Gold Cup Regatta on Lake Mead

Las Vegas—UPI—Owners and drivers of the unlimited hydroplanes going through qualifying runs on Lake Mead behind Hoover Dam won't say who will win the 53rd running of the famed Gold Cup Race, top event of motor boating this week end, but they agreed today the 1960 race could be the greatest in history.

Judging from the qualifying runs in trials the past two days, which continue today and Friday, the experts said the fastest heat time in Gold Cup history of 108.7 miles an hour appeared certain to be exceeded.

Men like national driving champion Bill Muncy, Seattle, whose Miss Thriftway had clinched the 1960 title even before the Gold Cup; Col. Russell Schleck, the Air Force pilot who drives for a hobby; Czech refugee Mira Slovak, Canadian driving star Bob Hayward and all the others are prepared for the top efforts of their careers in this dangerous, thrilling sport.

Slovak led a half-dozen qualifiers Wednesday in W. E. Boeing's Wahoo, winner of the Lake Mead Cup here last year. The flight engineer roared three times around the three mile course at an average speed of 113.260.

FLICKERING HOPES

Los Angeles—UPI—UCLA, with only faint, flickering hopes to land in the Rose Bowl, concentrated on pass defense Wednesday in drills for the Air Force Academy. Coach Bill Barnes announced that blocking back Bob Stevens will be in action against the young airmen and their leader, quarterback Richie Mayo, for the first time in three weeks. The game will have a pre-game show showing off the talents of the Academy Falcon mascots and will be the Bruins' first Saturday afternoon home contest.

STILL HAMPERED

Pullman, Wash.—UPI—Wash State's Cougars were still hampered by injuries today as they continued to polish both offense and defense for Saturday's game with Idaho. The Cougars ran through a long drill on offense Wednesday. Linemen Lee Schroeder and Ron Green missed the workout due to knee injuries and senior guard Bill Berry was sidelined also because of a knee injury.

Portland—UPI—Willamette's unbeaten—untied Bearcats have been ranked ninth by the NAIA and 16th by the United Press International in weekly small college football polls. The Bearcats, who captured their third straight Northwest Conference grid championship this year, tied with Langston of Oklahoma for ninth in the NAIA poll and tied with West Chester, Pa., for 16th in the UPI poll. Willamette has won seven consecutive games this season.

Berkeley, Calif.—UPI—The California Bears stressed defense Wednesday with a 15-minute scrimmage. Goal line offense was also stressed. It was the last contact work planned before Cal's big battle with Washington this Saturday. Second string halfback Dan Iton was declared out of the Husky contest because of a sore shoulder.

Seattle—UPI—The University of Washington Huskies will probably get another round of defense today as they prepare for Saturday's game with California. Coach Jim Owens sent the Huskies through another long hard workout under the lights Wednesday evening with much of the session devoted to pass defense.
