

Fernandez TKOs Moyer

New York—UPI—Florentino Fernandez, slugging Cuban welterweight contender, floored Phil Moyer of Portland, Ore., three times last night for a technical knockout at 59 seconds of the fifth round that stopped Moyer for the first time in his career.

Fernandez, weighing 154 pounds to Moyer's 133½, smashed brown-haired Moyer to the canvas twice in the fourth with left hooks and dropped him again in the fifth with a terrific right to chin.

Referee Harry Kessler stopped the scheduled 10-round television fight with Moyer lying partially against the lower ring rope and on the

canvas on his back, without attempting to count.

The estimated 2,500 in Madison Square Garden cheered the Cuban's performance.

Baylor Routs Southern Cal In 35-14 Win

Waco, Tex.—UPI—Fleet Ronnie Bull ran circles around a heavy Southern California line Saturday as he scored three touchdowns to lead the Baylor Bears to a lopsided 35-14 victory over the Trojans.

A crowd of 23,000 watched the 189-pound Baylor speedster score on runs of 14, 3 and 1 yards and roll up a total of 76 yards rushing. Bull, a 9.1 man in the 100-yard dash, also caught two passes for 22 yards.

The Bears completely dominated the game until late in the final quarter when the Trojans finally clicked on a 68-yard touchdown pass from Bill Nelsen to Jim Bates and a 26-yard scoring toss to Ben Rosin after a successful on-side kickoff.

Baylor's fourth TD was also on a long-distance connection between Ronnie Stanley and halfback Jim Oldham for 47 yards.

There were four touchdowns in the last quarter. Fumbles were costly to the Trojans, as they lost the ball four times inside the Bear 35.

New York—UPI—The 16th Gator Bowl football game from Jacksonville, Fla., will be nationally televised by CBS on Saturday, Dec. 31, starting at 10 a.m. PST. William C. MacPhail, director of sports for CBS News, previously had announced that his network also would telecast the Bluebonnet Bowl game on Dec. 17 from Houston, Tex.

Mackinaw Trout Has Extensive Journey

Portland—A Mackinaw trout, commonly called lake trout, planted by the game commission in Big Cultus lake in 1958 suddenly got the wanderlust and made an extensive journey through the lake basin area of central Oregon.

During fish population studies conducted at several Cascade lakes and reservoirs this summer by game commission personnel the lake trout was recovered in Little Lava lake, the first ever reported from this body of water. No previous plant of lake trout was made in Little Lava lake.

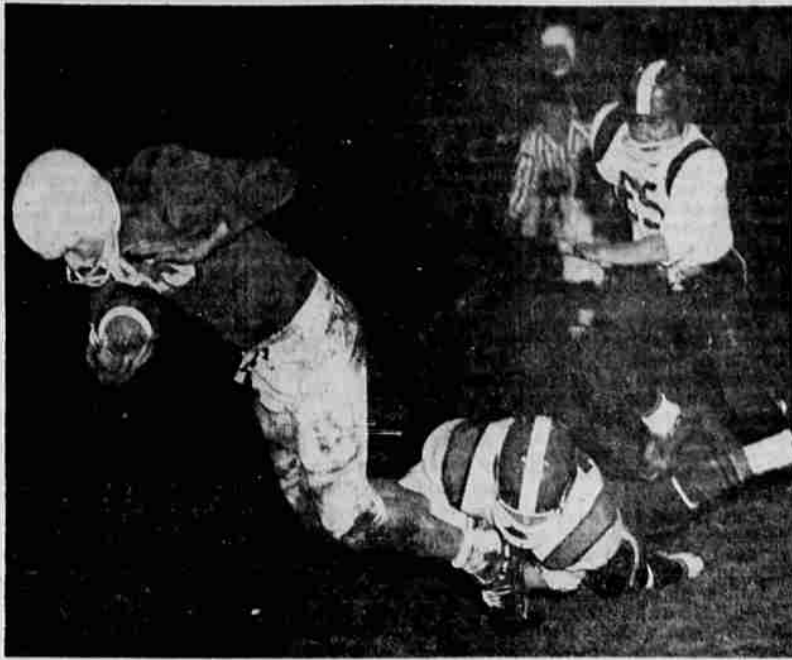
To reach this body of water, the Mackinaw had to migrate out of Big Cultus lake and into Crane Prairie reservoir, then up the Deschutes river into Little Lava, a distance of some 12 miles.

TO APPLY KNOWLEDGE

Portland—Wesley Batterson, game commission biologist in northwestern Oregon, left last week for Hawaii to work with biologists in an attempt to raise native Hawaiian or Nene geese. There are less than 50 of these birds in the wild and every effort is being made to save them from extinction. Batterson who has raised wild birds as a hobby most of his life, including most species of geese, will apply his specialized knowledge in an attempt to increase the numbers of the Hawaiian geese. Fewer than 100 of these fine birds are believed to be alive. Batterson will work with the Hawaiian department of agriculture during his three months leave of absence from the game commission.

Frosh Drub Pups 54-13

Gold Cup Postponed

Las Vegas—UPI—After a four-hour wait for good weather conditions which failed to materialize, the start of the 53rd annual Gold Cup race on Lake Mead yesterday was postponed until Sunday.

Winds of up to 30 miles an hour swept across the course behind Boulder Dam on which 15 giant unlimited hydroplanes were scheduled to begin action in the invitation race for the most coveted trophy in power boat racing.

A slim crowd of 7,837 persons had gathered on the shores of Lake Mead for today's start of Gold Cup competition. The first day's program had called for the running of three sections of the first heat with five boats in each section.

But at 11 a.m. PST, the scheduled starting time, whitecaps were breaking on the course and several boats which had gone out on the lake reported it was too rough for competition.

Warriors Set Torrid Pace

United Press International The way the Philadelphia Warriors are playing in the National Basketball Association, there's no telling how far they will carry their unbeat-

en streak.

Paced by Wilt Chamberlain, the Warriors ripped off their ninth straight victory Friday night, beating the St. Louis Hawks, 117-112.

Chamberlain, the all-time NBA scoring champion, got plenty of help from four teammates — Paul Arizin 23, Guy Rodgers 22, Tom Gola 18 and Andy Johnson 15 — to help Philadelphia maintain a 3½ game Eastern Division lead over the Boston Celtics.

Boston, led by Bill Sharman and Tom Heinsohn, beat the Cincinnati Royals, 128-110, and the New York Knickerbockers, breaking loose for 34 points in the third period, whipped Syracuse Nationals, 112-108, in a doubleheader at New York's Madison Square Garden which attracted a crowd of 18,499.

Moves Within One Catch of Record

Moscow, Idaho—UPI—End Hugh Campbell moved to within one catch of the National pass reception record Saturday as Washington State University defeated the University of Idaho, 18-7, in the traditional football battle of the Palouse.

Campbell caught eight passes—two of them for touchdowns—as he neared the single-season mark of 81 set last year by Chris Burford of Stanford.

His 95 yards for the day brought his season's total to 800, just 54 yards short of the National record set by another WSU end, Ed Barker, in 1951. Campbell has one game remaining to get the receptions he needs to break Burford's record.

Raiders Win 26-20 Over Santa Clara

Santa Clara, Calif.—Southern Oregon college closed out the 1960 football season with an upset victory over Santa Clara 26-20 here Friday night between rain storms plugging the bay area.

Doyle Bransom provided the initial spark for the Raider offensive attack when he returned a kickoff 82 yards in the opening stages of the first quarter.

Bransom's quick sparkler followed a 34-yard draw play which scored for Santa Clara with less than two minutes gone in the game.

SOC threatened on numerous other instances to score before they surged into a 20-12 halftime lead.

Highly rated Santa Clara, once a powerhouse in the west, which revived football this fall, managed only 129 yards passing and 107 yards on the ground, far below the 400 plus yards they had been averaging per game.

Carried Off Field Raider mentor Al Akins, who was carried off the field on the shoulders of the winning Redmen, had high praise for the defensive unit led by Jess Munyon and Willie Garner.

SOC went over the 300-yard mark in its own offensive game with 227 rushing and 97 passing from the arm of frosh Doug Olsen.

John Komes hit paydirt for the losing Broncos on the 34-yard draw play to open the scoring, but Bransom struck up the middle and broke left to outrun all pursuers on his brilliant dash.

Olsen delivered on the mark to Gordy Carrigan for 29 yards and a scoring tally seven minutes later still in the first quarter.

The faltering Broncos fought back to score on their own pass play from two yards out when Ron Calcagno flipped to Bob Cicchi.

Senior Eldon Francis, playing in his final collegiate game, pushed the high flying Raiders back in front to stay when he fought straight ahead for 11 yards and the golden land.

Barnes Scores A pass from Olsen to Jess Munyon on the tackle-eligible play gave the Raiders two points on the NCAA type conversion.

Following halftime the Raiders continued to head for the goal line when Al (the Horse) Barnes banged his way over from the five.

Cage Star Remains On Serious List

Corvallis—UPI—Bob Niles, 20-year-old Oregon State college basketball letterman, remained in serious condition at the Good Samaritan hospital here with injuries suffered in an automobile accident Nov. 6.

Niles, late-season starter on last year's OSC basketball team, suffered two broken arms, a broken right leg and fractured pelvis when the car in which he was riding left Highway 20 at the west edge of the city and wrapped around a tree.

This gave SOC a 26-12 lead which Santa Clara could not overcome although it scored once more when Calcagno passed to John MacDonald 15 yards away in the end zone.

Joe Franzia got the conversion on a run to the right. Soc's Barnes was the game's leading rusher with 90 yards on 21 carries while Kern Bennett ran off 69 more for runner-up honors.

Howard Hartman and Dave Hughes each caught a trio of passes as Hartman got 50 yards and Hughes netted 18.

Gordy Carrigan rambled 22 yards in his only carry of the evening off the Southern Oregon spread which earned him a first down deep in Bronco territory.

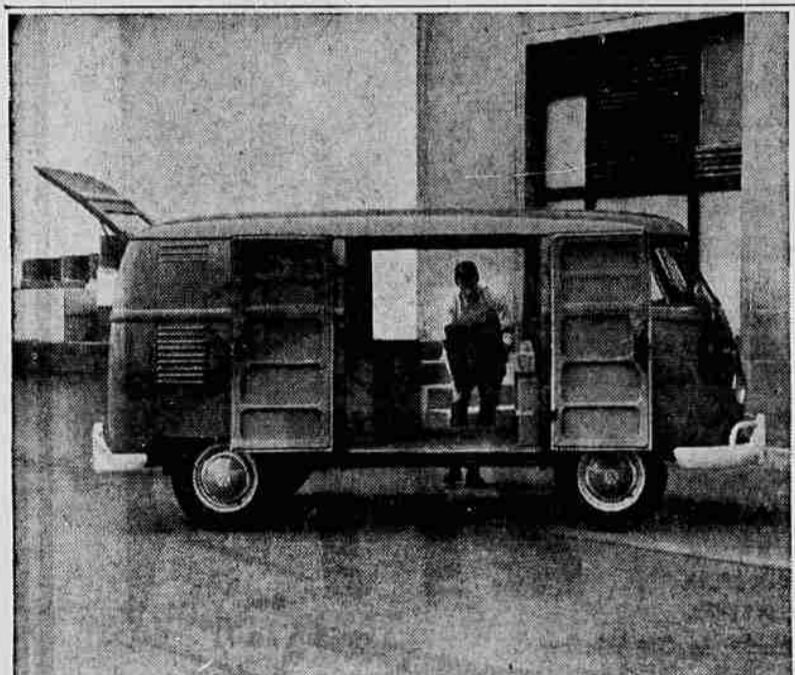
