Eugene, Ore. — (UPI) — The University of Oregon Ducks concentrated on new offensive formations Tuesday in preparation for Saturday's game in Portland against West Virginia.

Coach Len Casanova said two of his gridders will not see action in the intersectional game. Fullback Bruce Snyder suffered a knee injury in the Stanford game, and guard Mike Rose was sidelined with a shoulder and neck injury in the Washington game.

PASS DEFENSE

Corvallis, Ore. — (UPI) — The Oregon State Beavers worked on pass defense for two hours Tuesday in preparation for Saturday's game with Stanford — the top passing team in the Big Five.

Coach Tommy Prothro said end Aaron Thomas would see action in the Palo Alto game, after spending five weeks on the injury list. Hank Rivera, a former fullback who was shifted to end, will return to his old spot in the backfield.

Newcomers Dominate Statistics

New York — (UPI) — A new era seems to be dawning in the major college football ranks. Two schools who just a year ago were listed among the small colleges, New Mexico State and Memphis State, today are dominating the major ranks on offense while former powers such as Syracuse and Oklahoma are nowhere to be seen in the listings.

New Mexico State leads all major colleges in both total offense and scoring and Memphis State is runner-up in the two departments.

According to official statistics released today by the NCAA service bureau, the Aggies have averaged 394.6 yards per game in seven contests while scoring a average of 38.9 points.

Memphis State has gained an average of 384.5 yards per game and has scored 31.8 points for eight contests to account for its runner-up spots. Utah State is third in total offense 373.9 and Princeton is third in scoring 29.0.

Washington State is the leader in forward pass offense, having completed 103 of 190 aerial attempts for a per game average of 187.5 yards per game. Wisconsin is second, followed by VMI.

Utah State has shown the most effective running game, averaging 321.6 yards on the ground. Memphis State is second in rushing offense and Missouri is third.

Police Arrest More Than 20 For Elk Kills

Portland — More than 20 arrests were made by state police and game men for the game commission in the Clatsop and Wilson game management units along the north coast opening week end as elk hunters turned elk shooters leaving a known 47 dead animals behind and an unknown number of wounded.

Dave Luman, who heads the big game program for the commission, said that some hunters seemed to go berserk at the sight of herds of elk and kept on shooting until guns were empty, several animals were down, or until the herd disappeared out of sight of the shooter.

In one instance, an officer stood within a 100 yards of a shooter who deliberately dropped two large cows in the Wilson unit and then called to two friends to tag the animals. Upon investigation, the shooter had no Wilson permit but had come into the area to shoot the elk for his friends. These so-called elk hunters were quite indignant when they were arrested and the animals seized.

In the Clatsop area, 27 known illegal kills were made, about two thirds of which were spike bulls. Two beautiful five-point bulls were found untaged. The hunters who killed these two bulls had started to dress the animals out, then decided to leave them. The situation in Clatsop county was so bad opening day, state police radioed for additional manpower to help out.

Jim Taylor Leader in Pro Rushing

New York — (UPI) — Fullback Jim Taylor of the Green Bay Packers had only a so-so 56-yard rushing haul last Sunday but it was enough to wrest the National Football league ground-gaining lead from Jimmy Brown of the Cleveland Browns.

Brown was held to only 29 yards by the New York Giants and slipped from first to third place behind Taylor and John David Crow of the St. Louis Cardinals. Taylor had 540 yards, Crow 524 and Brown 521 in the latest statistics released today by the NFL.

Nick Pietrosanti of the Detroit Lions, although 10th in the overall standings, had the best rushing average among the leaders, with 6.2 yards for 55 tries.

Milt Plum of the Cleveland Browns, who still has not had an interception in 99 throws, maintained first place among the passers despite a brilliant performance last Sunday by Johnny Unitas of the Baltimore Colts.

Plum's completion percentage dropped 68.7 and his average gain was lowered to 10.9 yards per pass in a losing game against the Giants. He remained first, though, according to 6 different aspects of passing.

SF Forty Niners Eye Next Year

San Francisco — (UPI) — The San Francisco Forty Niners get a chance to rest up this week end, but Coach Red Hickey and his staff are making plans for "next year."

Hickey's crew met with personnel scout Pappy Waldorf Tuesday to start analyzing college players in preparation for the National Football league's annual draft meeting in New York Dec. 27.

The coach said the whole Forty Niner team left much to be desired, according to films of last week's 24-0 loss at the hands of Detroit. The defeat virtually dropped San Francisco out of the Western Division race, with a record of four losses and three wins.

Quarterback T. A. Little was sidelined with a groin injury for the Detroit game, but Hickey said he would be ready for action against the Dallas Cowboys in Texas Nov. 20.

Huskies Pile Up Lead in Figures

San Francisco — (UPI) — The University of Washington Huskies, Rose Bowl-bound for the second straight year, are piling up a statistical lead in the Big Five Conference race.

Coach "Jim Owens" team leads in rushing offense with 224 yards per game; rushing defense by allowing 102 yards a tilt; the Big Five standings with a 3-0 record and a season record of 7-1.

The UCLA Bruins lead the conference in total offense with 339 yards a game; total defense by allowing 228 yards; passing defense by allowing 98 yards, and passing offense with 154 yards per tilt.

Littler, who went into Monday's final play-for-pay 18 holes tied with Bob Rosburg, got four birdies to pull away for the victory at 272, 16 strokes under par.

Reserves Being Sold Again for USC-UO Scrape

Oregon State College, Corvallis — Reserved ticket sales for the Nov. 19 Oregon State-Oregon football game in OSC's Parker stadium resumed this week with the arrival of an additional 1900 reserved seats for the game.

Sales had reached a standstill last week as the OSC ticket offices exhausted their supply of tickets for the homecoming game, traditionally one of the west's top games.

The additional tickets were printed for the newly-erected north end zone grandstand. By last Saturday ticket supplies or both sidelines and the south end zone had been sold out.

An announcement on general admission tickets and seating will be made the week of the game. General admission tickets will not be on sale before the day of the game, unless all reserved seats are sold in advance. There will be some general admission seating, but most will be sold on a standing room basis.

Last year at Eugene the underdog Beavers upended the Webfoots, 15-7, before a sellout crowd of 22,500 at Hayward field, Eugene. With the new grandstand section, Parker stadium will hold over 28,000 fans.

Oregon State's battle with Oregon will have a musical treat in addition to the promise of topflight football.

Both the Oregon State and Oregon marching bands will perform, and the OSC class of 1950 (the largest ever to graduate from Oregon State) will have ex-Webfoot basketball coach Bill Borchers' jazz combo in front of their section.

Elgin Baylor Tops NBA Scoring Race

New York — (UPI) — Elgin Baylor of the Los Angeles Lakers double-timed the National Basketball Association statistics leader at last tabulation with a high tally of 270 points and 189 rebounds.

The former Seattle University All-American ousted Cincinnati's Oscar Robertson from the scoring lead by netting 90 points in three games. The "Big O" had scored 224 points, while Wilt Chamberlain of Philadelphia vaulted from eighth to third place with 206.

Robertson, however, continued his surprising role as a top play-maker with 82 assists for a 9.2 average, almost double the 5.0 mark of runner-up Rod Hundley of Los Angeles.

Guidance Session Planned Nov. 18

Butte Falls — A guidance session covering preparation for college or other training beyond the high school level will be held for the students of Butte Falls High school Nov. 18 at 9 a.m.

William B. Hunter, superintendent announced that a visiting team from the state system of higher education has been invited to conduct the meeting.

Representatives from the state schools will explain their respective academic offerings and point up each institution's specific requirements. Opportunity for questions by students is given to provide individual guidance. The importance of education beyond high school and the urgency of adequate preparation early in the high school years will be explained. A description of what that "adequate preparation" entails, career opportunities, costs, scholarships, and mechanics of school application and entrance will be stressed.

These informative sessions are conducted annually in the

high school as part of the regular guidance program. They represent a combined effort by the state system of higher education and the high school to better prepare high school students for their future careers. The program presents complete information on the educational opportunities provided at public expense within the state.
