Phoenix - This was to be a building year in football at Phoenix High school.

Coach Jack Woodward and his Pirate aides appear to have built well and better than they expected. For, the Buccaneers have reached the state semifinal playoff for the second year in a row.

Phoenix will take on strong Central of Monmouth - Independence at 8 p.m. Friday night with the victor to encounter the Myrtle Point-Seaside survivor for the Class A-2 championship of Oregon.

While the Pirates have come a long way this fall, they'll face a titan contingent in the Panthers. Central has been top-rated and near top-ranked in the polls.

One indication of the strength of Central has been voiced in the Portland East Oregonian by Bob George, coach of McLoughlin, high, whose team lost to the Panthers last week. He rated the Monmouth - Independence crew as being "as good as an A-1 or A-2 club Mac high has faced in several years." And, George classed his own team as being as good as any he's had in many years.

The Panthers are led by

Dick Wiese, who is a great passer and a runner despite a mere 148 pounds. Because of Wiese's success this season, Phoenix has worked much this week on defense against passes and ways and means of stopping the pass-run option threat.
