Water Shortage Problem

Williams-The Farm bureau held an open meeting Nov. 10 for discussion of the water shortage problem in the Williams area. The meeting was held in the Provolt Grange hall.

Explanation of the soil conservation program and how it can help in surveying the district water tables was given. Possible locations of dams and earth structures in the watershed area was also discussed.

The possibility of initiating a survey of the area to determine water possibilities was considered. Location of dams, cost of a water project, and the feasibility of the project would be covered in the survey.

Leo Clark, soil conservation head from Grants Pass, and Sidney Smythe, soil conservation engineer, spoke to the gathering.

Financially Unwise

The report explained the maintenance cost of such a program with facts and figures which showed that it would be financially unwise for Happy Camp to consider it. Sonneborn had praise for the interest Hoberg had in our school problems and the time that he took to answer the questions on the matter.

The board also heard a request from Mrs. Herbert West, who lives on Indian Creek, for two more weather sheds to be built in two locations on the Indian Creek road for students to wait in for the school bus. The board directed Sonneborn to look into the matter.

Since one of the polling places in the election was the teacher's room in the elementary school, Sonneborn asked the board if they would agree that he should try to find another location for the ward due to crowded conditions at the school. The board advised him to find another voting place for this area in the future.

After signing numerous warrants for supplies and maintenance the meeting was adjourned.

National Rating Given Crater Future Farmers

Gold Hill-The Crater Future Farmers chapter was one of the two FFA chapters in Oregon receiving a national rating at the national FFA convention in Kansas City, Mo., recently.

Four award classifications are made each year. The award a chapter receives is based on its year's activities. Of 9,000 chapters in the nation approximately 40 receive a gold rating, 40 a silver rating and approximately 60 the bronze rating or honorable mention.

The Crater chapter was awarded a silver rating for last year's activities. The Canby High school chapter received a gold rating. Of the 89 Oregon chapters, two are selected each year to enter national competition. This makes the third consecutive year the Crater chapter has won a national award. It received a bronze award in 1958, a gold award in 1959 and a silver award 1960.

The Canby chapter has also won a national award for the last three years. A few of the activities carried on by the Crater chapter last year were as follows: Weekly radio programs over KMED; monthly newsletters of condensed agriculture information to 150 Jackson county farmers; weekly officer executive meetings; television programs; soil testing and collection of soil to send to Oregon State college for Jackson county farmers; numerous public programs, including demonstrations, panel discussions, talks by members and music by the chapter's western group, the Crater FFA Rogue Ramblers; two members received state farmer degrees; Jim Frink won the Rogue Umpqua district better farming contest, and functions such as the annual parent and son banquet, FFA barn dance and chapter meetings.

The chapter at Crater is making plans for an active year again. It has 125 members, making the chapter one of the largest chapters in the state. Officers for this year are Don Denning, president; Larry Ryerson, vice president; Tom White, secretary; Jim Frink, treasurer; Delmer Smith, reporter and Todd Caster, sentinel. Alan Bray serves as radio chairman. His duties include planning and arranging for the weekly radio programs. Seventeen members hold active chairmanships. The chapter believes that self-member administration develops initiative and responsibility.

Dave Foote, of the Crater chapter, holds the office of state reporter for Oregon. Dave has a busy program outlined this year. He makes periodic trips to other FFA chapters in the district and state and is frequently called upon as guest speaker at chapter banquets.

Frink is responsible for managing 11 acres farmed by the chapter as well as 500 acres of land in his own farming program.

Denning has been outstanding in chapter work in planning and administering the chapter activities along with other chapter officers.

Denning and Frink represented the Crater chapter at the national FFA convention in Kansas City last week. They earned their trip by accumulating the most chapter

activity points last year. Much of the credit for work enabling the chapter to receive the national rating does to last year's officers, including president, John Caster and secretary, Don Ryan. Both boys held the state farmer degree and are currently enrolled at Oregon State college. Caster is studying agriculture and culture education.

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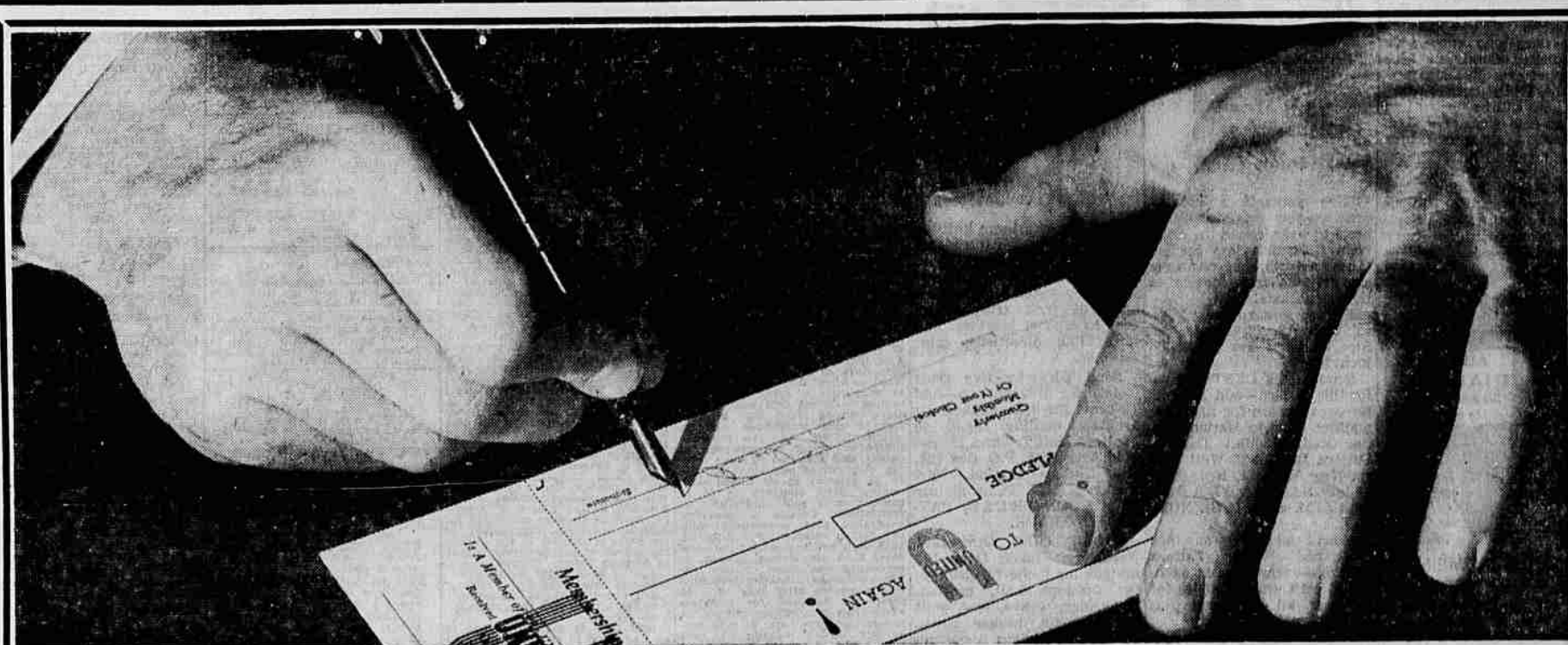
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
