

Sammy Davis Jr. Hopes Inter-Racial Marriage Criticism Evaporates

Hollywood — (UPI) — Sammy Davis Jr. says he hopes criticism of his inter-racial marriage will evaporate once he and blonde May Britt become man and wife.

They will be married Nov. 13.

"I think the racial controversy will die down once we're married," he said. "But nothing will convert the real haters."

"I hope our relationship will be accepted with dignity by most of the people in this country. After all, I'm not the first Negro to marry out of his race, and I won't be the last."

"May (pronounced My) has handled herself beautifully with members of both races. I'm very proud of her."

"Actually inter-racial marriages have a better chance for success than other marriages. I read about it in a survey taken by an English organization."

"The problems and pressures that surround a mixed marriage help bring a couple closer together. They have to stand together against criticism."

Sammy, dressed in a sweat-suit sat at the bar of his playroom — a separate building adjacent to his swimming pool high in the Hollywood hills — pondering the problems confronting him.

A short, energetic man who goes out of his way to please people, Sammy said he and May would be married in his luxurious home and hold a reception for 130 friends at the

Beverly Hilton hotel. "I haven't lived in this house for two months," he said.

Redecorated House
"For the past six weeks I was appearing in Las Vegas, and before that I had some club dates back East. During that time May completely redecorated the house."

"Once we're married I'm going to try to spend as much time here as possible instead of traveling all over the country. But there isn't a lot of work here — a couple of movies a year, if I'm lucky, and a few television shows."

"When I do hit the road I'll take May along with me. She also has plans to keep her career going. I'm all for it."

Following the ceremony and reception Sammy and his bride will catch a late plane for San Francisco where they will have a two-day honeymoon before he opens his one-man show at the Geary theater there.

Not All South Americans Said Pampered by Red China Police

Hong Kong — (UPI) — Communist China is wooing Latin America today, but that doesn't mean all South American visitors get the kid-glove treatment.

An Argentine businessman who visited the mainland with 12 other tourists from Argentina told United Press International how he was taken to a police station and questioned for three hours. He asked, for personal reasons, not to be identified.

"They accused me of looking for prostitutes on the street," the businessman said.

"What actually happened is that after several tours of factories and communes, I pointed out to other members of our group that everything we had seen looked to be in a mess. Some of my companions were quite pro-Communist."

Turned Into Police
"They didn't like my 'slurs' on China, and apparently they turned me in to the police. It was an unnerving experience. I was questioned for three hours without a break before they finally let me go. They were accusing me of trying to find prostitutes on the streets, and that I gather is a crime of the worst nature."

The businessman spent 20 days in Red China "out of curiosity." He said he had heard in Buenos Aires of tours being arranged by three travel agencies and decided to make the trip.

"I am a Catholic. I have no friendship for Communism. But I went out of curiosity because I had heard so much in Buenos Aires about China's agricultural program. I wanted to see for myself, just as I already had done in Russia."

He said the communes were "in a mess, no organization whatsoever."

Physically Impossible
"I asked one man at a commune how much milk they got from a cow, and he told me '17 liters.' I asked him if that was for one or two, and

he said for one. I pointed out to him that it was physically impossible, a proven impossibility, to get 17 liters from one cow at one milking. He didn't like that. Neither did some of my companions."

He said that he saw numerous tractors and other farm equipment parked in communes with weeds growing around them.

"It seemed as if no one ever bothered to look after them," he said. "They were just parked there and no one seemed to be using them."

This businessman who spoke with an intensity unlike most curious visitors to Red China, said the Chinese certainly want Latin Americans to visit the country. But they don't want people who are "not already pro-Communist or pro-Chinese."

Would Take Preparation
"Tourists like myself are supposed to be mentally prepared to accept what the Communists claim—that everything is going wonderfully well."

Car Still in Use

Newton, Mass.—Back in 1917, the Rev. S.W. Ellis, now pastor of the Church of the Good Shepherd, paid \$1,950 for a Stanley Steamer. Now, 43 years later, he's still driving the same old car. And he figures that, on a fully restored basis, it would be worth at least \$5,000 on the antique car market.

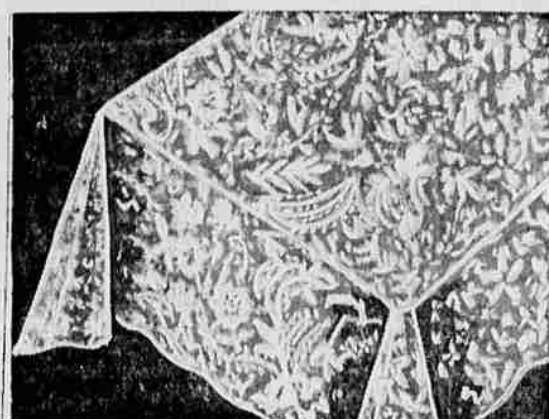
That would take much preparation, believe me, because it is quite obvious that things are not going well. They are going very badly."

He concluded by saying that the Communists have an Institute for Cultural Relations Between China and Latin America with hostels in both Peking and Shanghai.

"Latin Americans are warmly welcomed," he said, "except those like myself who admit to having seen what they actually have seen. What worries me is how successful the Chinese Communists will be in attracting more Latin Americans to visit China. I believe they have got quite a program going in Latin America now, and I presume it will grow stronger."

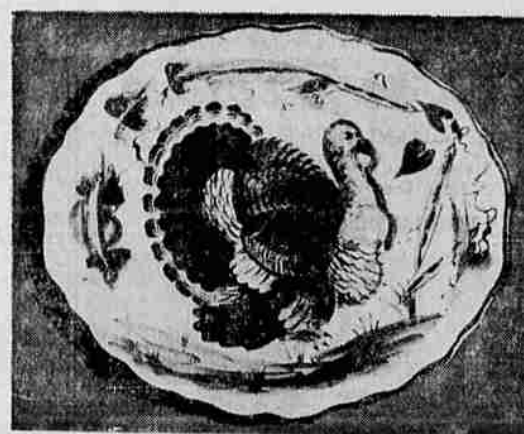
