

Black Tornado Preps Defense To Meet Diversified Attack

Medford High school's football Black Tornado has had "fun in the rain" this week. But there has been plenty of serious business too.

St. Mary's Underdog in Semifinal

St. Mary's of Medford, state Class B football co-champ in 1959, will have the underdog role this week in Oregon prep semifinal play.

So Crusader mentor Bill McKibbin was informed last week after his Medford club had tripped Wasco County high at Maupin 20 to 0 in a quarterfinal clash. That was the opinion of the coaches of the Maupin team.

St. Mary's will take on Umatilla at 8 p.m. Saturday night at the Medford stadium in the semi. Umatilla downed Union 27 to 18 in its quarterfinal match.

Underdog status of the Crusaders is based on Umatilla's win over Wasco by a larger score than St. Mary's ran up and when the Redshirts of Maupin were not so crippled as they were for the quarterfinal match.

Reports indicate Umatilla to have a real fine line and to be strong on both offense and defense. The Vikings use a multiple offense, employing T and single wing formations and shifting from T and single wing much as Medford and Phoenix do.

A running game is favored and reverses and spinners have been effective in the Viking repertoire.

Names were not available today. But the Umatilla club has been rated strong at middle guard, left tackle and left end on defense. The club's backs reportedly are "not too big but hard to bring down."

Umatilla is listed as fairly sound fundamentally. Its speed is "not too great." Viking weakness, if any, has been in pass defense.

The Crusaders have been working on a new defense to stop Umatilla's up the middle attack. McKibbin reported plans to go back to offense today.

The coach reported that Alex Mete has ailing knee and Bill Smith a sore arm but that injuries to both Crusaders appear to be minor.

The Tornado, bidding for a second state championship in two seasons, is priming for what the experts rate its most rugged scuffle of this fall. It meets David Douglas of Portland here Friday night in a Class A-1 state semifinal elimination struggle.

Defense has had the concentration of the first two days this week of drill. Coach Fred Spiegelberg said last night. He indicated the Big Wind has been able to get quite a bit accomplished in the workouts despite the yet.

Medford is girding to meet a diversified attack that makes the Scots a serious scoring threat. David Douglas, mentored by Mary Hebert utilizes T, wing T and double wing formations and employs slot backs in an attack which has gained the Scots a nine-win, one-loss 1960 record.

The DD Scots have hard running backs in full Dan Lambert and halves Bill Pierce and Dave Hanson but the offensive forte, judging from last week's observations, seems to be deception more than power and speed. But, it is acknowledged that the rain-soaked, muddy field could have made it look that way. The Douglas club has a well-trained quarterback in Terry DeSylvia to initiate that deception.

Program weights have indicated that David Douglas, a school of 1,600 students just outside the east Portland city limits, fields a lighter team than Medford's. Tornado tutor Spiegelberg has commented, however, that the players looked bigger than the program showed.

David Douglas is champion of the Metropolitan league. It gained the semis by stopping Jefferson of Portland 13 to 6 in the Democrats' bid for a fourth straight appearance in Oregon A-1 finals.

The Scots lost only to Milwaukee 27 to 19. Their victories have included 26 to 0 over Beaverton, 50 to 18 over Clackamas, 31 to 6 over Hills in quarterfinal action, half-bro, 27 to 6 over Astoria, 46 to 7 over Gresham, 28 to 12 over Sunset, 32 to 0 over Centennial and 34 to 3 over Central Catholic. They are riding on a string of eight straight wins.

David Douglas has run up 306 points this fall to opponents' 85.

With the exception of defensive lineman and line-backer Sam Knudsen, who recently injured a knee in practice, the Tornado was intact as of Tuesday. "Knudsen is trying to go," said Spiegelberg, "but I don't think he can make it."

Syndicate Purchasing KC Stock

Chicago—UPI—The signing of legal documents in probate court today was to formalize a deal by a St. Louis syndicate to purchase control of the Kansas City Athletics.

The St. Louis syndicate virtually won court approval Tuesday of its offer for complete control of the club, reported to be about \$3.5 million.

Probate Court Judge Robert Danne was the prime mover in pushing the proposal to the point of completion. He ordered the estate of Arnold Johnson, late owner of the Athletics, deors of the American league last season, to sell its 52 per cent interest in the club to St. Louis group.

But the sale also was contingent on the syndicate's ability to buy up the remaining 48 per cent of stock.

A highly informed source, however, said the difference between the St. Louis purchase price offer and the Kansas City bid was "negligible."

The St. Louis group includes Elliott Stein, an investment broker who once held stock in the St. Louis Cardinals and currently has holdings with the Chicago White Sox; Charles Baxter, who once owned stock in the Cleveland Indians; Gordon Shirk, a partner of Stein's, and Lester Crown of Chicago, an official of the Materials Service Corp.

Co-executors of the Johnson estate are his widow, Mrs. Warren Humes, and the City National Bank of Chicago.

Missouri, Iowa Solid Favorites

New York—UPI—Top-ranked Missouri and third-ranked Iowa, both seeking post-season bowl bids, are solid favorites to further their chances for the "glory" games this Saturday.

Missouri, winner of nine straight this season, is a seven-point pick over Kansas and Iowa is favored by 14 points over Notre Dame. A victory for Missouri will clinch the Big Eight title, an Orange Bowl berth and more than likely the national college football championship.

The once-beaten Hawkeyes of Iowa, already assured of at least a tie for the Big Ten championship, are in the running for a Rose Bowl invitation.

Fourth-ranked Minnesota, which can tie the Big Ten, is a seven-point favorite over Wisconsin. A Gopher victory also would make them strong candidates for a Rose Bowl bid.

Fifth-ranked Washington, the host team at the Rose Bowl by virtue of its Big 8 championship, is favored by 13 points over Washington State.

Duke, sixth-ranked in the nation, is a 14-point pick over North Carolina, eighth-ranked Arkansas is an eight-point choice over Texas Tech, ninth-ranked Ohio State is picked over Michigan by seven and one-half points, and 10th-ranked Auburn is favored by 16 over Florida State.

Second-ranked Mississippi and seventh-ranked Navy are idle this week.

Two games are rated "pick 'em" — Pittsburgh vs. Penn State and Oregon State vs. Oregon.

Hank Greenberg Certain That Rule Can Be Changed

New York—UPI—Hank Greenberg said today an amendment to baseball's rules that would clear the way for the American league's expansion to Los Angeles already has been submitted to the major leagues.

Greenberg, who is the organizer of the group which plans to operate the new AL franchise in the West Coast city, made the comment in response to Commissioner Ford Frick's statement that new franchises in Los Angeles and New York face a snag called "Rule One-C" of the big league rules.

"In the first place," said Greenberg, "everybody was under the assumption that the commissioner already had declared those cities open cities. This is a matter which will have to be resolved on Thursday when we all sit down with the commissioner."

The selection of the 45-year-old ex-Chicago Cub pilot will be formally announced within the next 10 days in order that Scheffing will be able to be with other club officials during the major league meetings beginning in St. Louis on Dec. 5.

Club president John Fetzer said the announcement "is premature" and Scheffing said he "knew nothing about it" but the UPI source said the choice was definite. Casey Stengel, who was dropped by the New York Yankees because of his 70 years, was Detroit's first pick but turned down the job.

Scheffing's previous major league managerial experience was with the Cubs whom he guided to a seventh place finish in 1957 and to fifth place finishes in 1958 and 1959. Bob served during the 1960 season as a coach for the Milwaukee Braves.

A native of Overland, Missouri, Scheffing stands 6 feet 2 inches and weighs about 210 pounds. He played his big league ball for the Cubs, Reds and St. Louis Cardinals between 1941 and 1951, with three years out for service in the Navy, and batted .263.

Under that rule, Los Angeles Dodger owner Walter O'Malley — or any other National league owner — could prevent AL's expansion into Los Angeles by simply voting against it. National league sources say that would be a foregone conclusion.

Frick has indicated that he will vote against expansion if the two leagues disagree on a rule amendment and leave him with the decisive vote. Frick has long been a champion of expansion in principle but is angry because of the way the leagues have been acting independently of each other.
