

MISSOURI GRABS NO. 1 SPOT THIS WEEK IN NATIONAL GRID RATING

New York - Missouri, needing only a win this Saturday to complete a perfect season, seized the No. 1 spot in the weekly major college football ratings by the United Press International Board of Coaches today as the field went into the homestretch.

Coach Dan Devine's Tigers ran their record to 9-0 last Saturday by crushing Oklahoma, 41-19, and thus were in position to grab the top ranking when it slipped from the hands of Minnesota—a 23-14 loser to Purdue.

Missouri needs only to beat Kansas this Saturday to finish its perfect season, clinch the Big Eight championship and earn a trip to the Orange Bowl for the second straight year.

Mississippi, unbeaten but tied once in nine games, moved up to take over the No. 2 spot vacated by Missouri while Iowa, which sank from first to sixth last week after its loss to Minnesota, rebounded back as far as No. 3 this week.

Ohio State, third last week, took a 35-12 beating from Iowa and that set the stage for a general advance by other teams. Minnesota dropped from first to fourth and Washington held steady at No. 5, but after that Duke took sixth, Navy seventh, and Arkansas eighth in advances. Ohio State fell to No. 9 and Auburn crashed into the elite group at No. 10.

Of the 35 famous coaches who comprise the UPI Board—five from each of the seven geographical sections of the nation—22 selected Missouri for first place. Devine's Tigers also received seven votes for second, one for third, two fourths, two fifths, and one eighth. Their point total was 320—a 36-point margin over runner-up Ole Miss.

Missouri must hold onto the No. 1 berth for two more weeks in order to gain the national championship. The final weekly ratings for the 1960 season will be compiled after games of Nov. 26. An ominous note—Missouri is the fifth team to lead the ratings this season, following Syracuse, Mississippi, Iowa, and Minnesota.

NCAA Issues Warning To College Grid Players

New York—UPI—Hoping to bar any incidents such as occurred last year, the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) has issued a strong reminder to college football players that they wait until the end of the season before signing a professional contract.

The NCAA, in a special report to member colleges and universities, reminded athletic directors and faculty representatives of their obligation to rule ineligible any student-athlete who signs an "open" or "secret" pact with a professional team.

Ice Hockey Makes Return To Portland

Portland—UPI—After a 10-year absence, ice hockey returns to Portland tonight with upwards of 10,000 people expected to be on hand to welcome it back.

The Portland, Buckaroos, newest member of the Western Hockey League, clash with the Spokane Comets at the city's new Memorial Coliseum. Game time is 8 p.m.

Harry Glickman, the young promoter who brought exhibition professional football to Portland, is the general manager of the hockey team. He said ticket sales indicated the crowd would approach capacity.

Record Possible
The league crowd record is 9,724, set several seasons back in Winnipeg.

The Portland team so far has played 10 league games on the road and has a respectable 4-5-1 record. Spokane broke a three-game Portland victory streak Saturday night in a game which Portland goalie Don Head and Spokane player-coach Colin Kilburn traded punches and two others also exchanged a brief flurry.

Dellinger Ties With Burleson

Portland—UPI—Olympians Bill Dellinger and Dwyer Burleson, representing the Emerald Empire Athletic Association, captured first place in the open division of the Northwest AAU cross country championships Saturday.

Dellinger, a former University of Oregon runner who represented the U.S. in the 5,000 meters in the 1960 Olympics, and Burleson, a junior at Oregon who went to Rome last summer in the 1,500 meters event, were tied in 20:38.6 over a 3.9 mile course.

The Portland coach is Hal Laycoe, a veteran of many seasons in the fast ice sport's big time.

Portland meets Edmonton Wednesday night and Victoria Sunday afternoon.

Sudden Death Playoff Is Termed Dangerous for Collegiate Games

Dodd and Bryant Request Permission for Playoffs

New York—UPI—The "sudden death" playoff is fine for pro football but, a representative group of college coaches held today, it would be unfair and dangerous in the intercollegiate game.

Georgia Tech's Bobby Dodd and Alabama's Bear Bryant focused attention on the "sudden death" playoff when they asked the NCAA for permission to play overtime in case of a tie. The NCAA frowned on the request but put hinges on the door by finding "nothing in the rules" to prevent it.

Now a group of eastern coaches including Buff Donnell of Columbia, Wayne Hardin of Navy, John Bateman of Rutgers and Harry (The Horse) Wright of Kings Point feels unanimously that it would be bad for the college game.

They hold that the overtime play in case of a tie would provoke injuries because the game already is long enough and arduous enough; would wipe out the moral victory an underdog scores in cases where a heavy favorite is tied; would put unfair pressure on the players and coaches, and would give too much of an edge on a team with the greatest depth in talent.

Pros Have Reason
"It's okay for the pros because they have to come up with an undisputed champion," said Donnell. "But there is no reason why college football has to follow suit."

In college ball two teams can be even and the result should stand that way. "That's why I dislike artificial scoring rules such as the one and two-point conversion. It makes a gamble out of what otherwise would be an even game."

Wilt Heads For Second NBA Title

New York—UPI—It hasn't taken Wilt Chamberlain of Philadelphia very long to notify the National Basketball Association that he's aiming for a second straight scoring title.

The Philadelphia flipper skyrocketed from eighth to second place in two weeks and his 353 points are just two shy of the 355 amassed by league-leading Elgin Baylor of Los Angeles.

Chamberlain has the best average in the circuit with 35.3 points per game. As was the situation last year, the only thing holding him back from making an early run-in to the title is the inability to hit from the free throw line. Chamberlain has made only 45 of 113 foul shots for an anemic .398 percentage.

Overtakes Baylor
The Philadelphia skyscraper succeeded in overtaking Baylor as rebound leader by snaring 287 caroms for a 28.7 average. Baylor has 238 and a 21.6 mark.

Oscar Robertson of Cincinnati continued to pace the league in assists, although his production dwindled to an 8.61 average. Guy Rodgers of Philadelphia is on his heels at 8.6.

Bill Sharman of Boston took over as the field goal percentage leader this week with a .531 mark on 51 of 96 attempts. Lovellette of St. Louis is the new free throw leader at .889 sinking 32 of 36 charity throws.

WANTS BOUT POSTPONED
Philadelphia—UPI—Middleweight contender Joey Giardello has asked for a week's postponement from his Nov. 25 bout with Peter Mueller of Cologne, Germany, because of a bruised right hand. Anthony Ferrante, Giardello's manager, said he had cabled promoter Joseph Thelen at Cologne to reschedule the fight for Dec. 2.

Bantamweight Title Tussle On Friday Night

New York—UPI—A bantamweight title fight (NBA version) and two interesting middleweight bouts top this week's boxing entertainment. Eder Jofre of Brazil and Eloy Sanchez of Mexico are slated for a 15-rounder at the Los Angeles Olympic Auditorium Friday night and the winner will be recognized as world bantamweight (118 pounds) champion by the National Boxing Association and the California commission.

The fight will not be televised or broadcast in the United States. However, on Saturday night there will be a nationally televised 10-rounder in Madison Square Garden, where middleweight contender Henry Hank (160 pounds) of Detroit makes his New York debut against Gene (Ace) Armstrong of Elizabeth, N.J.

Without benefit of TV, another good middleweight scrap is slated for tonight at Buffalo, N.Y., home town of contender Joey Giambra, who'll try to avenge a 1957 defeat by Rory Calhoun of White Plains, N.Y., in a return 10-round.

Cleveland Jones

Hitch Develops in Major League Expansion Plans

New York—UPI—Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick disclosed today that "a hitch" has developed in the granting of new league franchises in Los Angeles and New York, adding, "I couldn't say how serious a hitch it is."

The commissioner pointed out that he is referring to Rule 1 of the major league agreement. This rule, after listing the member cities of the major leagues, provides that a new club may not enter one of these cities without the unanimous approval of all the teams in both major leagues.

Whether unanimous approval of the franchise changes can be obtained is doubtful. In that case, Frick declared that Rule 1 must be changed if the green light is to be given to new teams in Los Angeles and New York.

Although the hitch originally developed regarding Los Angeles, where the American league has announced plans to establish a franchise in 1961, the commissioner said that "whatever might block a franchise in Los Angeles, might block one in New York, too." The National league has announced plans for a New York franchise in 1962.

The Southern Oregon Independent basketball league is expected to operate with at least four teams this season, it was decided at a meeting at the Medford hotel Sunday.

Hoping for Playoff Berth

Salem—UPI—Willamette University, founded in 1842 just 17 years before Oregon became a state, has its first unbeaten, untied football team since 1913 and a couple of flashy backs from Honolulu have been a mighty help.

Stan (King) Solomon, a hard-running 187-pound senior halfback, and Tommy Lee, a six-foot sophomore quarterback, make up half the starting backfield on a team which knocked over eight straight opponents.

NAIA Tourney
The next stop, Willamette hopes, will be a shot at one of the fourth berths in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) playoffs for a spot in the annual Holiday Bowl game. Willamette won its third straight Northwest Conference title this season.

Solomon and Lee haven't been the only stars on Coach Ted Ogdahl's versatile team which had 19 returning lettermen, including guard Marv Cisneros, an outstanding 220-pound senior; clutch-playing end Lee Weaver, another senior; and Jim McCaffery, a fine halfback. The latter two are Salem boys.

Solomon Nears 1,000 Yards
But Solomon, who had a tremendous year as a sophomore and tailed off in 1959, has been among the nation's small-college rushing leaders all season long. He wound up with 958 rushing yards for nearly a seven-yard per carry average. He also scored 84 points, including three touchdowns in the game that clinched the unbeaten season.

Directs Attack
Lee directed Willamette's attack with the finesse of a more experienced veteran. His passing record was 60 out of 110 for 749 yards and seven touchdowns. Both Lee and Solomon kick extra points.

Brown U. Ace Wins Harrier Championship

New York—UPI—The 1964 Olympic Games may seem a long way off for most people, but Bobby Lowe of Brown University already is pointing toward Tokyo.

The 22-year-old senior from Englewood, N.J., who missed the tryouts for this year's Olympic team because of mononucleosis, added another determined effort to make the next trip by winning the IC4A cross-country championship Monday over the five-mile course at Van Cortlandt Park.

Lowe defeated Larrie Sweet of Alfred by 60 yards with a clocking of 25 minutes, 40.4 seconds. Gerald Young of Michigan State was third, Bill Bachrach of Yale was fourth and Bill Reynolds of Michigan State ran fifth.

Rounding out the top 10 in the original field of 250 starters were Bobby Mack of Yale, Lynn Bender of Army and three Penn State runners—Herman Weber, Gerald Newman and Steve Moorhead.

The Nittany Lions breezed to the team championship with a low total of 70 points to end the four-year reign of Michigan State.

Other Penn State harriers who helped their team to victory were Howie Deadoff, 19th and Lionel Bassett, 28th. Army finished second with 119 points, Michigan State was third with 130, followed by Manhattan, 138, and Yale, 231, to lead the field of 24 teams.
