Ashland - "Oedipus, The King," famous tragedy, will be given by the SOC Reading theatre on the Churchhill hall stage Thursday, November 17, 8:30 p.m. The readers hope to give their listeners a better understanding of the play which passes almost universally as the greatest extant Greek play. Dr. Arthur Kreisman has prepared an introduction which will aid in understanding and will review the circumstances which led up to the opening of the play.

The readers are all members of the faculty at Southern Oregon college, with the exception of a guest reader from the Faculty Wives organization, Mrs. George Bell, who is also a teacher in the Ashland public schools. The other readers are William Oyer, George Bell, Walter Aron, Dr. Richard Byrns, Dr. Francis Haines, and Dr. Leon Mulling. Many of them have had extensive acting experience in professional, college and community theatre productions.

The staging of this reading theatre production is designed with the idea of projecting the spirit of the play. Mr. Oyer is the technical director and he is assisted by Judy Berkeley, David Bowdoin, George Brown, Joe Funderberg and Mimi Jones.

Dr. Dorothy Stolp, director of the production, states the reading, which will last about an hour, will be presented with no intermissions, and no curtain calls in order that the mood of the play may not be broken. Curtain time is scheduled for 8:30 and no one will be seated after the reading has begun. There is no admission charge for this production and the public is invited to attend.

Next First Lady Plans Quiet Life

Washington - (UPI) - Mrs. John F. Kennedy, wife of the president-elect, plans to lead a "quiet routine" life in Washington as she awaits the birth of her baby, expected about mid-December.

The nation's next first lady returned to Washington Friday night with her daughter, Caroline, 3, and told reporters it was "wonderful" to be home.

She decided against accompanying her husband on his West Palm Beach, Fla., working vacation in order to be closer to New York hospital where she plans to have her baby.

The president-elect calls his wife every evening, according to Mrs. Gladys Uhl, Mrs. Kennedy's press spokesman.

The current first lady, Mrs. Dwight D. Eisenhower, is expected to invite Mrs. Kennedy to the White House to show her around before inauguration day.

The gesture is a traditional courtesy on the part of outgoing first ladies. For example, eight years ago, Mrs. Eisenhower was invited to look over the executive mansion as a guest of Mrs. Harry S. Truman.

Mrs. Eisenhower is currently in Augusta, Ga., with the President.

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Gift Wrapping Is Demonstrated For Phoenix Club

Phoenix - Mrs. Otto Ewaldsen of Swem's store gave the program for a special meeting of the Phoenix Garden club held November 4 in the Fireplace room of the Phoenix Community club.

Mrs. Ewaldsen gave a timely demonstration of gift wrapping. She mentioned the new foil wraps now on the market in abundance and pointed out that with their brilliant colors and rich textures, that only a simple ribbon bow or trim is needed to obtain a very pleasing result. The speaker suggested that the lines of the paper pattern can often be repeated in the package trim for a more unusual effect.

Mrs. Ewaldsen demonstrated step by step the proper way of making the many bows and trims which she displayed for the gardeners. She started with the simple shoestring bow and progressing to the double loop bows, flat trims for packages to be mailed and finally to elaborate satin roses, frilled parasols, and novelty trims. The viewers were impressed with how little ribbon was actually needed for most of the bows and trims, however, the demonstrator cautioned that it would be well to experiment a little with used ribbon which had been pressed out flat before attempting something new with expensive ribbons.

One of the arrangements on display during the meeting which provoked many pleasing comments was created by Mrs. Johnny Klassen and featured a scalloped white fungus growth which she had found on a recent hunting trip. To accent the delicate black tracings on the growth, she had combined it with a piece of black charred wood and mounted them on a base of flat grey stone.

Another highlight of the afternoon meeting was an account by Mrs. Charles Hockersmith of a tour she had taken recently in the Ashland burn area. The tour had been arranged by the Siskiyou district conservation chairman of garden clubs, Mrs. R. L. Asher.

Forestry officials explained the work done in the area in salvaging the timber, seeding the slopes to grass and the plans for replanting of timber. Mrs. Hockersmith urged all members to attend such a tour if the opportunity should arise again as it was "very educational."
