Eighth Grade Sponsors Carnival for Murphy

Murphy - The Murphy school was the scene of a Halloween carnival recently. This has become an annual affair but there was a special story behind it this year which makes it more newsworthy than usual.

It has become the custom for the PTA to sponsor this affair, but this year, to use the current political jargon, they "yielded" to the eighth grade for a very special project. The class is planning a trip to Salem during their spring vacation from school to observe the legislature in session, sit in on certain committees during their discussion periods, and, in general, tour the city as much as is possible in the time allowed them.

Two years ago, the eighth grade of the school made such a trip, and it was of such educational value in the opinion of their teacher, Mrs. Phyllis Michaels, and the other faculty members who chaperoned the group, that it was decided to repeat it for this year's class.

In an attempt to raise as much money as possible as a unit, thereby leaving only a small amount to be paid by each child involved, the class took on the carnival as the first in a series of projects.

It featured, in addition to all the usual carnival booths, a table displaying most unusual and attractive dried floral arrangements. These ranged from centerpieces for everyday use to those with specific holiday occasions in mind, such as Halloween, Thanksgiving, and Christmas. Any of them were available for immediate purchase or could be ordered for a future time. There were also some very effective Christmas doorpieces and wreaths for the holiday season.

The eighth grade owes much to the gracious, and entirely voluntary, assistance of Mrs. Dale Martin of Murphy. Prior to moving to Murphy several years ago, Mrs. Martin was a resident of San Francisco and a busy career woman in the field of staging state-wide flower shows and year around floral displays in business and civic locations throughout the city.

She offered to instruct and assist the students in the preparation of these floral arrangements featuring interesting, and readily available, dried seed pods, grasses, weeds and the like. She devoted several hours a week in the regular class art period to showing the children how to make very beautiful displays by the effective use of bronze, gold and silver sprays and graceful arranging.

There was such interest expressed in the articles that it was decided to repeat the display and take future orders at the PTA meeting Monday, Nov. 14. This meeting will be the annual open house at which time there will be a period of one hour, from 7:30 to 8:30 p.m., during which parents are invited to visit their children's classes, discuss any problems they may have with the teacher, and pick up their child's report card for the first nine weeks' marking period.

Points for 1960 will soon be totaled and there will be a banquet in Eugene, Dec. 3, at which time prizes will be awarded for the best scores. There is a strong possibility, if current standing is any indication, that Chris will be among the winners.

Freedom Foundation, located at Valley Forge, Pa., was founded in 1949 to "create and build an understanding of the spirit and philosophy of the Constitution and the Bill of Rights and of our indivisible 'bundle' of political and economic freedoms inherent in them; to inspire love of freedom and to support the spiritual unity born of the belief that man is a dignified human being, created in the image of his Maker, and by that fact, possessor of certain inalienable rights."

Each year the Foundation selects, by a non-partisan, independent awards jury, the effective, useful, and inspiring works of individuals, organizations, and schools, selected for an award receive a "Valley Forge Freedom Library," consisting of books and other teaching aids, together with a George Washington honor medal.
