Election At A Glance

By United Press International - President Kennedy elected in one of the closest races in the nation's history. With more than 86 million votes counted, Kennedy had a popular vote lead of slightly more than 300,000. But he had won 23 states with 337 electoral votes, 68 more than the number required for election. Vice President Richard M. Nixon won 24 states with 185 electoral votes. Kennedy was leading in two still undecided states with 7 electoral votes.

SENATE: Democrats 101 to 2 seats to the Republicans, in Delaware and Wyoming, but will retain control by a wide margin, 64 seats to 36 for the Republicans.

HOUSE: Democrats won 257 seats and were leading for two others in still undecided contests, for indicated total of 259. Republicans won 175 seats, leading for 3 others, indicated total 178. Democrats still will retain control by comfortable margin, but GOP scored a net gain of 24 seats over last Congress.

GOVERNORS: Democrats won 15 contests, Republicans 12. Democrats will now control 34 state houses, Republicans 16, a gain of one for the Democrats.

Women Senators On Opposite Sides Of Senate Aisle

Washington - UPI - Maurine Neuberger and Margaret Chase Smith are the first two women in history to be elected simultaneously to the Senate for full six-year terms.

They will sit on opposite sides of the Senate aisle since Mrs. Smith is a Republican and Mrs. Neuberger a Democrat.

It will be the first time since 1954 that Sen. Smith has had female company in the Senate. That year a Nebraska woman was elected to fill a two-month vacancy. Sen. Smith's victory in Maine meant her third straight six-year term. Mrs. Neuberger was elected to the Oregon seat held by her husband before his death earlier this year.

Mrs. Smith also was involved in another female "first" - the first woman vs. woman contest for a Senate seat in history. She defeated Democrat Lucia Cormier. By winning in Oregon, Mrs. Neuberger became the 10th woman to serve in the Senate, and the third to win election to a full term.

The third woman to be elected to a full senate term was Arkansas Democrat Mrs. Hattie W. Caraway, who served 13 years and one month before her term expired on Jan. 3, 1945.

Popular Vote For President

By United Press International - The popular vote for president at 10:30 a.m. (p.s.t.): Nixon 33,098,293; 49.74 per cent. Kennedy 33,444,507; 50.26 per cent.

Nixon had won 25 states with 188 electoral votes. Kennedy had won 22 states with 334 electoral votes. (X) Kennedy was leading in 2 more states with 7 electoral votes.

Unpledged electors won in Mississippi with 8 electoral votes. Necessary for election: 269. The vote was from 163,218 of 186,140 precincts. (X) includes 18 uncommitted electors in Alabama and Georgia.

Prestige Data May Not Be Released

Washington - UPI - U.S. Information Director George V. Allen said today the Eisenhower administration has not decided whether to release the series of polls on U.S. prestige abroad which played such a big role in the campaign.

Allen said it would be up to the White House to release the polls, which reportedly show a drop in U.S. prestige, and which the administration refused to release during the campaign.

Allen said the polls "have been off the front pages since the election, and I suppose a lot of people would like them to stay that way."
