

Congress Expected To Hear Call For 'New Frontier' Legislation

Washington—President-elect John F. Kennedy is expected to greet Congress next January with a priority call for "new frontier" legislation reminiscent of the first 100 days of Franklin D. Roosevelt New Deal.

Both Kennedy and his running mate, Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, Tex., have spoken of such an opening legislative drive in their recent campaigns. On Johnson, vice president-elect, will fall heavy

responsibility for pushing legislation covering foreign and domestic issues in congressional councils.

By calling on Congress for quick action in a number of areas, Kennedy hopes to exploit a time-tested maxim that a president is never so persuasive with Congress as during the early weeks of his administration. In those early days the legislators have not forgotten the new president's power at the ballot box.

the "new frontier" to which Kennedy has directed his party's course. Many of the government's foreign and domestic activities can be accelerated with increased appropriations.

Miss Maxwell, 38, claimed her mate, producer-writer Jerome L. Davis, caused her mental and physical suffering. She asked support for herself and her child, Mathew, 4, and a division of community property. Miss Maxwell and Davis were wed in 1954.

To eliminate congressional roadblocks which threaten the program, Kennedy may take action—openly or privately—to effect some changes in Congress itself. He may, for example, support changes in the complex of the House Rules Committee—by curbing its powers or changing its personnel.

Revisions in President Eisenhower's budget for the year beginning next July 1, should provide one vehicle for moving the government towards
