

Phoenix, St. Francis Vie Tonight on Pirate's Field

Phoenix-It's championship football here tonight as a pair of district titlists clash in an Oregon Class A-2 prep quarterfinal tussle.

Phoenix high's Pirates who won the District 6 and Rogue league mantles and St. Francis of Eugene, titlist in the Emerald league and District 5, meet at 8 p.m.

Victor will roll on into the semifinal round next week against Central of Monmouth-Independence or McLoughlin of Milton-Freewater.

Phoenix and St. Francis are "rated" teams. They were sixth and seventh, respectively, this week in one poll.

There is no direct way of comparing Coach Jack Woodward's Pirates and the Saints. They met no common foes. Each enters the scramble with a 9-1 record and the schedule of each included an A-1 school. Coach Ed Hummel's St. Francis club topped Wilamette 21 to 12 while slow starting Phoenix lost its opener to Ashland 32 to 0.

Single Wing Battle

This will be a battle of single wing teams. Phoenix is said to have a more diversified attack because it uses some T formation plays. The Saints of Eugene, however, have had a little more scoring success, running up 260 points while Phoenix has accumulated 239.

Pirate defense has done better. Phoenix foes have totaled 76 points. Those of the Saints 91.

The Buccaneer running game is headed by the running of Mike Consruck and Jerry Moore. Dave Nord and Gerald Gersick have spurred the Saints' attack.

Saint tutor Hummel once coached at St. Mary's of Medford. His team's only loss this year was to Central-Linn, coached by Tinker Hatfield, former Rogue River mentor.

Southern Oregon Keeps Passing, Total Offense Lead Among OCC Elevens

Portland - The 1960 football season comes to a close for Oregon Collegiate conference teams this week as four of the five teams are scheduled for games away from home.

Conference champion Oregon Tech goes to Aberdeen, Wash., for a Saturday night game with Grays Harbor.

Three other OCC schools are scheduled for Armed Forces Day Friday. Southern Oregon travels south to California to oppose Santa Clara in an 8 p.m. contest. Oregon College of Education meets Lower Columbia at Longview in an afternoon game while Eastern Oregon plays Wenatchee in that city. Portland State concluded its eight-game slate against Linfield last Saturday.

Bob Pennel of OCE apparently wrapped up the OCC rushing and scoring title last week end at Vancouver, B. C., against British Columbia. Pennel has gained 632 yards in 149 carries and scored 3 TDs against the Thunderbirds to up his point total to 60.

Al Barnes of SOC is second in rushing with 395 yards and freshman Bill White of PSC is third with 377. SOC quarterback Doug Olsen is closing in on the passing title with 52

The state's other three A-1 quarter-final games, the entire A-2 quarter-final round and the class B semi-finals will be played today and tonight.

Portland 13 to 6 last night. Tonight's engagement matches two of the state's highest rated teams. Medford's Black Tornado have been listed No. 1 by pollsters through the season. The Axemen this week were ranked No. 2 in one poll and No. 3 in two others.

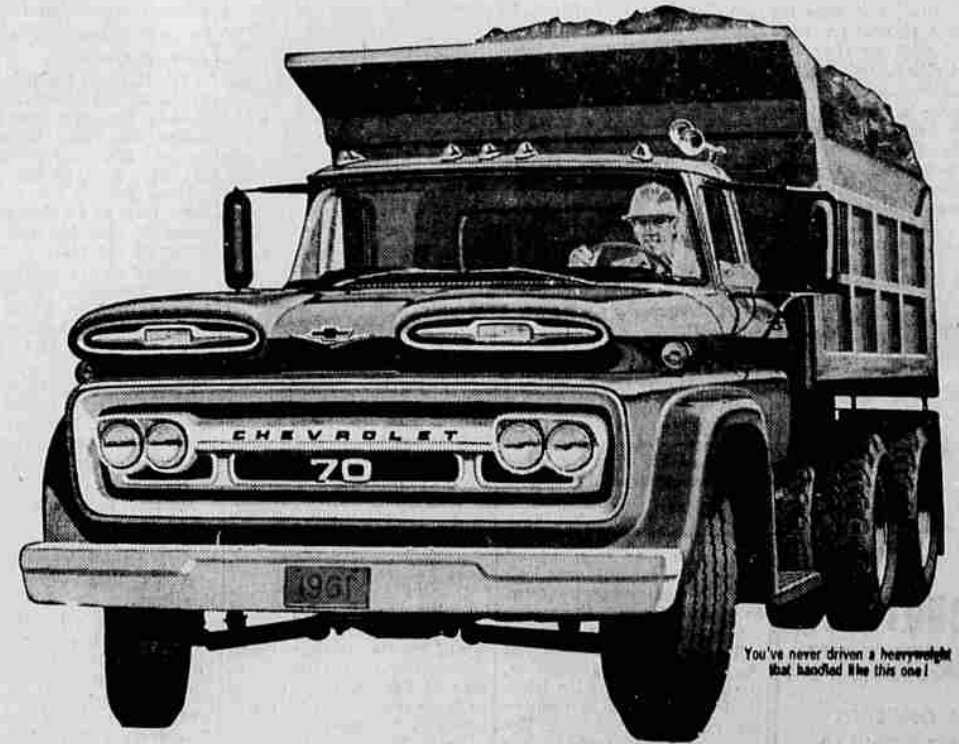
