bob Ferguson, 185-pound fullback, has been next busiest back with 371 yards on 73 times with the ball. Ross Carter, 170 halfback, has 316 yards for 61 times and Jim Brooke, 162 half, 247 for 56.

Blair has paced the club in passing with 34 completions on 58 throws for 548 yards. Fluke has been the principal receiver with eight catches for 176 yards. Brooke and Scott Peterman, 160 end, have caught six each for 100 and 85 yards, respectively. Jim Mooney, 160 end, has snared five for 116.

Blair and Dave Tobey, 203 center, are the beefiest Axemen starters on offense. Doug Marsh, an end, is 195 and Paul Haines, a guard, is 192. Tackles are Art Bish, 188, and Chuck Flynn, 185. Jim Tynan, a guard, weighs 181.

Other heavies on the squad include Dan Aldrich, 201, center, and John Blair, 215, tackle.

Tornado Bruised
On the home front Coach Fred Spiegelberg and his staff are priming a Tornado club which is much bruised and battered after a rough engagement last Friday at Grants Pass.

Winner of the South Eugene-Medford mix goes into the semifinals against either David Douglas or Jefferson of Portland. Those two clubs vie on Thursday night, setting their game at that time in order that the winner can scout the game here. Spiegelberg and Lee Ragsdale, supervisor of physical education in the Medford schools, will take in the game at David Douglas.

It was announced from Medford high that no person will be allowed inside the fire fence surrounding the playing field at the stadium on Friday unless he has a field pass. Persons, such as photographers, who are entitled to field passes, may obtain them from Ragsdale at the stadium prior to the game.

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Gophers, Tigers Favored By Seven

New York—(UPI)—Top-ranked Minnesota and second-ranked Missouri both are seven-point favorites to maintain their perfect records Saturday in a pair of key college football games.

The Golden Gophers, unbeaten in seven games this season, entertain Purdue and Missouri's Tigers visit Oklahoma in search of their ninth straight victory.

In the nationally televised game of the week, third-ranked Ohio State is a slim one-point choice over Iowa, which slipped from first to sixth place after bowing to Minnesota last week.

The only even-money game listed by the addsmakers was Georgia Tech vs. Alabama. Texas was picked by only a half-point over Texas Christian and Oklahoma State by only a half-point over Nebraska.
