Johnson Says U.S. Real Winner in Presidential Vote

Austin, Tex.—Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, vice president-elect, said today that the United States rather than a political party was the real winner in the presidential election.

Johnson and his wife, Lady Bird, both weary from the long campaign, planned to spend several days resting at their ranch near Johnson City, 41 miles west of Austin.

The Texas senator said he has no immediate plans to visit his running-mate, President-elect John F. Kennedy, but they would have a conference sometime before Thanksgiving.

First he plans to set the wheels in motion to clean up the situation at home. Johnson said he is inaugurated as vice president, to resign his seat in the Senate.

He said Texas wants a full-time senator, but he plans to confer with Gov. Price Daniel before making a decision on when to resign. A special election to select a successor, if called quickly, would give Johnson's replacement a full term.

Daniel must appoint an interim successor within five days after Johnson resigns, then he must order a special election to elect a successor to serve the rest of Johnson's term. The election must be set not less than 60 nor more than 90 days after Johnson's resignation.

Johnson said the time ahead may be one of "togetherness." "The election demonstrates our country's willingness to move beyond the divisions of the past into a new era of national unity," he said. "Our country has been the winner in this election. A mature and responsible people have turned to courageous leadership and have declared that they are willing to face squarely the problems of our time."

He said he doesn't believe that any American holds in his heart "any malice that would prevent our moving together as one nation—as one people."

East, West Offers Congratulations To President-Elect

London—(AP)—Leaders of East and West countries today offered congratulations to President-elect John F. Kennedy with warm wishes for his success in his message to the American people.

British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan may fly to Washington after the inauguration to get Anglo-American cooperation off to a good start in the new administration.

Macmillan believes this partnership eventually will be the salvation of world peace and the future of mankind.

Other Allied leaders, particularly West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, also were reported anxious for an early get-together.

Adenauer Coming

A Bonn government spokesman announced today that Adenauer will travel to the United States next February to take part in a second German-American round-table conference sponsored by a private organization. But the spokesman said the trip certainly will give Adenauer an opportunity to meet with Kennedy.

Opposition Socialist Mayor Willy Brandt of West Berlin also will visit the United States, probably after Adenauer's trip.

French President Charles de Gaulle and Macmillan are in their 60s and Adenauer is 84. They are more than intrigued at the prospect of dealing with a new world leader only 43 years old.

De Gaulle, uncertain just what Kennedy's election will mean in regard to the U.S. attitude on Algeria, nevertheless was warm in his message to Kennedy.

"I greet you, my dear partner, with my heartfelt congratulations," he said. "I send you in the name of France all my wishes for the United States."

Other messages of good wishes flooded in from Macmillan, Adenauer, Italian President Giovanni Gronchi, Greek Premier Constantinos Karamanlis, the Spanish government, Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev, Prime Minister Robert Menzies of Australia, and President Carlos P. Garcia of the Philippines.

Khrushchev Propaganda

Most, like de Gaulle's, were simple expressions of good wishes. Khrushchev could not refrain from injecting some propaganda.

In an obvious slap at the Eisenhower administration, Khrushchev wrote that "we hope that while you are at a post the relations of our countries would again follow the line along which they were developing in Franklin Roosevelt's time . . ."

Newspaper reaction, both in Asia and Europe, was largely favorable. The general tone was that Kennedy at least would bring a fresh approach to the cold war problems which have become increasingly more knotty in the waning months of the Eisenhower administration.

Portland Newspaper Strike Year Old; No Talks Scheduled

Portland—(AP)—The Portland newspaper strike was one year old today. No negotiations are in progress to settle it.

Stereotypers Union members struck the afternoon Oregon Journal and the morning Oregonian early on Nov. 10, 1959. Other unions joined in the walkout.

The two newspapers have continued to publish. Twelve hours after the strike started they put out a combined news paper in the Oregonian plant. Joint publication continued until April 27 when the Journal moved back to its own plant.

No Talks for Months

Negotiations continued for several weeks to no avail. None have been held for months and Federal Mediator Elmer Williams said last March . . . further joint meetings seem to be hopeless.

Main issues involved working conditions including the number of men required to operate a new casting machine. Of some 880 persons who went out on strike, some returned to their jobs.

A trial examiner for the National Labor Relations Board last month found in a 25-page opinion that the strike was illegal. Unions are appealing the decision.

Picket lines have continued in front of both newspaper buildings since the start of the strike.

Last Jan. 31, 10 trucks serving the then combined newspapers in Portland and nearby Oregon City were dynamited. A one-time member of the Stereotypers negotiating committee, Levi McDonnell, was shot and wounded by the incident, but has since recovered.

Four youths admitted to the dynamiting. They have since been sentenced to prison terms.

Union members started a demonstration at the Oregonian plant Wednesday and announced plans for an anniversary rally tonight. Some 150 members of striking unions took part in the demonstration. There was no violence.

Oregon Election Results

Roseburg—(AP)—Douglas County voters elected Don H. Sanders as Circuit Judge over Warren Woodruff.

Tillamook—(AP)—County Commissioner Howard Tilden, Democrat, came from behind in the counting to defeat August Scholmeier in his race for reelection.

Democrat Paul Verges defeated Republican George Wintlow for district attorney.

Portland—(AP)—Measures to put county employees under civil service were approved by voters in Clackamas, Clatsop, Marion, Polk and Washington counties.

Seaside—(AP)—Voters elected Maurice Pysher as mayor of this coastal resort city. Dr. T. Rex Baldwin was elected mayor of Gearhart.

Portland—(AP)—Voters in Multnomah, Newport and Clatsop approved fluoridation of their water supplies. In Corvallis the vote was to continue it.

In Myrtle Point, voters turned down fluoridation.

Eugene—(AP)—Mayor Edwin Cone of Eugene easily won reelection Tuesday.

A measure to boost pay of the city's firemen appeared to have won, with absentee ballots yet to be counted.

Hillsboro—(AP)—Washington County voters returned Democratic District Attorney Francis Linklater to office. They also reelected County Commissioner Clayton Nyberg.

Oregon City—(AP)—Sheriff Joe Shobe won reelection in Clackamas county, defeating Republican Stanley Orzechowski.

St. Helens—(AP)—Republican David Williamson defeated incumbent Democratic District Attorney W. W. Dillard Tuesday.

Parade Planned in Yreka Friday

Yreka—(AP)—The Ross Nelson Post American Legion will sponsor a parade starting at 11 a. m. Friday Veterans Day.

The parade will proceed along Broadway to Miner street, then to Oregon, and on Oregon to the Yreka High school football field.

All organizations and veterans have been invited to participate.

The American Legion post will hold a flag raising ceremony at the field at noon, prior to the football game between Mt. Shasta and Yreka High schools.

Prizes will be awarded the best judged entries in the parade.

The American Legion auxiliary will sponsor a turkey dinner at the Legion hall starting at 7 p. m. Friday.
